Many Broken Promises to Credit of Premier Borden

Promised to Purify the Public Life of the Country when in Opposition but has Done his Best to Prevent an Investigation of the Macdonald Election Scandal

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—From the day he enunciated his Halifax platform, on August 21, 1907, until his return to power on the 21st of September, 1911, Mr. R. L. Borden was greatly addicted to demanding purity in public life and the speedy investigation of any charges of political corruption, with prompt punishment of any parties found guilty, no matter to which side they belonged.

From the 10th day of October, 1911, when Mr. Borden became prime minister, he has systematically avoided doing anything to fulfill these demands and promises. He has not only neglected to demand any investigation into electoral corruption of the grossest kind but has exhibited a singular silence on the whole subject, in strange contrast to the loud but vague charges which he hurled against the Liberals when he was leader of the opposition. It is plain that Premier the Right Hon. R. L. Borden is a very different man from Mr. R. L. Borden, leader of the opposition, and is anxious to forget his previous utterances lest they should provoke reprisals.

In laying down his proposition to purify the political atmosphere, Mr. Borden said:

"The Conservative party has today an opportunity of performing a service to the country, greater than any it has rendered in the past. . . . It will chiefly consist in future conduct and management of electoral campaigns. Fight the ballot thief and the briber of the Liberal machine (not the Tory machine?) . . . FIGHT ALSO ANY INFLUENCE WITHIN YOUR OWN PARTY WHICH FAVORS CORRUPT METHODS. . . . Let your elections be conducted according to honorable, decent methods."

Mr. Borden then laid down as a permanent plank in his platform: "More effective provisions to punish bribery and fraud at elections, TO EXPEDITE THE HEARING OF ELECTION PETITIONS AND TO PREVENT COLLUSIVE ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE WITHDRAWAL OR COMPROMISE THEREOF, TO PROVIDE FOR A THOROUGH INVESTIGATION OF CORRUPT PRACTICES, AND IF NECESSARY APPOINT AN INDEPENDENT PROSECUTING OFFICER CHARGED WITH THAT DUTY."

With the elections of 1911 came the Hon. Robert Rogers and the coalition Nationalist ministry whose ideals were quite different to those claimed by Mr. Borden when he did not expect to be elected. Shortly after the general election came the infamous Macdonald by-election. This occurred on October 12, 1912. The campaign was engineered by the Hon. Robert Rogers, aided by a horde of Tory workers and a full election chest. It was won by methods that have been characterized as the most corrupt and violent ever known in Canada. Charges regarding it were made by responsible men, officers in the King's militia and members of parliament, and backed up by affidavits, which, if proved before the courts, would not merely have unseated Mr. Alex. Morrison, Premier Borden's candidate, but would have sent a whole battalion of Tory workers to the penitentiary, and proved a corrupt alliance between the Borden government at Ottawa, the Roblin government at Winnipeg and certain administrators of the law in Manitoba,

which would have spelt disgrace and ruin to those concerned. If not proven, these affidavits and statements would have rendered their makers liable to severe punishment. The story of false arrests, ill treatment of illegally secured prisoners, and the burlesque proceedings before Magistrate McKieken have resounded through the land to the shame of decent people.

Surely here was Mr. Borden's opportunity to enforce his lofty political promises. On October 18th, the week after the by-election, the country rang with the story of how the Rogers-Roblin gang won the campaign, and an election protest was lodged, backed by affidavits, charging serious crimes.

On November 5 the story of the stolen election was told in parliament by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Hon. Frank Oliver, the Opposition Leader, moving a vote of censure on such practices.

Did Mr. Borden make any move to "expedite the hearing of election petitions" or to "provide for a thorough investigation?" Not to any noticeable extent.

On the contrary, in parliament Premier Borden called upon his followers to vote down Sir Wilfrid

Laurier's motion of censure on "the Macdonald by-election corruption, and they rallied to a man to his support. In the courts, expert lawyers were secured to contest the election petition, by every device known to the expert. Objection after objection was taken, and fought inch by inch through to the Supreme Court of Canada, where they were finally thrown out a short time ago. Now the original protest is back again before the courts at Winnipeg, ready for a fresh series of Tory efforts to balk the law.

Premier Borden has calmly winked at every legal move to prevent an investigation of these cess-pis of Tory corruption. He has countenanced Alex. Morrison, the man who profited by them, and has welcomed his support as a hidebound party follower.

