FRIEDMANN IN BAD ODOR AT HOME

Berlin, June 17.—The last meeting of the Berlin Medical Society showed that the drift of opinion of Berlin physicians was strongly against Dr. Friedrich Friedmann, the Berlin physician who claims he has discovered a cure for tuberculosis.

Prof. Max Westenhof, of the University of Berlin reported that a post mortem examination of one of Dr. Friedmann's patients, who had been young and strong showed a marked acceleration of the tubercular process after treatment. Although Dr. Friedmann had assured a cure tuberculosis showed plainly at the point of injection.

Prof. Westenhof censured Dr. Friedmann for failing to give scientific data and for going abroad to exploit his remedy.

Frau Rabinowitch, professor of bacteriology said that the Friedman cultures apparently were made in cold blood which experience had shown does not give a harmless product.

Prof. Max Wolf of the University of Berlin who had examined patients treated by Dr. Friedmann reported that he had found no improvement.

Prof. Ludwig Schleich who has been representing Dr. Friedmann during the latter's absence from Berlin was alone in defending him. He declared that undoubted cures had occurred and announced on behalf of Dr. Friedmann that the vaccine at the disposal of physicians after the doctor's return.

One of the members asked the society to pass a vote of want of confidence in Dr. Friedman but a vote was not taken.

CASES OF VANITY ON THE SCAFFOLD

It was reported that Callemon, the motor bandit, who was executed in Paris recently, raised objections to being denuded of his locks by a barber, as is customary with criminals before they are brought to the guillotine. This grotesque desire to appear neat and smart on the scaffold, says The London Tit Bits, is a common trait amongst notorious criminals.

On the morning of his execution, Wainwright, who murdered his unfortunate dupe, Harriet Lane, refused to dress because his clean linen had not arrived. His obstinacy was increased by the fact that he was not allowed to walk to the scaffold in a new silk hat that had been given to him during his trial.

Leftoy, who murdered a man in a railway carriage, displayed similar sentiments on his way to the gallows. Throughout his imprisonment he had insisted on dressing in evening clothes and his last night on earth he spent smoking cigars. Despite his wishes, however, he was not allowed to walk to the scaffold in evening clothes.

The murderer of a Glasgow lady, Oscar Slater by name, insisted on the warden calling him Mr. Slater during his sojourn in the condemned cell. He remonstrated with the chaplain for dropping this prefix to his name when addressing him.

Elize Fenning insisted on walking to the scaffold in a magnificent white bridal dress of satin and lace. By a tragic coincidence she was hanged on the day on which she would have been married had not the arm of the law intervened.

When on the scaffold Robert Ramford, who was hanged at Nottingham some years back, asked the hangman if he could have more rope. On his request being granted, he endeavored to shake hands with the hangman but being unable to do so with his pinioned arms he gave him a country bow and smile of thanks.

But one of the most extraordinary cases of sang froid on the scaffold occurred some time back when Macdonald, who murdered a Miss Holt, paid the penalty of his crime. The hangman had forgotten the white cap to place over the prisoner's eyes and Macdonald noticing what had happened, remarked to the executioner: "Put your hand in my breast pocket and you'll find a silk handkerchief. That will do to bind my eyes won't it?" Berry, who was the executioner at the time, did not remove the immaculate handkerchief from the prisoner's pocket, however, but utilized his own for the purpose of blinding the eyes of the doomed man.
