## SEARCHING FOR MORE SUNKEN TREASURE

London, Aug. 12—A company has just been incorporated in London called the Navarino Bay Salvage Company, to recover the treasure in the Bay of Greece, where sixty-three Turks and Egyptian ships of war were sunk by the allied fleets of England, France and Russia, in 1827.

Of these sixty-three, forty-three have been located and buoyed, and as the water is very clear and no deeper than fifty feet, it is expected that a rich harvest will be reaped. Many of the ships are known to have gone down with specie and jewels on board, but aside from that the guns and other things which can be recovered without much trouble, have great value. The treasurer of the Navarino Bay Salvage Company is E. W. Gaze, who has related how the salvors will go to work and what they expect to find.

"All the existing records that might throw any light on the size and armament of the sunken ships have been most carefully examined," he said, "and from dispatches of Admiral Codrington himself, and from other sources, we have been able to ascertain definitely the size and nature of practically every vessel that was sunk in the engagement."

"It is thus possible, for instance, to estimate at the bottom of the bay there are at least 300,000 tons of oak timbers, which by the action of time and sea, have been turned to the color and hardness of ebony. At

a moderate estimate this timber, which is an ideal material for making furniture, will be worth about \$6 per ton.

"All these old ships were sheathed with almost pure copper and it is estimated that there must be at least 3,000 tons of the metal on the hulls of the submerged ships.

"Then there are the guns. According to the records preserved at the British admiralty, 2,106 guns went down in the Turkish and Egyptian ships. One thousand three hundred of these guns were made of bronze—which is worth from \$50 to \$60 per ton—and the average weight of each gun may safely be put at four tons."

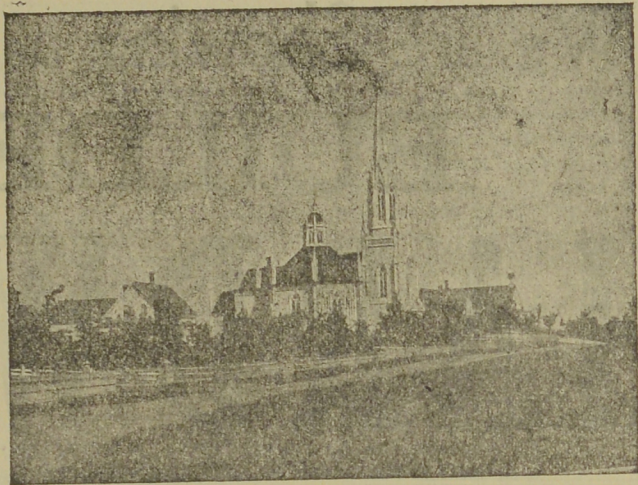
The salvage of these materials alone would amply repay the venture but there is also more that a possibility that the divers will find gold in specie and other forms.

## HOT SHOT FOR

ARMAND LAVERGNE

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 11.—Armand Lavergne, Nationalist M.L.A. for Montmagny, Que., was characterized as an "unscrupulous political agitator," by Rev. J.W.S. Lowry, of Fitzroy Harbor, in a sermon to a congregation of Orangemen in Westminster Presbyterian church yesterday afternoon. The preacher referred to Mr. Lavergne's recent visit to Ottawa when the latter addressed an audience in the arena, and said:

"I enter my solemn protest against the invasion of this province by so unscrupulous a political agitator as Armand Lavergne, demanding special privileges in regard to schools and languages. Why should the French language be specially recognized in Ontario? Why not the Gaelic, when the Highlander and Irishmen are much more numerous in this province than the French-Canadians? Besides that, the Celtic tongue is much more ancient, more cultured and more glorious than that of the French-Canadian."

## CHEAP FARES TO

TORONTO EXHIBITION.

In connection with the Canadian national exhibition at Toronto, which will be held this year from August 23rd until September 8th, the Intercolonial Railway will give very low excursion rates which will give the opportunity to many to visit the Queen City on the occasion of its great annual fair.

The Toronto fair is the largest and most attractive of annual exhibitions in America, and this year new permanent buildings have been constructed and its extensive boundaries enlarged by new boulevards. 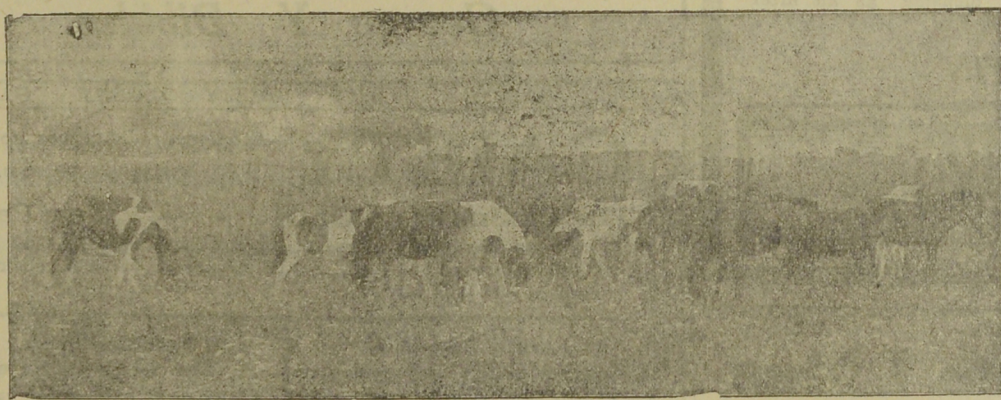
