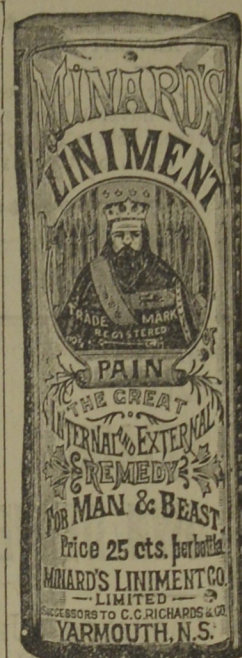
Notice of Assessment
