## Pets Trimmed St. John 5 to 3 on Their Own Grounds

**Fritz Maisel  
HAS HAD METEORIC  
BASEBALL CAREER**

Picked up on Baltimore Sand Lots  
in 1910--Now Member of New  
York Highlanders

New York, Aug. 12.—The career of few ball players has been more meteoric than that of Little Fritz Maisel, whose sale to the New York Americans to the Baltimore Orioles has made base ball history. Picked up from the sand lots of Baltimore in 1910, he has become one of the best infielders ever developed in the International League, and few players about the circuit have any doubt that he will prove a sensation in the American League. As fast as greased lightning on the bases, small Fritz has been a terror to the catchers of the Barrow organization for the last two years, and they heaved a sigh of relief when they read in the papers of his sale to New York.

Fritz was a little too green for a regular berth in a league as fast as the International on his first season out, so he was farmed to the Elgin, Ill., club, where he made a great record. Back to Baltimore he went in 1911 and began the season at short. His first season in the International League Maisel played in 102 games and compiled a batting average of .233, which was far from good. He stole 22 bases and had a fielding average of .913, standing tenth among the shortstops.

Last year the diminutive infielder showed a wonderful improvement, and in 138 games he hit for a mark of .276. He also ranked with the league's leading base runners, pilfering 58 sacks. This year has been Maisel's best in professional baseball. He has been batting well all around the .290 mark, and since being shifted over to third he has played a bangup game. Maisel is way in the lead for this year's base stealing honors, and has been stamped as the fastest man ever turned out by the International.

Maisel stands up to the plate well and has a nice free swing. He is a wonderful thrower and is a fearless fielder of sharp hit grounders.

### NEW PITCHER FOR ROYALS

Montreal, Aug. 11.—Another new pitcher has been secured for the Royals. Clark, a promising twirler, has been secured from Washington, and is expected to join the local team in Baltimore. Clark has been wearing a Washington uniform for some time, having been secured by that club early this season from the New York Giants. He is expected to strengthen the pitching staff of the Royals considerably.

Bill Brennan, the National League umpire, is a former football star. He used to play fullback on a Minnesota football team.

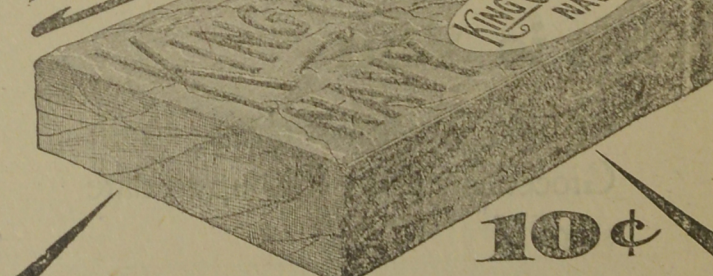
