TORONTO ACCLAIMS

LIBERAL CHIEFTAIN

(Continued from page one)
TORIES SOMERSAULT.

"And, sir, the most cogent reasons were given on that occasion why this course should be adopted. We were unanimous. The voice of the party was hushed. It was only the voice of the country that was heard. There was emulation between the two parties to find a policy for Canada from ocean to ocean. We discussed what was the best way to discharge our duty to the empire, whether it was a contribution or a naval force of our own."

"The most cogent reasons were given why we should not give a contribution but have a creation of our own. The reasons were as satisfactory in 1913 as they were in 1909. Why the proper policy to be followed today is the policy which would plant a root in the soil which will leave a residue and will create something of a sentiment in the country. NATIONALISTS SWAYED TORIES."

"I decided that it was the duty of the Canadian people to take up the matter of defence and at either shore to relieve Great Britain to that extent and took up our share of the burden. I took that stand, I have done it, and done it to my cost. The Nationalists denounced me. They said that we owed nothing to Great Britain, that we should not lift up a finger to help her. I am sorry to say that these appeals were listened to and the consequence was that in the last election we lost fifteen seats in the province."

"I regret nothing. If the ultimate end was party consideration and party advantage, then, Sir, there might be some cause of regret in my bosom when so many of my friends lost their seats. But party success is not the ultimate end. The assertion of principle, the performance of duty is of first consideration in that light I regret nothing."

"You know that Mr. Borden sacrificed to the Nationalists the principle of a Canadian navy at which one time he believed, and the Nationalists yielded to him the principle of the contribution which they never believed and this hybrid agreement

which he has given today is the policy of the government.

"Sir, it is that hybrid agreement that they have tried to force and cram down our throats, which they could not cram down our throats, which now is to be forced through parliament by closure. Call it by whatever name you please, the gag or the closure, or whatever it is, will only bring unpleasant recollections with it."

BORDEN'S OBSTRUCTION IN 1911

"When they brought it down I told them if they would say that our opposition to this measure has been obstruction, call it by any name you please, if obstruction be an offence, who is there on their side who will cast the first stone? Not Mr. Borden assuredly, because Mr. Borden obstructed himself in 1911."

"At St. John, New Brunswick, on Sept. 5, in speaking of the obstruction that had been placed against the reciprocity agreement, Mr. Borden said they boasted of having done so, and were right in doing so. Two days later, at Sussex, in the same province, he said that they would have been derelict in their duty if they had not followed that course. They obstructed the reciprocity agreement."

"I was then in office. I never said a word. I never uttered a complaint. I know what are the rights of the minority and knowing that, sometimes a minority has no other redress than to obstruct in order to secure justice, and I would never be one to deprive the minority of such a weapon as that."

"Our limit of obstruction, call it what you like, was an appeal to the people. The limit of the present Conservative government is an application of brute force. I have to admit that the gag will do its work, but I want to tell you that there will be an appeal to the people, come it sooner or later."

"The main question is the question which I pointed out, the question of naval defence. Sir, I think I may appear with some show of reason and of expectation to the decision which we have taken upon that question. It is based not upon the alleged decadence of Great Britain it is based upon the broader principle of the development of the young daughter nations."

KIPLING'S TRIBUTE TO LIBERALS

"Sir, these words were written by the most eminent of British poets of the day. They were published on the 23rd of April, 1897, when the Canadian government of that day, the Liberal government of that day, brought in the principle of British preference. (Cheers.)"

"Gentlemen, I have now performed my task. I go back to Ottawa this evening to take my share in the good fight, that whatever may be the conclusion in the Canadian parliament, shall never be concluded until it is fought before the Canadian people." When Sir Wilfrid Laurier resumed his seat there was a long demonstration of affection and approval.
