SKETCHES OF MEMBERS OF THE NEW CITY COUNCIL

Following is a brief sketch of the men who will compose the new city council:

His Worship Mayor Hooper, elected by acclamation for a second term, is a native of this city and is engaged in the insurance business. He sat at the aldermanic board for a number of years. He is prominent in several fraternal societies and is a past grand master of the I.O.O.F. For some years he has been secretary of Agricultural Society No. 34, under whose auspices many successful exhibitions have been put on here. In religion he is a Presbyterian.

Ald. Moses Mitchell elected in Wellington Ward, is a native of Scotch Settlement, Parish of Bright. He is a successful contractor and builder and before coming to Fredericton worked at his trade in the Western States. He is a practical man with extraordinary good sense, and has already given the city good service at the council board. In religion he is a Presbyterian.

Ald. Howard Rogers is a native of the Parish of Douglas and has only resided in this city for a short time. He represented Douglas in the Municipal Council for several terms, and has been warden of the Municipality. He conducts a large furniture establishment on King Street.

Ald. John J. Weddall is a native of Pictou, N. S., but Fredericton has been his home for many years. He is head of the firm of John J. Weddall & Son, dry goods merchants, and has a splendid business record. He is a member of the Board of School Trustees and has had previous experience at the city council. The splendid vote which Mr. Weddall received is a fine tribute to his worth as a citizen. In religion Mr. Weddall is a Methodist.

Ald. Fred. H. Everett, is a native of Kingsclear, but his parents Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Everett now reside in this city. He belongs to a family, members of which have been prominent in civic politics here for many years. Two of his uncles represented Carleton Ward, while two of his cousins now deceased, have represented St. Ann's Ward. When the Boer war broke out the new alderman for St. Ann's Ward was living in Boston, but he pitched his job came home, enlisted in the Royal Canadian Field Artillery and went to South Africa, where he remained for a year. In recognition of his services he was awarded a medal and clasp. He carries on a large business in hay and feed and operated a corn meal mill. In religion he is an Episcopalian.

Ald. Enoch G. Hoben is a native of Burton, Sunbury County, but has resided here for many years. He carries on a large grocery business and is popular with all classes in the community. In religion Mr. Hoben is a Methodist.

Ald. Robert Scott is a native of the Parish of Dumfries and a nephew of Ex-Warden John Scott. He carried on extensive farming and lumbering operations in his Parish for many years and made good. He removed to the city two years ago, and last year was an unsuccessful candidate for alderman. In religion he is a Presbyterian.

Ald. W. E. Farrell, elected in Queen's Ward, is a native of this city, and son of Mr. Patrick Farrell, who was prominent in civic politics here for over twenty-five years. He is a Roman Catholic in religion and prominent in the C.M. B.A. He is the proprietor of the Broadway Store, one of the leading gent's furnishing establishments of the city. Last year he was appointed a hospital trustee.

Ald. W. G. Clark, elected in King's Ward, is a native of the Parish of Southampton, but has resided here the greater part of his life. He is a member of the firm of J. Clark & Son, agricultural implement dealers with head quarters

in this city and branches in other parts of the province. He was a director of the People's Bank of New Brunswick at the time it was taken over by the Bank of Montreal, and is a trustee of the Victoria Hospital. In religion he is a Baptist. Ald. Clark has previously represented both Queens and Kings wards in the City Council, and has an excellent record as a civic legislator.

Ald. Walter W. Boyce is a native of England, who has more than made good in the land of his adoption. He is a dealer in farm produce and carries on a large export business. He is not new to the game of civic politics, having previously represented King's ward. In religion he is an Episcopalian.

Ald. W. J. Osborne, is a native of Belleville, Ont., and has resided here about fifteen years. He is the proprietor of the Fredericton Business College, one of the most successful institutions of its kind in the Dominion. He represented Queen's ward as alderman in 1910, and last year was an unsuccessful candidate for the mayoralty. In religion he is a Methodist.

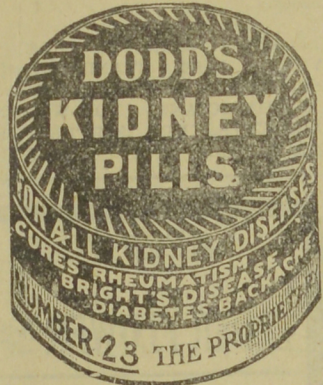

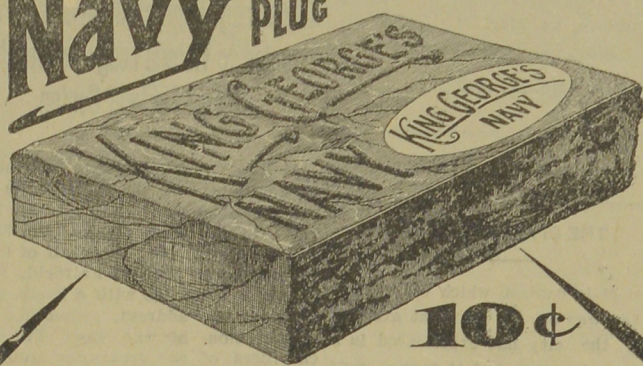
