MOTORING PARTIES.

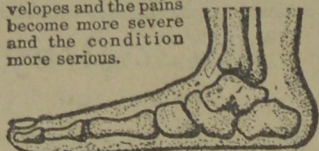

"FLAG" INCIDENT NOT BASED UPON CUSTOM OR FACT

U. S. Consul-General Young of Halifax Gives Decision on Matter in Communication to U.S. Consular Agent Heard

The "flag" incident, which arose last week when the United States yacht "Lasata" visited Fredericton, arriving in port with only the United States flag flying, has been referred to the U. S. Consul General at Halifax, and the local U. S. Consular agent, Mr. W. W. Heard, has received a communication from him, which shows that the objections raised by local people were based on neither custom nor fact.

Consul General, Evan E. Young, states in the communication that the action of the yacht was entirely correct. In explanation he continues as follows:

"It is customary for foreign men-of-war and registered merchant vessels, upon entering a foreign port, to fly not only their own native flag but also the flag of the country whose port they enter, but this does not apply to yachts.

This definite statement on the part of Consul General Evans shows that according to United States usage the flying of a foreign flag is entirely a matter of custom and that a private yacht like the "Lasata" is exempt even from that custom.

The "Lasata" on Saturday morning last, while returning to St. John met with a mishap at Ragged Point, one of her propellers coming in contact with a sunken log and being badly twisted and bent and the steel bearing being broken. The yacht proceeded to St. John using only one propeller.

YORK HOTEL TO BE TRANSFERRED TO NEW FIRM

George Camp Sells out Furnishings and Interest to Peter Woodworth of St. Stephen and Robt. McDonald

Mr. C. C. Camp, who has conducted the York Hotel for about a year and a half has disposed of his interests to Woodworth McDonald, who will take over the hotel in Saturday next. The new firm is composed of Mr. Peter Woodworth of St. Stephen, and Mr. Robert McDonald of this city.

Mr. Camp has sold the furnishings of the hotel and intends also to dispose of the coaches and horses used by him in connection with the hotel. The price was about \$1,500.

The York hotel for many years was known as the Dunphy house. About ten years ago it was rebuilt and improved by Mr. H. W. Estabrooks, and has done a good business since. Mr. Joseph Richards conducted the hotel previous to Mr. Camp taking it.

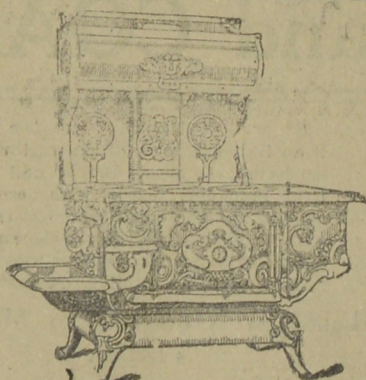
