

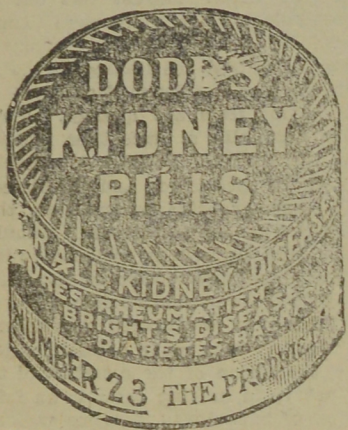

BEAUTIFUL GARDENS OF THE OLDEN DAYS

Mr. John Bebbington, Sr., Tells of Old Time Residents who Took a Great Interest in Floriculture—Also Gives his Impressions of the First Exhibition he Attended here Forty Three Years Ago

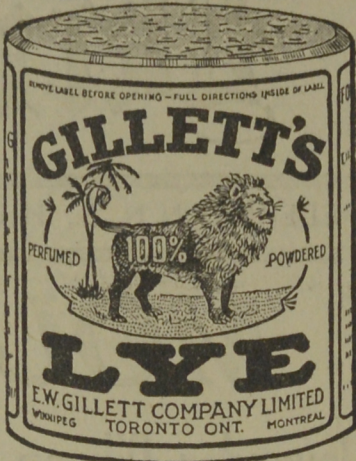
Editor of the Daily Mail:

Sir,—I notice you frequently publish something that happened say 20 years ago. I was much interested in your article or history in connection with the Exhibition on Saturday observing the jubilee of fifty years ago "as I happened to be an exhibitor at the second exhibition held in Fredericton in the year 1870, forty three years past I am now prompted to give you a few reminiscences of that time just from my memory. I came from London, Eng., in that spring of that year to garden for J. W. Brayley, druggist and manufacturer of patent medicines. His residence and garden were located where Windsor Hall now is. He had a conservatory, a small store house for tropical plants, a Canton vineyard for grapes. These grapes had been planted for two or three years and produced quite a crop of grapes both black and green sorts. I was informed that there was going to be an Exhibition in the fall and that I was expected to make as fine a display as possible, chiefly to advertise J. W. Brayley, as he had quite a reputation in the two provinces and P. E. I. Mr. Brayley had agreed to pay passage, wanted a single man and one posted in plant culture rather than a vegetable gardener. At that time Government House was in all its glory and the late Hon. L. A. Wilnot was Governor and a great enthusiast in gardening especially in plants and artistic flower gardening. A Scotch head gardener was kept with four or five under gardeners assisting. Two greenhouses were located at the end of the lawn and connected with the kitchen or vegetable garden. There was quite a stretch of lawn on the north side of Government House fronting on the river.

On the South side was a gravel walk, say 40 feet wide all along the centre of this stretch of gravel or road were laid out in carpet style beds in form of a diamond and circle all bordered with alternanthera, this latter plant was new at that time, the effect was extremely pleasing. The kitchen garden was also after the style of large private places in England and Scotland and the walks clean and bordered with flowers. During the summer months visitors must go to see Government House gardens. The two greenhouses, one was a vinery with Black Hamburg grapes ripe about August or September; the other was filled with beautiful foliage plants. Just at that time gardening was becoming popular and a professional gardener was kept at Justice Fisher's with a large conservatory and graper. Also the late Hon. A. F. Randolph had an English imported gardener, one was at Alex. Gibson's, Marysville, a year or two later. The late Geo. E. Fenety, the Queen's Printer, had a large conservatory, put up with one for grapes. Mr. H. G. C. Ketchum and Mr. J. A. Morrison at the Mills entered the field with garden and flower enthusiasm and built greenhouses and made such an attractive show that all the passengers in the trams in passing used to rise in their seats and exclaim, "Oh! who's place is that?" In fact many were induced to come up river to see Fredericton's famous gardens of that day.

