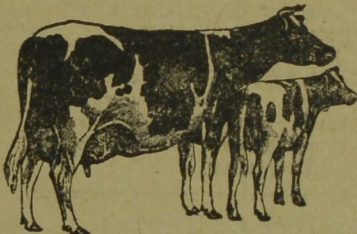

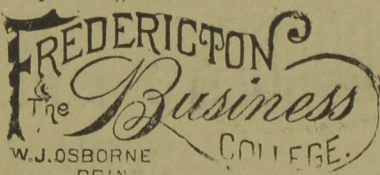

NATIONALIST VICTORY
IN LONDONDERRY

(Toronto Globe)

The election of David Hogg, a Scotch Presbyterian who has lived in Londonderry the greater part of his life, as a supporter of Home Rule is of the utmost significance. It gives an emphatic answer to the often heard assertion that Ulster is a "unit Home Rule. As the result of this election seventeen Home Rule members and sixteen Unionists now constitute Ulster's representation in the House of Commons, so that the Home Rule measure has an actual majority from Ulster as well as from the other provinces of Ireland.

Here in Canada, where local self-government has existed for the generations, no one would think of opposing such a measure as the Home Rule bill on the ground that Ireland can be governed more satisfactorily from Westminster than from Dublin. The only question that is asked with any degree of apprehension is: "Will Home Rule mean Rome rule?" David Hogg, a Scottish-Irish Presbyterian, is confident it will not. Bishop O'Dwyer of Limerick, a Catholic bishop, fears that Home Rule may prove to be anti-Rome rule. Recently discussing educational conditions in Ireland, he said that a speech by Mr. John Dillon, M. P., sent a cold shiver down his back. Mr. Dillon, it seems, looks forward to educational reform as one of the first duties of an Irish Parliament, and the Bishop says: "For anyone who is interested in the welfare of the country, and hopes for the peaceful working of Home Rule, it comes as a shock of disappointment. Mind you, we are promised not a change here and there but a complete recasting of the whole system, but without the slightest indication of the nature of what is to come. For the Catholic clergy it is a serious prospect. Are they to be turned out of the manse? Who is to take their place?"

The Bishop fears Home Rule because it may mean that the priests will cease to control the school system. Ireland, like Italy and France, and Portugal, and other Catholic countries, may, he fears, begin to

NO WOMAN DETECTIVES
AT SCOTLAND YARD

London, January, 25—Now that the Royal Geographical Society has just admitted women to be eligible as "fellows" of that distinguished body there is an agitation afoot that women should be employed as detectives.

The exponents of this latest field of female enterprise cite the appointment of Miss Manners as police sergeant at Des Moines, the feats of Miss Brooks clearing up West Ham and the success of other American "coppers" and sheriffs who wear skirts. Prominent criminal authorities have, given their views on the subject and most of them hold that the different position of women in America from that of women in England prohibits fair comparison being instituted.

I interviewed one of the principal detective inspectors at Scotland Yard on this point. As he has been in charge of the most important extradition cases and has made frequent official trips to the United States and Canada he is in a position to give an opinion on both sides of the Atlantic.

"The Criminal Investigation Department," said the inspector, "employs only two women. They can scarcely be called detectives, as their sole duty is to keep in touch with and report upon women convicts who are out of prison on ticket-of-leave—or on probation, as they say in the States. Another woman has been retained by Scotland Yard in connection with the new white slave regulations, but she is only called in when some young girl's story of betrayal cannot be told to a man. She is more of a mother confessor than a detective."

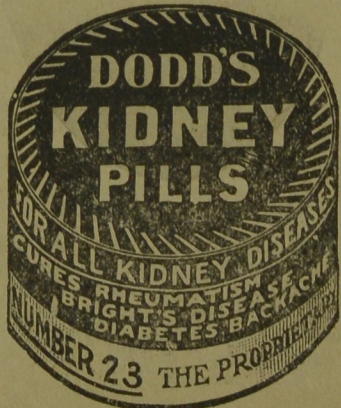
"Why don't we employ more women? Well after long experience in dealing with the crime of the world—and all the great criminals come to London—we do not find women effective. mind you I do not say women would not make good detectives if there were a sufficient number trained for that job. For instance in a force of 500 men detectives there are probably only fifty who are any real use in detecting crime and securing convictions. These ten per cent carry the rest on their backs. A detective is born not made—it sounds trite but its painfully true. If we had several thousand trained women to pick from, we could perhaps get an equally good detective staff although there is always one great drawback."

