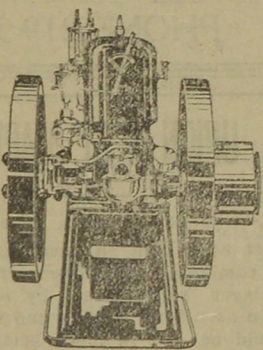

Lee pitched for St. Croix yesterday and had Fredericton at his mercy at all times. Pat Duggan touched him for two singles and Murphy for one and that was the extent of the Fredericton stick-work. St. Croix players had their batting clothes on and found Bart Flynn and Ahearn for nineteen hits. Flynn was batted for fourteen hits in six innings and in the seventh was hit for two more. Ahearn for whom the crowd had been yelling went in and pitched the rest of the game allowing two hits. A tendency to throw the ball where there was no one to receive it was observed in both teams. "Red" Murphy our own catcher pulled off a stunt like that in the fourth and Lee and Tetrault both did likewise. The game was won and lost through the pitching and batting.

FREDERICTON'S RUNS

Things looked pretty good for Fredericton in the first but through an unfortunate combination of events there was no scoring. Fryer was passed and stole second. He went to third on an error but was caught at the plate trying to score. Duggan was safe on a choice and stole second. Bert White drew a base on balls. "Porky" Flynn was batting when what White took to be the fourth ball was delivered. Umpire Keeler made no sound that could be taken as indicating what the ball was. White trotted to second thinking the batter had been passed and was caught and put out between first and second much to his surprise. In the third Murphy reached third but went no further. In the fourth Fredericton did their worst damage. Duggan hit safely. White was passed. F. Flynn hit to Tetrault, who threw the ball over Vance's head into the crowd. Duggan scored. Callahan and Marcotte were thrown out. Murphy scored White and Flynn with a hit and went to third on a bad heave to first by Lee. Bart Flynn struck out. In the fifth Fryer drew a base on balls. Ganley sacrificed. Duggan hit safely and Fryer scored. Vance made another poor throw and "P. J." went to second. White drew a base on balls and with Duggan worked a double steal. F. Flynn fanned and Callahan was thrown out by the ratcher.

BATTED HARD

The Border team batted hard from start to finish. In the first inning a single, a three bagger and a wild pitch netted two runs. In the second a two-bagger, a single and a sacrifice brought in another. In the fourth St. Croix clinched the game by scoring four times on two two-base hits, three singles and a brace of errors. The Fredericton team was shifted around for the game and the shift did not work very well. Duggan had to cover first base and White was in left field and F. Flynn in right.

Vernon McKinney, 2:01 1/2, Mr. McKenzie's fast but erratic pacer, which "Pop" is trying to teach some manners, is also in the string.

Among the trotters is Barney Gibbs. Many conflicting stories have come from Memphis concerning this horse, but stable information is that all that has been said is not true. He is fit and will start in the Ohio Stake.

For the 2:07 trot the Fasig Stake, Geers is grooming that prince of western trotters, San Felipe, 2:09 1/2. Before shipping north last week he turned the Memphis track in 2:11 1/2. For the "Tavern Steak," Lillian Arnold will probably wear the Jones colors.

Akar, considered a two-minute pacer, and The Assessor have a chance at the Edwards Stake, while in the free-for-all trot Dudie Archdale, 2:04 1/2 and Anne, 2:06, will be entered. "Pop" Geers will drive Anne and his employer, Frank Jones, will be behind Dudie Archdale.

BANGOR OUT AT
MAINE CITY**

Teams Played Rattling Ten Inning Game Greeks Winning by Batting Rally in Last Inning

Bangor, Me., June 18--St. John won from Bangor today in a ten-inning contest, by a score of 4 to 0. It was a pitchers' battle, both Tarbell and McPhee pitching fine ball. In the tenth McPhee weakened and the Marathons got to him for five hits with a total of twelve bases, and won easily. Black, the first man up in the tenth, smashed a beautiful triple to right and scored when Lamorey let the ball go through him on the throw in. Shankey singled to left. Watt came across with another triple in the same place, scoring Shankey. Bien hit the first ball pitched for another triple to right, scoring Watt. Bien scored on a sacrifice fly by Waterhouse to centre. Riley was an easy out to Wildes. Tarbell doubled to right. He could have easily made three bases of it but preferred to rest upon second to save himself for the next half. O'Brien ended the slaughter by flying out to Perley.

Up to the ninth it was a pitchers' battle with honors even. Both teams made three hits apiece until then. McPhee had his spitter working well and fanned six men, while Tarbell with his curves mowed down twelve of the home team. Only one base on balls on was given. In the sixth Perley worked Tarbell for a pass, and went to second on a sacrifice. This was the last time that Bangor saw a base. The next two men were easy outs. In the sixth, St. John came near scoring. Waterhouse singled and went to second when Riley came to life with a pretty hit to short center. Tarbell fanned. O'Brien went out. Lamorey to Swazey, both runners advancing. Pinkerton, the next man up, was an easy out, McPhee to Swazey, ending the suspense.

One of the prettiest double plays of the season was pulled off by Bangor in the ninth. Tarbell got a single. Pinkerton hit a grounder to Wildes, who threw to Tewhey, catching Tarbell at second and Tewhey threw to Swazey, doubling up Pinkerton at first. Umpire Labelle umpired a fine game.
