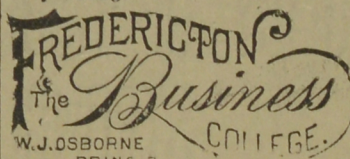

DAIRY INDUSTRIES
MAKE THIRTY-NINE
MILLION DOLLARS

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—The result of the
last census of the dairy industries of
Canada has been issued by the cen-
sus office in a series of interesting
tables. The figures are for the cal-
endar year of 1910. The first table,
which gives the statistics for mak-
ing butter only, shows that there
were 1,033 factories in operation. The
quantity of milk converted into but-
ter was 917,903,274 pounds, and of
cream converted into butter 48,328,-
974 pounds, and the total quantity
of butter made from milk and cream
was 57,328,191 pounds, with a value
of \$13,726,546. Patrons were paid as
their share of this value \$11,832,765.

The second table, the statistics of
factories making cheese only, shows
that there were 2,154 factories in op-
eration. The quantity of milk con-
verted into cheese was 1,724,132,011
pounds and the quantity of cheese
made 172,450,802 pounds, with a value
of \$17,521,021. The patrons of factor-
ies were paid \$15,299,855.

The third table statistics of factor-
ies making butter and cheese shows
that there were 436 factories in op-
eration. The quantity of butter made
was 769,189 pounds, with a value of
\$1,870,861, and of cheese 37,453,403
pounds, with a value of \$4,063,103.
Patrons were paid for butter \$1,623,-
644, and for cheese \$3,540,566.

The fourth table, statistics of factor-
ies making condensed milk, shows
that there were 11 factories in op-
eration. The quantity of milk delivered
was 69,264,000 pounds, with a value
at \$838,912.

The quantity of condensed milk
made was 7,831,596 pounds and the
value as produced was \$1,813,971.
Other products of the factory are
valued at \$900 and the value of sal-
aries and wages as \$170,356.

Chattanooga, Tenn., Feb. 4.—The
first laymen's convention of the
Southern Baptist Church, which had
its formal opening in this city to-
day, has made Chattanooga the
mecca for leading members for that
denomination from Maryland to
Texas, from Missouri to Florida,
and from all the intervening States.
Two thousand delegates are in the
city and more are arriving on every
train. The hotels are filled and many
private homes have been thrown
open for the entertainment of the
visitors. That convention sessions
are being held in the city auditor-
ium and will continue three days.
The work of the church in all its
phases is to be exhaustively dis-
cussed. At the afternoon and even-
ing meetings many speakers of wide
prominence are to be heard. Among
those whose names appear on the
program are Governor Hooper of
Tennessee, Governor Brown of
Georgia, Lieutenant Governor Smith
of South Carolina, J. Campbell
White of New York, President Mit-
chell of the University of South Car-
olina, Dr. J. B. Gambrell of Texas,
President Potat of Wake Forest
College, and President Brooks of
Baylor University.
