DELOIRMIER PARK

New World's Third Heat Record for
Half Mile Track--Local Record
Smashed Twice

Montreal, July 24--The world's record smashed for the third heat over a half-mile track and the Delorimier Park record broken twice were features in yesterday's free-for-all pace on the closing day's card of the summer harness meeting.

Hall B., Jr., who took second money in the event, paced the second heat in 2.05 1/4 which is the fastest time made this year over a half-mile course. The next heat, which was won by Pickless, was paced in 2.05 1/2 which is a world's record for the third heat in a mile race. She took the three last heats in five winning first money, and the fastest time was on the last quarter of the fourth heat, it beginning paced in .29 1/4.

The previous Delorimier Park record was 2.07 1/4 and was held by Mott Ett.

Fredericton Lost to St. John 4 to 1--Duggan Played Shortstop Keaney Being Sick--Game was Fast One--Tarbell's Pitching too Much for Pets--St. Croix and Bangor in Slugging Bee at Calais

Fredericton with a crippled team was beaten 4 to 1 yesterday. In the ninth inning Duggan crossed the plate on Bob Conley's hit and saved a shut out. The game was one of the best of the season. St. John made no errors while the two chalked up to Fredericton were both by Duggan who was compelled to play shortstop Keaney being in bed as the result of injuries received Wednesday at St. John. Joe Tarbell's pitching was the great feature of the game the Pets not being able to get to him for safe hits. They batted all right but the ball almost every time went into the hands of a fielder. Whatever luck was going St. John had.

St. John kept everything sewed up until the sixth inning, when Bert White drove out a three bagger and reached third on the fielder's choice. He died there. In the last inning the Pets made a desperate attempt to avert a shutout. Bob Ganley was thrown out by Pinkerton, but Duggan hit safely. Stone struck out, Bob Conley picked out one good for two bases and scored Duggan.

St. John scored Duggan in the second inning three singles doing the trick. One of these was a ball which ordinarily Bob Conley could have handled, but the ball bounced when a couple of yards from him and went over his shoulder. In the third Pat Duggan fell down on a drive from Pinkerton's bat, and Ben's two base hit scored him. The Pets held the Groes down until the eighth, when Shanky started, was sacrificed by Pease and scored on Ben's hit. Box score:—

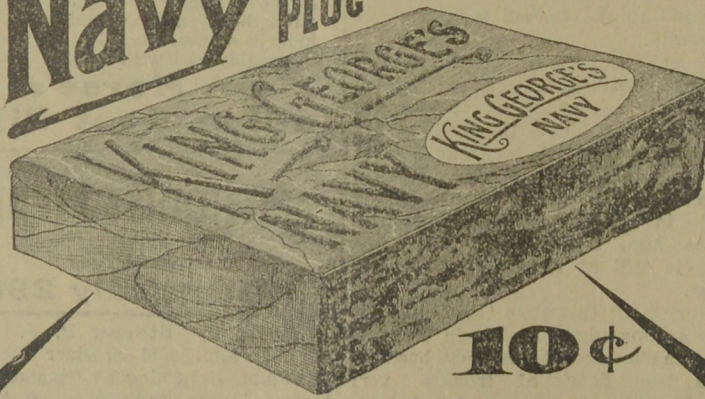

Billy M. Won 2.09 Pace and Del Ray Captured One Heat in Fort Erie Stake

Buffalo, July 24--A heavy down-pour of rain this afternoon resulted in the Grand Circuit races at Fort Erie being postponed until tomorrow. The deluge struck at 3.45 o'clock after the first heats of the 2.09 and 2.11 paces had been finished.

The free-for-all pace was being called when the storm broke and for 45 minutes rain came down in sheets. The track, still heavy from last night's rain quickly became a quagmire, and the judges announced the postponement of the card.

Weather permitting, the two unfinished races and the free-for-all pace will be run off tomorrow, and the grand circuit stand will move along to Grand Rapids. The 2.06 trot carded for today, was declared off because of lack of starters.

Billy M., after acting badly when scoring for the first heat of the 3.09 pace, won, driven out to stall off Walter Cox, with the brown stallion Cabel.

Stetbrino Lad set the pace to the three quarters in the Fort Erie stake for \$5,000 but finished late after a bad break. Frank Bogart, Jr., led to 100 yards from the wire where Del Ray, the favorite, urged by Cox, caught him crossing the wire a length to the good. Summary: 2.09 Pace, 3 in 5, Purse \$1,000. Unfinished.

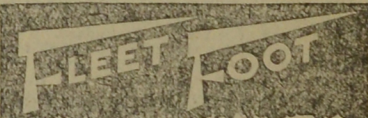

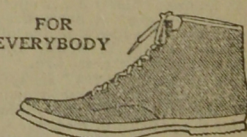
