## 50 YEARS SINCE ALEX- ANDRA'S WEDDING DAY

London, March 10—Many of London  
papers this morning recalled  
the fact that had King Edward VII.  
lived he and Queen Alexandra would  
have celebrated their golden wedding  
today. It was on March 10, 1862  
that Albert Edward, Prince of  
Wales, married Alexandra, daughter  
of the late King Christian IX of Den-  
mark in St. George's Chapel, Win-  
d-sor. The Prince of Wales was 2 years  
old and Princess Alexandra was 19.

Macbrough House, to which Queen  
Alexandra returned to live after the  
death of King Edward, bears many  
mute evidences of love in which the  
wedded Queen holds the memory of  
her late husband. By her express  
command everything within the pal-  
ace has now been replaced so that  
it shall present precisely the same  
appearance as it did during the  
many years she spent there as  
Princess of Wales.

The restoration has been carried  
out down to the smallest detail, es-  
pecially with regard to the apart-  
ments that were used by the late king.  
The portrait that now hangs over  
the mantelpiece in his private room,  
where he transacted business affairs  
when he was Prince of Wales, is that  
of the late king taken a short time  
before he died. In former days the  
place of this was taken by a paint-  
ing of Queen Alexandra as a bride.

## TWO WELL KNOWN MEN WHO LOOKED ALIKE

(Toronto Saturday Night.)

The death of P. J. Nolan, K.C.,  
the witty Irish criminal lawyer, at  
Calgary, the other day, recalled  
many anecdotes of this well known  
and popular character, who practised  
his profession in the Canadian West  
for nearly a quarter of a century.

The personal resemblance between  
Mr. Nolan and the late Hon. T.  
Mayne Daly, one time minister of the  
interior, and at a later date police  
magistrate of Winnipeg, and the cases  
of mistaken identity which often  
arose therefrom, were the causes of  
many amusing incidents in the car-  
ers of both men. Once when Mr.  
Daly was a member of the Dominion  
cabinet, he was traveling on the old  
Prince Albert branch, when a man  
came up to him in the coach and  
said:

"How is it, Mr. Nolan, that you  
have not done anything about that  
case that I wrote you about?"

Quickly seizing the chance to get a  
joke on his friend, Mr. Daly replied:  
"Well, that certainly was a pretty  
rank case of yours and we aren't  
very favorably impressed either with  
you or the amount of money you  
sent. We are not in the law business  
for our health, so you had better  
come through with some more money  
if you want a case such as that at-  
tended to."

Mr. Nolan was shortly afterwards  
surprised to receive a letter at his  
Calgary office from a client enclosing  
a remittance and apologizing for not  
having sent more money. Some time  
later Mr. Daly informed Mr. Nolan  
of the joke.

About a year after this incident,  
Mr. Nolan was at Lethbridge when a  
man accosted him, and addressing  
him as Mr. Daly, asked when he  
would get the patent for his home-  
stead, the duties on which he had  
completed.

Seeing a fine chance to level the  
score with the minister, Mr. Nolan  
replied:

"Do you think we are running the  
interior department for the good of  
our health? If you want homestead  
patents you will have to dip down  
and grease your paw. Get busy and  
send us something worth while and  
then we can consider your patent but  
until you do there will be nothing  
doing."

Not long after this Mr. Nolan re-  
ceived a telegram from Mr. Daly that  
read:

"You had better cut it out. The  
department is getting a bad name."

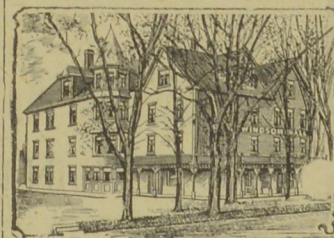