"What's that?" I asked.

"Woman's unscrupulousness in trying to clinch her case. The woman detective will get 99 per cent of her facts marshalled fairly and squarely. She will get more detail than the man. She wants just one little fact to send her quarry to quod for life. She can't get that last point squarely. Rather than admit it, she fakes it, or she gets it under such conditions that when the case comes up before the criminal judge her keen unscrupulousness on the one point kills all the rest of her work the judge who is always looking out for the interest of the subject, says one bit of evidence has been improperly presented thinks all the rest may be tainted with the same strain and advises the jury to acquit."

"In going after a criminal case the woman detective gets so enthusiastic that she loses the main objective. She forgets that it is a conviction which she must drive at. The law of evidence is quite forgotten in her natural desire to prove her own theories right. To obtain convictions theories right. To obtain convictions in the English criminal courts a detective must be scrupulously fair. And that is what women detectives never are. The woman detective can unravel crime, but she can rarely ever put the law into execution. She lacks logic and fairness. In divorce cases, in the recovery of property, in fact in all matters which are not criminal and where the liberty of the citizen is not at stake, her work is often excellent. But her deficiencies in the other respect keep her out of Scotland Yard."

"Many women are of course, employed by the London police as matrons, etc., and the services of these women are often utilized. For instance in our recent campaign against the fake fortune-tellers of London, whose West End places of business were often merely cloaks for blackmailing assignments, we employed women to get evidence. The widow of a police officer was most useful in this work. We told her exactly what we wanted and instructed her to take careful note of what occurred as soon as her various interviews with the woman fortune-tellers were ended.



NOTICE OF LEGISLATION

The City of Fredericton will present at the approaching Session of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick the following bills for enactment:

(1) A Bill authorizing the City to grant certain concessions to the Palmer-McLellan Company, Limited, and to fix the valuation of the property of Frasers Limited in this City for taxation purposes.

(2) A Bill to authorize the issue of Debentures for the erection of a Fire Station, a Police Station, for the purchase of Queen's Park and for the further construction of Permanent Street Pavements, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000).

(3) A Bill to provide for lighting by electricity the Fredericton and St. Mary's Highway Bridge.

No male detective could have got that evidence, but few women could have taken convincing note of it. "Another point we are sure of her character before we employed her. No cross-examination could make her out to be untruthful or disreputable. We find that women detectives don't mind how they get evidence as long as they get it. They will ask us to put in the box a man or woman whose reputation won't stand ten minutes examination. They forget criminal evidence even against the most notorious crooks, has to be given by witnesses whose word the judge will accept."

"The wife of a former inspector of police was quite successful in London with a private detective agency but she confined her work mostly to divorce and civil cases. Several other women are in the business, but few of them have made either a name or a living at it. It is not so much their innate sentiment or physical frailty that prevents them from being successful—it is their inherent inability to be fair and their lack of horse-sense logic. Training might get rid of these defects but I doubt it."

A By-Law Relating to the Measurement and Sale of Wood.

BE IT ENACTED by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. The word "Firewood" whenever used in this By-law shall mean and include any wood of whatever kind, length or size for use as fuel, brought into the City and sold or offered for sale by the load.

2. The City Council may at any time appoint a fit and competent person to be Surveyor of Firewood brought into the City for sale, and sold or offered for sale by the load, and it shall be the duty of such Surveyor to attend at Phoenix Square Market and such other place or places as may be necessary, and accurately measure every load of Firewood offered for sale, and to place a tag thereon showing the quantity of wood in each load and the date of measurement, and no person shall sell or offer for sale any load of firewood in the City unless and until such load of wood shall have been measured, and shall have attached thereto the measurement tag as aforesaid.

3. The owner or person in charge of any load of firewood offered for sale or sold within the City, upon the same being measured and tagged as in the last preceding section required, shall pay to the Surveyor a fee of Ten Cents for each load so measured.

4. Any person selling or offering for sale any load of firewood within the City without the same having been first measured and tagged as aforesaid, or who shall refuse to pay the surveyor the fee therefor required by this By-law, shall be guilty of a breach of this By-law and liable to any penalty herein prescribed.

5. Nothing in this By-law shall be construed to prevent any person selling and delivering firewood by the cord or millwood by the load within the City in the same manner as heretofore.

6. Any person convicted of a breach of any of the provisions of this By-law shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding Fifty Dollars.
