New York, N.Y., Feb. 5.—Good buying was met on the opening by a decline and at the end of half an hour stocks were firm at fractional recoveries from the blow. Although traders were bearish, accumulation of stock appeared to be going on. Weakness of copper stocks, which was one of the chief features, was a result of decline of fifteen shillings in the price of metal at London and the expectation of another reduction in metal prices here. In London the price of 66 pounds, 17 shillings and 6 pence is over 10 pounds off in a few weeks.

authorize the issue of debentures for the erection of a fire station, for the purchase of Queen's Square, for permanent streets paving not exceeding in the whole \$45,000, to provide for the lighting by electricity of the Fredericton—St. Mary's Highway Bridge, to provide for the establishment of salvage corps and fire police.

Ald. Wilkinson asked why permission to erect one fire station was to be sought when two stations had been decided upon.

He was informed that authority to erect one station had been granted previously by the Legislature.

OBJECTIONS RAISED.

Ald. Burchill said he would like to know where the idea of building a police station came from.

Ald. Wilkinson was of the same mind and also wanted to know where the idea of a bond issue to purchase Queen's Square came from. It was the first he had heard of either proposition.

Ald. Guthrie and Ald. Farrell expressed the same opinion.

Ald. Calder said he was the party responsible for placing those items in the legislative program. It had long been realized that with the erection of new fire stations the old central station building site could well be put to another use. It was disgraceful to have the present arrangements for the housing of prisoners arrested by the police. A police station, should any succeeding council deem it advisable, might be erected on the King street site. It was for that purpose that he had suggested that such legislation be sought. As far as the purchase of Queen Square was concerned it had been decided some time before that Mrs. Twining's rights to that land should be bought out.

Ald. Farrell wanted to know if Ald. Calder desired to build a monument to himself. He thought that in spite of Ald. Calder's desire to be a father to the council the Committee on Legislation should be consulted before any such legislation be asked.

Ald. Calder replied that he was there representing the city and was for one and all. According to the present outlook there was an excellent chance that he would not be a candidate for re-election. He understood that the alderman who had just spoken had announced himself as a candidate. An opportunity for him to erect a monument to himself might be afforded by the legislation under discussion. Every member of the council had talked of the advisability of building a police station and there could be no harm in securing for the city the authority to build when it should be deemed necessary.

Ald. Guthrie commended Ald. Calder's foresight in this matter and felt that at some future date some council might deem it advisable to erect a police building but in view of objections raised, he thought the bill should be referred back to the Legislation Committee. He moved to that effect.

Ald. Farrell said he had no doubt concerning Ald. Calder's motives in this matter. They probably were of the best but he wanted the whole Legislative Committee to consider that bill.

Ald. Calder said that in amendment he must move that the bill be sent to the Legislature.

The amendment was lost on the following vote:

Yea—Calder, Moore, Kitchen, Ryan, Nay—Farrell, Guthrie, O'Neill, Burchill, Wilkinson.

Previous to calling for a vote, His Worship informed Ald. Calder that he was sorry the improbability of there being a tie vote precluded his voting for the amendment.

The bill with regard to a police station goes back to the committee to report but the others go to the Legislature.

Ald. Farrell brought up the matter of purchasing rubber hats for the firemen. Seconded by Ald. O'Neill he moved that tenders for one dozen rubber hats be called for by the Fire Committee.

A resolution of the County Council of the Municipality of York that legislation should be secured to repeal legislation providing for the relief of railways from assessment was read.

The communication was referred to the Committee on Legislation on the motion of Ald. Calder. The motion caused some laughter.

Ald. Calder nominated Mr. A. S. Murray and Ald. Farrell nominated Mr. J. D. McKay as auditor of the school accounts.

Mr. Murray was appointed, those voting for him being the following: Aids. Guthrie, Ryan, Moore, Kitchen, Wilkinson, Burchill, Calder.

Aids. O'Neill and Farrell voted for Mr. McKay.

The council then adjourned.

ported occupation of Scutari by the Montenegrins.

Constantinople, Feb. 4.—The Bulgarians, according to reports received tonight, are retiring from the burning village of Tchatalja, especially on the left wing. This is regarded as a strategical movement, possibly with the idea of drawing the Turks into the offensive.

The belief is held among military experts here that no serious operations are to be expected at Tchatalja for the present. The condition of the southern portion of the zone between the lines of the belligerents is such as to render the movement of men impossible. It is little better than a morass. Only on the higher ground in the northern region 'ran the armies come in contact, and it seems improbable that either side will indulge in an attack in force.

It is supposed that the Bulgarians denounced the armistice less on account of the failure of the negotiations than because they expected that Adrianople would be obliged to surrender within a few days and an armistice still in operation might have embarrassed their liberty of action.

According to the best information here the fortress will be able to resist for a long time. Much is expected, among competent observers, of the new blood, which is now at the head of both military and civil administrations, burning to avenge the earlier defeats, and the enterprise and daring of men like Enver Bey, now for the first time given a chance, it is believed, may surprise the allies. The new Grand Vizier Mahomoud Shekret Pasha, is a ready showing the organizing qualities which won him renown, and gives many hours a day to superintending in person the military arrangements.

LIABLE TO PENALTY

The Chief of Police has received notification from Secretary H. M. Dain of the Public Works Department that all chauffeurs, and motor-cars should have been issued with licenses not later than January 10, and that those without licenses for 1913 are liable to penalty under the motor-vehicles act. Chauffeurs licenses for the ensuing year are numbered from 301 and upwards, those for cars 701 and upwards. The number plates are yellow and black instead of red and white as heretofore.

MID-WEEK COUNTRY MARKET

There was a very small mid-week country market this morning. Prices ruled as follows—best per lb 5 to 9 cents; pork per lb 10 cents; veal per lb 6 to 9 cents; apples per barrel \$2 and upwards. A few potatoes were offered at \$1.25 per barrel but sale was slow.
