AN OLD GARDNER AND AN OLD PLANT

A gorgeous scarlet trumpet formed plant has been in bloom for several weeks past in the east window of Mr. George Hazen Sr., at the end of George Street. Mrs. Hazen says she has had it for some sixteen years and it is now near through blooming. It is classed as the Cereus family of Cactus. This is the species which are remarkable for their singularity of form and for the beauty of their flowers. Few classes present greater contrast, some round, some angular, some smooth and others fluted. Some are climbers or creepers while others grow like large trees, attaining a height of sixty feet with a diameter of two or three feet. The night blooming section is very interesting and beautiful, Cereus grandiflorus, but this type requires age to flower well. They are very transient lasting only a few hours at night, C. MacDonald's being the largest, and sometimes measuring fourteen to sixteen inches. The sepals in some are brown in others yellowish brown, and in others again pinkish brown. The petals are stilet, in others white. The stems are usually a bright yellow and often sweet scented. These interesting old time plants are now exceedingly scarce not being listed in any of the trade catalogues for years past, but were a common window plant in the old

INFERNAL MACHINE KILLED QUEBEC WOMAN

Sherbrooke, Que., June 13—An infernal machine, which she received in the mail about noon today, instantly killed Mrs. J. Bilodeau, wife of a wealthy contractor here, and severely injured her sister-in-law, Miss Bilodeau, who was in the room with her when the explosion occurred. Coroner Bachaud swore a jury tonight and took the testimony of a few witnesses.

The first witness was Alphonse Bilodeau, husband of the dead woman. He was not present when the accident occurred and could give little evidence of importance. He stated that he had no reason to suspect any one.

Omer Gaumont, postman, who delivered the fateful box, was then questioned. He stated that the box was addressed to Mr. Bilodeau and not to Mrs. Bilodeau. He handed her the box, which was about six inches long and two wide. He then left and when about 100 feet away heard the explosion.

He rang in the fire alarm, and up on the arrival of the firemen, accompanied them into the house where they found the dead woman. As far as he knew the box was stamped with Canadian stamps.

After hearing these witnesses the inquest was adjourned until Thursday evening when it is hoped Miss Bilodeau will have sufficiently recovered to give her evidence. She told Dr. Noel this evening that Mrs. Bilodeau was sitting down she opened the parcel, and immediately after the explosion fell over dead.

world some fifty years ago. Most of the Cactus tribe grow in the dry burning plains of Mexico and Brazil, where they are subjected to the alternate seasons of extreme moisture and extreme drought. In these arid plains where all nature seems parched for six months in the year, the Cacti have been mercifully provided to serve as reservoirs of moisture, and not only the natives by wounding the fleshy stems with their long knives supply themselves with a cool and refreshing juice. But even the cattle break through the skin with their hoofs and then suck the liquid they contain, instinct teaching them to avoid wounding themselves with spines. They should be grown in a light sandy soil in well drained pots. In the summer lots of water, in the winter not watered at all unless in very dry rooms.

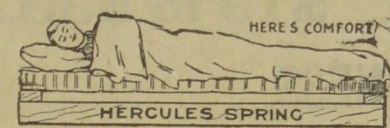
