NEW DEPARTURE  
IN ARCHITECTURE  
OF SCHOOL HOUSES

Light all to Come From Left in New  
Springhill School—Field Stone  
May be Used in Its Con-  
struction

A new school building is to be erected at Springhill and if the ideas of the architect, Mr. Kenneth R. Campbell, prevail a new departure in school architecture will be made. The school will be built where the present one stands, about half a mile above the Springhill Hotel.

The innovation already decided upon is the lighting of the building from the left. This method is used in all modern school buildings and is endorsed by authorities both educational and architectural, as being the more satisfactory. With this there is less danger of the eye-sight of the pupils being injured. This feature is strongly endorsed by the Education Department.

Another feature which the architect is urging upon the trustees is the use of field-stone for the construction of the building instead of wood. A school built of this material would be built practically for all time. Mr. Campbell claims that with lumber at its present high price the use of field-stone as building-material would result in lower cost and a better building. This material has been used to a considerable extent elsewhere but not in New Brunswick. Field-stone can be obtained merely for the cost of handling. The trustees have under consideration the suggestion to use stone of that kind.

Small lights will be used in all the windows that being the prevailing style nowadays and also being more economical, particularly in the matter of repairs.

PROF. ADAM CAMERON  
APPOINTED TO U.N.B.  
CHAIR OF CHEMISTRY

Prof. Robt. A. Hall Declined Appointment—New Professor Graduate of St. Andrew's University—On Edinburgh University Staff

Chancellor Jones of the University of New Brunswick, today announced that Adam Cameron, M.A., B.Sc., has been appointed to the chair of chemistry at the provincial university. Prof. Robt. A. Hall of the University of North Carolina, a graduate of Chicago University, was appointed to the chair a fortnight ago and accepted by telegram but since has declined the position.

Prof. Cameron is very highly recommended by Old Country educational authorities. He is a graduate of St. Andrew's University. Prof. Cameron has been on the staff of the University of Edinburgh for five years and has become noted for his research work. He was one of the first to win a Carnegie scholarship and is expected to fill the chair at the local college most acceptably.

Prof. Cameron has cabled his acceptance and is expected to arrive here in a few weeks to take up his work when the college opens September 18.
