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## POLITICS AND TEMPERANCE

The Simcoe (Ont.) Reformer blames the Dominion Alliance for the defeat of the Liberal candidate in the recent bye-election for the Ontario Legislature held in the constituency of North Grey. It does not think that Mr. Rowell's "abolish the bar" policy is a vote getter and it calls in question the political influence of the Alliance. It says in part:

"The result of the North Grey election for the Ontario Legislature should surprise no one save the blindest partisan. The Reformer has never admitted the right of Mr. Rowell and those who acted with him to commit the Liberal party and the Province of Ontario to a crusade on behalf of the Dominion Alliance, and today we are confirmed in the opinion we have held from the beginning, that, if persisted in it irremediably disrupt the party. East Middlesex and North Grey, both won by Liberals in the general election, are now represented by Conservatives. The one practical thing to do is the calling at as early a date as feasible of a provincial convention of a thoroughly representative character.

"The Dominion Alliance is the greatest humbug the most hollow and hypocritical sham on the continent. It cannot take one per cent. of the Tory prohibition vote from party lines in any election that ever takes place. It might do a trifle better in the case of prohibition Liberals, but not much. Whatever we may think of the wisdom or unwisdom of Mr. Rowell's course, for the Dominion Alliance there is no excuse. The figures in North Grey should cause it to lose itself somewhere north of the Hudson Bay. The time appears ripe for a leader and a party to call the bluff of the whole coterie of clerical bosses, who are trying to tie the country up in swaddling clothes and reform everybody and everything by acts of parliament."

The language used by the Reformer is a trifle strong, but undoubtedly it contains a lot of truth. The temperance Tory as a general rule is a Tory first and a temperance man afterwards. He will cheerfully vote the temperance ticket in municipal elections but in the larger arena of politics he seems to stick pretty closely to his party. We need go back no further than the local elections in this province last year to secure evidence of this fact. On that occasion the Liberals of St. John nominated as one of their candidates a pronounced temperance advocate, and although he elicited the hearty support of many clergymen, he lost his deposit. Why? Because by taking a strong stand on the temperance question he alienated many Liberals and he did not get a Tory vote to offset the loss.

It is a notable fact that what temperance reforms have been brought about in this country were placed on the statute books by Liberal governments, while the Tory party has worked hand in glove with the liquor interests. It will be remembered that for many years prior to 1896 we had in power at Ottawa a Tory government which numbered among its most influential members a brewer and a distiller, both of whom on the recommendation of a Tory premier, received the honor of knighthood. Coming down to more modern times we find the Borden government appointing an Ontario whiskey distiller to a seat in the senate, but we are not aware that the Dominion Alliance or any other temperance body uttered a word of protest. If we remember rightly however, the memorable Borden banquet at Halifax in 1911, when whiskey and champagne flowed like water, did call forth a resolution of censure from a Nova Scotia temperance organization. It was not a resolution however that caused the party leaders to quake in their shoes as it merely expressed regret "that the Conservative party had continued the custom of serving liquor at banquets." The tail to the kite in this instance is visible to the naked eye. Numerous other cases might be cited to show that temperance alliance. Lord's Day Alliances and kindred organizations are all mighty careful not to tread on the toes of a Tory government. As for the Lord's Day Alliance it showed

great activity in the days of the Laurier government, but when Mr. Borden came into power and has established Sunday trains on the Intercolonial, it has apparently gone out of the protesting business.

The Simcoe papers criticism of the Dominion Alliance may or may not be justified, but the result in North Grey would seem to indicate that as a political factor it is not calculated to greatly alarm the liquor interests for some time to come.