I fear, Mr. Editor, I have forgotten myself and wandered from exhibition notes. Well, in the summer of '70 the second exhibition in that beautiful building took place about the 6th of October. There had been no frost but a very dry, hot summer, fires raging in the woods all around.

The first day, I remember, it rained and poured but cleared in the afternoon.

The directors of the exhibition had promised my employer to partition a place as large as would be required for government exhibit of plants. This was done with a large stove and pipe in case of frost and fortunate it was this provision was made, for the first heavy frost came before the exhibition closed. I have no record of the number of people who attended but suffice to say that it was a great success. J. D. Brayley, my employer, secured some seventeen prizes for the different sections of plants and grapes. There was a Judge Stevens of St. Stephen, who sent grapes in competition with ours. There was Hon. T. W. Anglin, editor of a St. John paper at that time, who gave us quite a write-up in reference to our superior and tasty exhibit of plants but pointed out several defects of the Government House exhibit. The late governor was not on very great terms with the Catholic people just then. The judge on plants, grapes and some kinds of vegetables were three in number. One was Ward from St. John, of the One Mile House and the others were Tait gardener to Justice Fisher and the third I have forgotten.

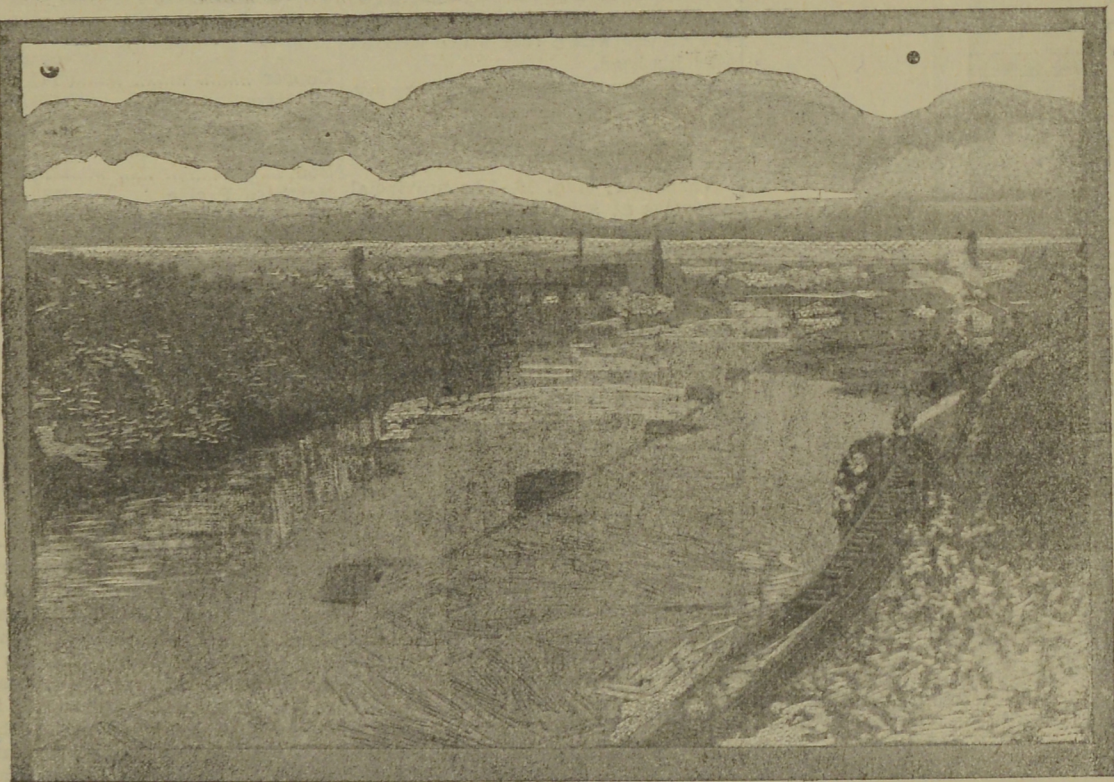
