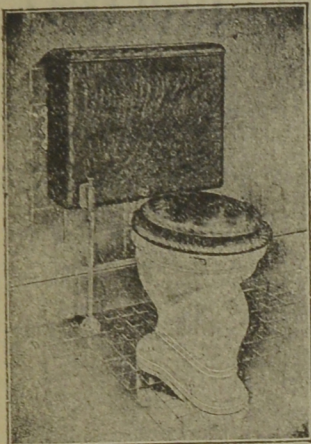


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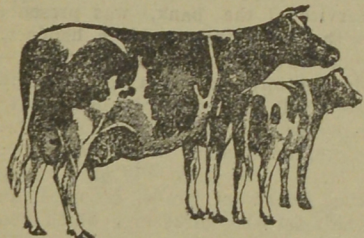

# Momentous Issue Should Be Settled by the People

**Straight Talk by the Liberal Chieftain on the Naval Question--  
Militant Liberalism Will Stoutly Resist Tory Effort to Force  
Closure on House**

Ottawa, April 7.—It is battle Gons are the Government's hope for compromise. Gone are the silly fictions in the Government press that Liberalism was "backing down." Gone is the Government's reliance on anything but "brute force" to prevent an election and "jam through" the Naval Bill regardless of argument or national and Imperial considerations.

Liberalism stands today precisely where it stood on the memorable night of Saturday, March 15th, when the Government abandoned the debate after an attempt to force a vote—an attempt only frustrated after stirring scenes which will live in Canadian Parliamentary history.

THE CHIEF IN FRONT

It is more than ever determined and has the advantage of the inspiring presence of "The Chief" again in perfect health and fighting form, to lead his forces in the struggle for the right determination of the vital issue as to whether Canadian national development within the Empire shall be along the lines of continued autonomous expansion or of retrogressive Colonial dependence and supervenience.

After over three weeks of grouping about for "some way out," after repeated visits to the office of the Liberal leader with suggestions for an understanding, and after finding further delay both fruitless and dangerous, Premier Borden again asked Parliament this afternoon to "make progress" with its contribution proposals.

BORDEN IS SUPPLIANT

It was in a decidedly conciliatory tone that he "respectfully submitted" to the Liberal Chief the request for a voluntary termination of the debate and the taking of a vote within a reasonable time limit.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's reply was prompt and unequivocal. He pointed out the fundamental importance of the issue before the House, both from the Canadian and the Imperial standpoint. He declared that the Opposition had a right to impress the significance of this issue upon Parliament and the country; that the Government was in duty bound to declare that its policy really signified both for the present and for the future; and that the Canadian people had a right to be consulted.

THE PREMIER IS HEDGING.

The Premier's reply was significant in that he avoided giving any answer as to what the permanent policy of the government on naval defence would be and also in that he obviously attempted to meet the rising tide of public opinion by changing his original stand against the practicability of a Canadian navy at all. He hedged throughout and even the "emergency" was almost abandoned for the time being. The reply to Sir Wilfrid's outspoken declaration that the debate must be continued was really made by Hon. Robert Rogers. The latter again wielded the big club. He announced that the government would not go to the people and that it would take steps to see that the King's government would be carried on by the majority in parliament as at present constituted. At the adjourning of the House Mr. Rogers, in the absence of the Premier, informed Sir Wilfrid that a Closure Bill will be introduced at once.

MADE LAME REPLIES.

Today the government made, through the Premier and the Minister of Public Works, a half-hearted attempt to reply to the arguments which have poured in unanswered

from the Liberal side for weeks past. They adduced not a single new argument in support of the bill. They spoke but briefly and wisely avoided detailed reference to the real issue before the House. Two more government speakers are still to come in a last effort to bolster up some sort of defence for the government's policy.

After that the reliance of the administration will be on closure and brute force. For both the Liberals are prepared and the week is certain to see some sensational developments

SPOKESMEN OF LIBERALISM.

On the Liberal side, in addition to the cogent and compelling summary of the issue given at the outset by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, there were also clear-cut and vigorous criticisms of the government position from Hon. Dr. Pugsley and Mr. E. M. Macdonald. The former emphasized the fact that under the bill Canada was being placed on a par with the Malay States. The latter reviewed the recent development of the British admiralty and the decision to station the proposed Canadian ships at Gibraltar instead of in the North Sea. The demand for further information as to the government's real policy on naval defence was pressed home again and again.

SIR WILFRID'S ELOQUENT PLEA.

The veteran Liberal chief was in magnificent form and repeatedly aroused his enthusiastic supporters to stirring outbursts of sustained cheering which reached remarkable scenes of acclaim, as the Old Man Eloquent, his voice keyed to resounding pitch, with eyes flashing and right arm extended, exclaimed:

"Shall Canadian naval development like all else Canadian, be upon the lines of autonomous organization within the empire, or shall it be on lines of imperial contribution? There is no middle course. This is the position that faces us, this is the problem to be solved, and to be solved now. Which shall it be? It will be as we determine now. This is the reason that we—every one of us—have presented such strenuous opposition to the government measure.

**RECIPROCITY CLAUSE**  
**IN NEW U. S. TARIFF**

Washington, April 7.—An attempt to widen the foreign market for American goods, and to encourage reciprocity treaties with all foreign nations is embodied in the new Tariff Bill introduced today, in a clause empowering the President to grant favors to any nation that gives mutual concessions to the United States.

The reciprocity clause takes the place of the penalty clause of the present tariff law by which it was sought to secure special concessions to the United States.

The new Tariff Bill proposes that the normal tariff rates shall be the maximum and that special rates shall be granted to countries that the normal tariff rates shall be the maximum and that special rates shall be granted to countries that shall enter into reciprocity treaties with the United States. In the present law the normal rates are the minimum.

The clause designed to open wider the markets for American exports throughout the world is as follows:

"That for the purpose of readjusting the present duties on imports into the United States, and as the same time to encourage the export trade of this country, the President of the United States is authorized and empowered to negotiate trade agreements with foreign nations wherein mutual concessions are made looking toward freer trade relations and further reciprocal expansion of trade and commerce."

Such reciprocity agreements under the new law, would have to be approved by Congress before becoming effective.

**TO HEAR RATE CASES**

Texarkana, Tex., April 9.—Great interest is being manifested here in the session tomorrow of the Interstate Commerce Commission when the Texarkana-Shreveport rate cases are to be heard. Texarkana claims that Shreveport should not be entitled to water competition rates as there is no longer any traffic on the Red River. The principle involved is interesting to many other places as evidenced by the number of letters received by the Chamber of Commerce from other States inquiring into the details of the case.