When his own followers are in difficulty, the policy of Mr. Borden has become—"to DELAY the hearing of election petitions" and "to PREVENT thorough investigations of corrupt practices." How long will the people of Canada tolerate such hypocrisy in public life as is revealed by the contrast of Mr. Borden, the Prime Minister, anxiously hiding the crooked work of his supporters?

PLAN ELOPEMENT, TRAGEDY ENSUES

New York, Aug. 11.—Thomas Savarese, nineteen years old, was approaching the home of Ralph Abbombanza, at No. 2909 West Fifteenth street, Coney Island, last night, in expectation of assisting Miss Carazeno Abbombanza, fifteen years old, out of a window as a part of their elopement arrangement when he was met by the angry father. Both drew pistols and opened fire. Both were wounded, probably fatally, and a woman on the other side of the street was shot through the neck.

Savarese went to Coney Island about six weeks ago and obtained employment in Steeplechase Park. He had his meals in Abbombanza's restaurant until a few days ago, when his credit was stopped until he had settled an account of \$20. The restaurant owner thought that would be the last he would hear from Savarese, but yesterday he learned that Savarese and his daughter had become fond of each other and that an elopement was to be the result. He was opposed to this.

The girl had told her closest friend of the proposed elopement. This friend had told her mother and her mother told Carazeno's parents. The result was that just at dusk last evening, when the girl was to let herself out of a side window, her father was pacing up and down the street with a revolver in his pocket. When Savarese arrived the father stepped from a building and demanded to know what he was doing there. The quarrel led to a blow and then there was a shot, quickly followed by others.

Savarese turned and ran down to Mermaid avenue and just as he reached the corner he fell. As Abbombanza came up to him the young man fired at his pursuer, who returned the fire and then fell. Both men jumped up

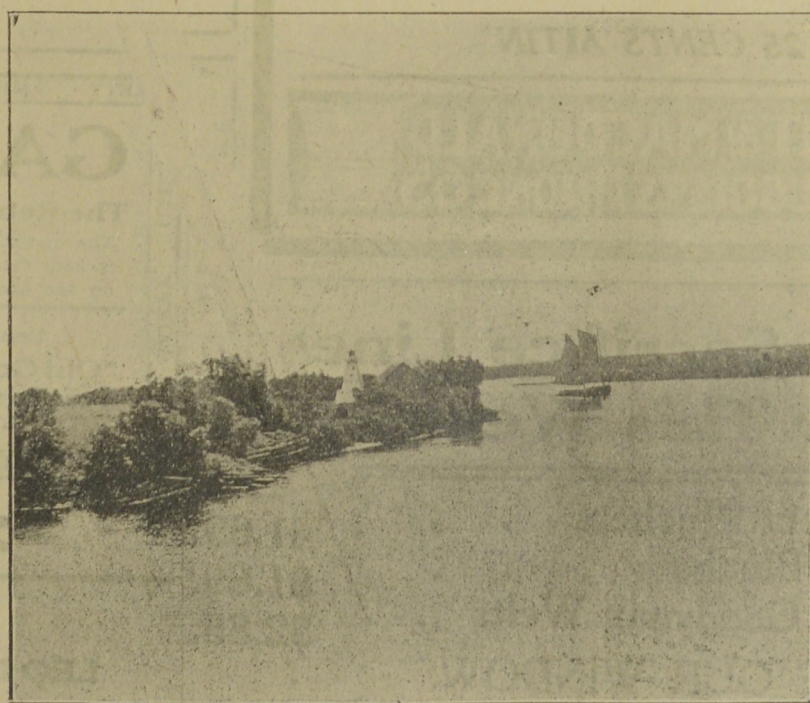
and several other shots were fired. One of these bullets sped across the street and penetrated the neck of Mrs. Jennie Resnik of No. 239 East 112d street, Manhattan.

When Policeman Euler arrived there were two men and a woman lying in the street. A great crowd quickly gathered and the police reserves were called to keep order.

Ambulances were called from the Coney Island Hospital and Drs. Friedman and Kaufman applied first aid to the three wounded persons and then sent them to the hospital. It was said that Mrs. Resnik had a good chance for recovery but that Abbombanza was shot in the left breast and Savarese in the right breast and that both probably would die.
