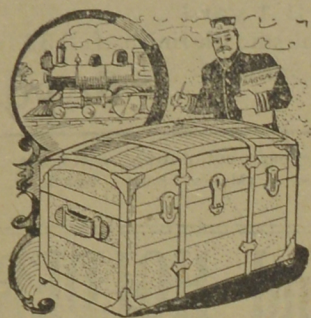

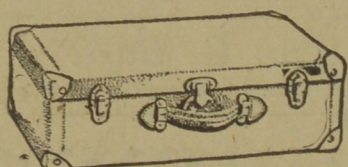

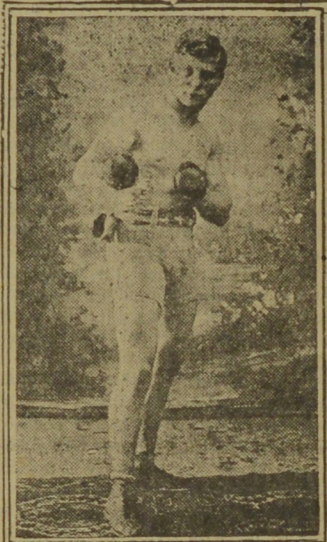

"K. O." BROWN OUTCLASSED BY JIMMIE CLABBY

Greek Boxer Had Hard Time—Got Even Break In Few of the Rounds

Milwaukee, Feb. 3.—Jimmie Clabby easily proved himself the master of "K. O." Brown of Chicago tonight in ten rounds of fast boxing. The best the Greek could do was to get an even break in a few of the rounds. In the semi-windup between Mattie McCue and Freddie Andrews the bout was stopped in the eighth round to save Andrews from a knock out.

The main bout was full of pretty work by both boys. In the first round Clabby drove a left to the face and backed away. Then he put a right to the stomach and several to the face. In the second round Brown rushed Clabby to the ropes but Clabby drove two lefts to Brown's face and then sent a terrific right swing to the jaw.

The third round was tame with Clabby on the long end. In the next Brown rushed in. Clabby ducked and the Greek nearly went through the ropes. Clabby stalled letting the Greek do all the work.

They exchanged many blows in the fifth and after a clinch Brown tried to rush. Clabby swung wild. Clabby landed a right uppercut on Brown's chin and a left to the same spot.

Brown led off in the sixth with a left to Clabby's stomach and a couple to the kidneys. Clabby started infighting and landed a right to Brown's face.

Brown jared Clabby in the seventh with a couple of swings to the face which stopped him for a few seconds. Jim tapped Brown on the nose and landed right and left swings on Brown's face. The eighth round was even. Brown drove his left to Clabby's chest and then tried to rush and Clabby tapped him on the ear. Clabby swung a right and left to Brown's face.

In the ninth Clabby shoved in a couple of uppercuts and Brown fell to his knees in making a rush.

Brown rushed in the last round but Clabby waited his time and landed a right swing to the Greek's face.

DEDHAM, MASS., PLAYER SIGNED WITH HALIFAX CLUB

Some one of the Halifax ball clubs is after players already according to the following despatch in the Boston Globe:—

Dedham, Feb. 3.—There is considerable local pride in the baseball success of David J. Harnett, one of the best known and popular of the young fellows in East Dedham, who this year will begin his professional career with the Halifax team of the Canadian League.

Harnett comes naturally by his athletic skill his father being at one time a champion professional jumper. He has an ideal build for a ball player being 6 feet 1 inch tall and weighing 180 pounds. Boston Expert Beat Roy Robertson and J. E. Sullivan—Sandy Staples Unable to Play—Walsh Claims Alleys Placed Him at Disadvantage—Also States That Pins Were Not What He Was Used to

Archie Walsh who is a member of the Chauncey team in the Boston City Bowling League bowled against Roy Robertson of Marysville and Manager J. E. Sullivan of the Queen Hotel Alleys last night at those Alleys. The Boston professional as might be expected won handily. Sandy Staples was also to have taken a match with Walsh but was unable to be there.

WHAT HE SAYS

To a representative of The Mail after the matches, Walsh said that the alleys were not at all like those to which he had been accustomed and had the same fault as other Maritime Provinces alleys. In modern alleys, the bowler, he said, received greater benefit from the wash from the gutters. Walsh also stated that the pins were heavier than those with which he had bowled.

Manager Sullivan provided new pins for the match and they actually presented more surface than old ones, he says.

JOHNNY KILBANE WON FROM YOUNG DRISCOLL

New York, Feb. 4.—Johnny Kilbane, of Cleveland, featherweight champion, outpointed Young Driscoll of Brooklyn, in a ten-round bout here tonight. Kilbane had the better of every round, hooking lefts and rights to the head with an occasional uppercut and short arm blows to the body. For the first three rounds Kilbane scarcely closed his gloves but as the fight went on he hooked many a hard blow to the head.

The best that could be said of Driscoll was that he was game and tried to fight back every inch of the way. Kilbane missed several left and right hooks to the head and also misjudged a few right hand uppercuts. He forced the pace from the third round on and did not receive a damaging blow in return and the bout was easily his from beginning to end. Kilbane weighed 126½ and Driscoll 124½.
