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CANADA'S REAL HUMILIATION

On the day parliament prorogued Premier Borden made a last effort to hide his own mistake with regard to the Naval Aid Bill, by saying that the action of the Senate in refusing to pass the Bill until the people had passed judgment upon it "is intensely humiliating to the people of Canada."

It was not the Senate that humiliated Canada, it was Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden, Premier of Canada.

It was Mr. Borden who declared if Parliament did not quietly give him his emergency grant he would appeal to the people and repudiated his solemn obligation when faced with the issue.

It was Mr. Borden who formed the Nationalist alliance which was at the back of his anti-imperial conduct.

It was Mr. Borden who preferred power and the sweets of office to patriotism or even truthfulness.

It was Mr. Borden who, when Parliament refused the contribution bid behind the cheap pretext that the Senate did not represent the people, and refused to keep his word.

It was Mr. Borden who tried to coerce Parliament by the aid of his forsworn Nationalist allies; who preferred the dishonor of being false to the pledges upon which the people elected him to facing the people.

It was Mr. Borden who tried to make the people of Canada believe that because the British Admiralty is continuing a long prepared naval program they are doing so because the Senate defeated his Naval Bill—knowing full well the British government is doing nothing of the kind and that he himself, not the Senate, defeated it, rather than appeal to the people.

That is Canada's real humiliation.

An Ottawa despatch says that "Mr. Oswald Crockett of York, N.B." was among the also rans for the post of Solicitor General lately captured by Mr. Arthur Meighen of Portage la Prairie, Man. Mr. Crockett's non-success in landing a government job is due to the fact that the opinion he entertains of his own ability is not shared by others who know the man. Now if he would only get on to himself and pull wires for the position of Police Magistrate of Fredericton or that of High Sheriff of York victory would undoubtedly perch upon his banner.

Many there are at this time who regret that they did not start earlier to swat that pesky fly. It should be remembered that where there are flies there is danger of typhoid, tuberculosis, smallpox, etc. They feed upon a natural disseminator of disease and purveyor of filth. Another C.P.R. official has been appointed to the important post of Chief Engineer of the Government Railways of Canada. With the assistance of Mr. Gutelius, the twenty thousand dollar manager, he ought to have no difficulty in selecting the route for the Grand Trunk Pacific between Gagetown and St. John.

A syndicate of prominent Liberals in Montreal have purchased the Western newspaper of that city and will change the name to Daily Telegraph. The Herald which has held aloft the light of Liberalism for over a century some months ago fell into the hands of the enemy and has since been posing as independent.

A few days ago Premier Flemming gave out the statement in a newspaper interview that his government would see to it that the Valley Railway was extended to Grand Falls. The premier should lose no time in arranging for another ride in a private car. He seems to be out of touch with the situation.

Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., for York was an applicant for the office of

Solicitor General of Canada, but as he did not measure up to the standard, Mr. Arthur Meighen author of the gag resolution landed the prize. This is not Mr. Crockett's first disappointment.

Before issuing any more notices to property owners ordering them to make connection with the sewerage system under pain of prosecution, it might be a good plan for the City Board of Health to see to it that all of its own members have complied with the law in this respect.

Rev. J. W. Williams Preaches His Farewell Message After Two Years Labor--Personal Notes of Interest

Marysville, June 30th—Rev. J. W.
