LIVELY TILT  
BETWEEN COUNSEL  
IN C. T. A. CASE

Routine of Police Court Enlivened  
This Morning During Hearing of  
Defended Scott Act Case---  
Matter Adjourned

There was a lively interchange of  
repartee in the police court this  
morning during a defended Canadian  
Temperance Act case in which a sec-  
ond offence was charged. R.B. Han-  
son was counsel for defense and City  
Clerk J. W. McCready for the pro-  
secution. The witness for the prose-  
cution was Special Policeman James  
Roberts who told of entering the  
place of business of the defendant  
and finding liquor. The case at the  
request of counsel for the defense  
was adjourned until Thursday next,  
July 31.

The clash between counsel occurred  
during the cross-examination of the  
witness by Mr. Hanson. The latter  
accused Special Policeman Roberts  
of "snooping" around the premises  
of the defendant an expression which  
grougout a warm denial from the  
witness and a protest from the pro-  
secuting counsel.

The cross-examination continued  
and Mr. Hanson endeavored to get  
the witness to swear that it was  
only by smelling the contents of the  
bottle that he could say it was gin.  
The reply that the witness gave to  
such attempt was that he could  
swear that the bottle contained gin.  
Mr. McCready made strong objection  
to the repeated questions of Mr.  
Hanson on this point.

"I want you to shut up," shouted  
Mr. Hanson in reply to the protest.  
"The counsel for the defence really

MR. PINDER HOT  
FOOT AFTER THE  
FEDERAL SEAT

But Is Encountering Stiff Opposition  
From Other Aspirants---Mr. Croc-  
et's Appointment to be Made  
In a Few Weeks

The appointment of Mr. C. S.  
Crocket, M.P., for York, to the N.B.  
Supreme Court bench seems to be a  
foregone conclusion. He has decided  
not to wait until Chief Justice Sir  
Frederick Barker retires in December  
next, but is going to land the judge-  
ship lately created by act of assembly.  
This means that Attorney Gener-  
al Grimmer who is also slated for a  
judgeship will have to do the wait-  
ing.

Mr. J. K. Pinder, M.P.P., the old  
war horse of Nackawick is out  
hot foot for the Federal seat soon  
to be vacated, but he is not having  
as plain sailing as he would like. He  
is encountering stiff opposition from  
other aspirants including Mr. John  
A. Young, M.P.P. The latter has de-  
veloped into a professional politician  
and has his eye on the fat sessional  
indemnity which goes with the title  
of M.P. Mr. Young has been a Tory  
all his life and considers that his  
claim on the party is a very strong  
one.

Hon. H. McLeod although he has  
been invited to go to England with  
Col. Sam Hughes is by means out of  
the race. If he could land the por-  
tfolio of Attorney General, he would  
not give the Federal nomination a  
second thought, but there is an "if"  
in the way, and he has been given to  
understand by Premier Flemming  
that there is nothing doing. The graft  
element are behind the Provincial  
Secretary to a man; there is also

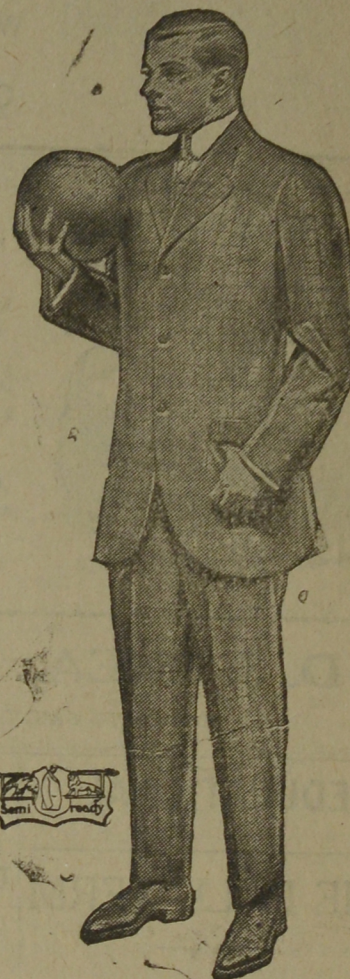
