OPPORTUNITY FOR LIBERALS TO HELP ALONG THE CAUSE

May 7, 1913.

TO THE LIBERALS OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

Efficient organization is the keystone of success in business or politics. The recognition of this fact and the request to their supporters to join in sharing the necessary expense brought success to the Democratic leaders and their party in the United States Presidential elections last year. The funds for legitimate party purposes, such as organization, printing, publicity and travelling expenses, were raised by a popular subscription.

The Liberals of New Brunswick are in need of more thorough organization, of committee work and wider distribution of party literature, for which purposes a considerable sum of money will be required. We believe all loyal supporters of the party will be ready and willing to subscribe to such a fund, and we ask them to do so.

The Liberals are today fighting in the House of Commons for free speech and the people's liberties. We do not know how soon they may be called upon to struggle for their rights at the polls.

We must be ready. The Liberal party must be ready and the only way to be prepared is to organize.

In asking the financial assistance of Liberals, for that purpose we are inviting every member of the party to co-operate and stand shoulder to shoulder with us in this memorable struggle. We neither expect nor desire assistance from the trusts, or wealthy corporations, whose interests may clash with the interests of the common people, and this appeal is therefore made to the masses of the electorate, who desire to maintain the rights of the people. It is far more desirable in the interest of the party that the subscriptions should be general, coming from every parish in the province, in other words, that there should be a large number of subscribers for small amounts rather than a small number of subscribers for large amounts.

Subscriptions for any amount from one dollar and upwards will be received by those in the different polling districts in the parishes who are authorized to do so, as well as by the County Treasurers, who will forward all amounts they receive directly, as well as those from parish collectors, to the Provincial Treasurer who will acknowledge the same.

The funds collected will be expended under the direction of the undersigned Provincial Committee representing the Liberal members from New Brunswick in the House of Commons and subject to the audit of Henry E. Hill, of St. Stephen.

APPOINTMENT—Archie Tibbitts, son of James Tibbitts of this city has been appointed to the position in the People's Bank made vacant by the death of the late H. G. Estey.

IN THE WEST—George J. Colter of Keswick, has reached Edmonton, N.W.T., with the other Maritime Province delegates and reports that district one of the best. He predicts that Alberta within ten years will have a population of 250,000.

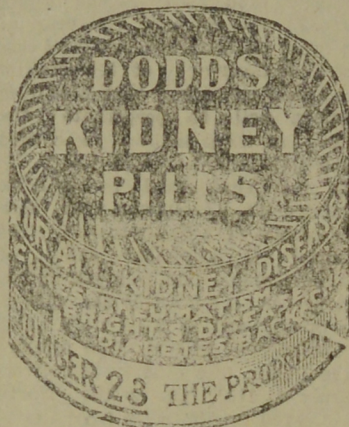
U.N.B. SENATE—A special meeting of the University of New Brunswick Senate was held Thursday afternoon for the purpose of considering the probable resignation of Prof. Murray who has received an offer of a chair at Dalhousie University. The Professor has not resigned however and no action was taken (Prof. Murray is now president of the University of Saskatchewan.)

STEALING—Two soldiers were arrested for stealing two gold watches from a farmer who had made to frequent whiskey. They followed the farmer out the Maryland Road and there took the watches. Policeman Roberts found one of the watches at Morrell's Jewellery Store where it had been traded. The soldiers were arrested but the farmer failed to prosecute.

THE FISHERIES—Robert Orr and Inspector Burr fishery officers have been making it warm for poachers in St. John and Miramichi waters for the past fortnight. Several nets have been seized, and quite a number of fish as well. The poachers, however, that they get all the fish they want and a net is never seized until it is so old that having it seized saves the trouble of burning it.

Notice of Assessment

The Assessment Roll for the City of Fredericton for the year 1913 is now in the hands of the City Treasurer for collection and all persons therein assessed are hereby required to pay the amount of their respective taxes forthwith to the City Treasurer at his office in the City Hall, Fredericton.

A discount of five per cent will be allowed on all taxes paid on or before the 21st day of August next, after which execution may be issued and proceedings had thereon as by law provided.

DOG TAXES

The attention of owners of dogs within the City limits is directed to the following provisions of the City By-law relating to dogs:—

"Every owner of a dog shall register such dog at the office of the City Treasurer on or before the FIRST DAY OF AUGUST in each year the tax or fee for each registration shall be ONE DOLLAR, which must be paid to the City Treasurer before registration."

"The owner of any male dog who has not registered it on or before the first day of August as aforesaid may register such dog at any time up to the first day of September next succeeding on payment to the City Treasurer a tax or fee of TWO DOLLARS; but if such registration is not made until after the first day of September and previous to the first day of January next succeeding the tax or fee for such registration shall be THREE DOLLARS."

The tax or fee for female dogs is fixed at FOUR DOLLARS if not registered before August first and at FIVE DOLLARS afterwards.

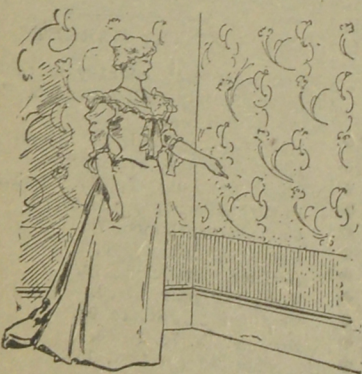
