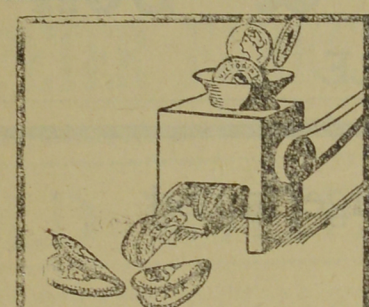

## HOW THE U. S. TARIFF WILL EFFECT CANADA

(Montreal Herald.)

Washington, April 7—While wheat flour is put on the free list, a duty of ten per cent. is imposed against countries which levy a duty on American flour. This will exclude flour from Canada and many other countries.

That the reduction of the duty on Canadian wheat from twenty-five to ten cents, as announced in the new Democratic tariff revision bill, presented today in the United States House will mean a tremendous raise in the export of this Canadian product, and a corresponding raise in prices to the Canadian consumer, was the opinion of Montreal produce men today.

"We will make a fortune," said one grain dealer, jubilant over the prospect of the great United States market being thrown open to the Canadian flour.

Paper manufacturers saw a stimulating effect on the manufacture in Canada, and the striking cuts in duties on cottons, woollens and agricultural products, including horses, cattle, sheep, wheat, barley, vegetables, hay, fruits, cheese, poultry, eggs and foodstuffs generally, would be very significant to the Eastern Townships.

Butler, it was claimed, would advance within a very few days locally, by the proposed reduction from six to three cents a pound. This cut, city dealers believed, would mean a tremendous increase in the export to the United States of Canadian butter which is already in heavy demand across the line.

Mr. H. W. Raphael:  
"The failure of the U. S. government to admit wheat duty free is a knock-down blow to those who killed Sir Wilfrid Laurier's reciprocity and held that when the Democrats came into power that Canada would get everything she was going to get under the reciprocity treaty."

### BID FOR CONSUMER.

"From a stock-raiser's point of view it is a good thing and also for the farmers," said Mr. W. W. McCuaig. "At the present the duty is practically prohibitive at twenty-five cents a bushel, and as they propose to reduce it to ten cents, it will be a good thing because the more markets they have, the better it is for farmers and producers but the consumer will not benefit, I am afraid."  
"It seems non-sensical," said Mr. Joseph Quintal, "why should they put flour on the free list and reduce wheat from two to ten cents a bushel. It is logical that more hay leaving here will send the market up but the farmer will benefit and not the consumers."

### GREAT THING FOR US.

"It is a wonderful thing and a great thing for this country," said Mr. F. A. Stude, "but if they had made wheat five cents per bushel instead of ten cents, it would have been better of course."  
"It will make the price of beef higher here if it ever goes through, and hit the consumer very hard. Why should they tax the miners' raw material and let flour go on the free list?" asked Mr. Edgar Judge.

### WILL BOOM PAPER MAKING.

"The effect of placing print paper on the free list would certainly have a stimulating effect on the manufacture of paper in Canada, but there are details of the bill which one would require to know before speaking with anything like certainty," said Mr. J. H. A. Acer of the Laurentide Paper Company.

### IMPETUS TO SHEEP MEN.

Mr. G. Victor Motherwell, who deals in woollens, said that the lifting of the tariff from wool by the States should without a doubt exert a powerful influence on the Canadian trade. In the first place, he said, Canada was not growing enough wool the sheep industry here was not what it ought to be. He said that prob-

ably if the tariff on wool were taken off by the United States there would be a very large exportation of wool to that country from Canada in time and the sheep-raising business would be given a decided impetus.

### GOOD THING FOR GRAIN.

"It would be a good thing for Canada," said Mr. James Carruthers the well-known grain exporter. "Although it seems rather strange that they have put flour on the free list and still keep a duty of ten cents per bushel on wheat, it will be a good thing for the manufacturers and farmers. The wheat will have to be ground here and then shipped and the farmers will have the offal, on which they feed the cattle."

### WON'T AFFECT COAL TRADE.

At the offices of the Hall Coal Company of Canada today, a representative of the company said that he did not believe that taking the duty off coal could have any marked influence on the Canadian coal trade. As a matter of fact, there was a large importation into Canada of American coal and the only points at which there was any exportation of coal to the United States was at the closer points, such as British Columbia and the State of Washington, and New Brunswick and Maine.

Ottawa, April 7—The belief at Ottawa that there will immediately be demands for reductions in the Canadian tariff, if the tariff framed by the Democrats passes the American House of Representatives and the Senate, it is certain that the west will insist upon agricultural implements being put upon the free list that they may be given access to the American manufacturers as the Canadian is given access to a hundred million people to the south.

It is stated by western representatives that the American reduction on wheat of twenty-five to ten cents a bushel will give Canada no return under present conditions as the present margin in price between Canadian and American wheat markets is just about ten cents a bushel. More American wheat may cross the line at present prices, but the American farmer gets no more for it. The only beneficiary will be the United States Treasury.

It is stated that putting flour on the American free list will be of some benefit to the Canadian workman and farmer but will not do much to reduce the cost of living in Canada.
