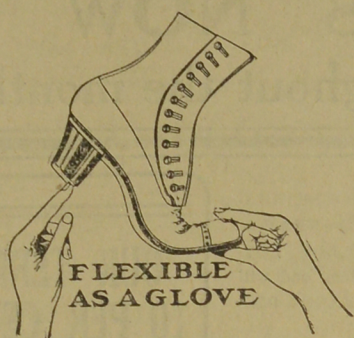

GREAT BRITAIN'S NAVY

London, Feb. 2—Great Britain's constant effort to maintain her supremacy at sea is evidenced by the fact that twenty-two battleships and battle cruisers for her navy, all of the most modern design, will be under construction in British shipyards during the present year. Furthermore, the First Lord of the Admiralty, Winston Churchill, has practically promised to ask Parliament for money for five more large ships, and it is possible that this number will be increased to six on account of the situation in the Mediterranean, and the action of Austria-Hungary and Italy in increasing their naval programs.

CANADA'S CONTRIBUTION

Then there are the three battleships which Premier Borden of Canada has asked the Dominion Parliament to present to the mother country, and the vessel for which the federated Malay States have voted the money, and which, like those from Canada, will be a modern battleship.

British shipyards are also building six more large modern warships for foreign governments. The total new displacement under was amounts to 650,000 tons, and the cost will run very near \$400,000,000.

CAREFUL ORGANIZATION REQUIRED

To complete these ships with the necessary speed will require very careful organization. Already recent British programs are in arrears and there are likely to be some delays with this record in warship construction. Heretofore the Admirals has calculated on two years for the completion of a battleship, but it is probable that they will now have to revise this estimate.

The great difficulty that confronts both the dockyards and shipbuilding companies is the insufficiency of skilled labor. The dockyards are working day and night shifts and overtime, and they have recruited about all the available men, special inducements having had no effect. The ship yards are in the same fix. There is quite a population of shipbuilders on the lower Thames where the trade once flourished, but they are strangely adverse to leaving the vicinity of London, and while employment is plentiful elsewhere they seek work of any kind near their homes.

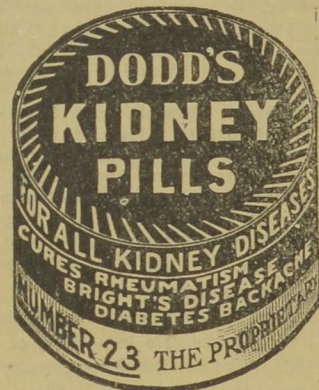

PRIEST GETS HEAVY DAMAGES

Ogdensburg, N. Y., February 5—Fifteen thousand dollars damages for false imprisonment has been awarded to the Rev. Father L. A. Klauder by an Ogdensburg jury. The verdict was returned late last night after a trial lasting ten days.

The defendants in the action were Bishop Henry Gabriels of the Catholic Diocese of Ogdensburg, Coadjutor Bishop Joseph Conroy and Drs. W. B. Hanbridge and W. G. Cooper of the Ogdensburg State Asylum for the Insane.

The plaintiff set forth and convinced the jury that the defendants had caused him to be placed in the asylum after his refusal to relinquish his parish at Faust, N.Y., near here.
