told who received the services," said A. O. Osborne.

"Yes," said Ald. Mitchell, "and there are items for the cartage of prisoners to the lock-up ordered to be paid to John H. McCollom and he did not perform the service."

"That's pretty far-fetched," replied the Mayor.

Ald. Clark's point of order came up and was dealt with as mentioned. His Worship was asked if he wanted the special officer's name.

"Not as a matter of curiosity, but as a matter of business," he replied. Ald. Weddall raised the point that C. T. A. funds should not be touched by the city except for the enforcement of the act. The City Clerk stated that the fund was still there although a balance was made each year.

Ald. Clark brought up the point that a grant had been voted the Local Improvement Association although it was not known who rendered the services.

His Worship said it did not bear on the case.

Ald. Clark then moved for a grant of \$100 for the Canada Temperance Act.

"The Police Commission now has that in hand, I think the motion is out of order," said Ald. Farrell.

His Worship thought so too.

"You just said that grants could be given without the individuals being named," said Ald. Clark.

"That's far fetched," replied the Mayor.

Earlier in the meeting His Worship and Ald. Mitchell had a clash, the alderman stating that had the item of \$17.50 been connected with anything but Canada Temperance Act the Mayor would not have held it up.

His Worship replied that Ald. Mitchell had no right to make such a statement.

This was adopted on motion of Mr. McMurray and a smile arose when the secretary declared that last year the date was changed and St. Dunstan's church was the only one to make a contribution. It is not claimed that this church should be exempt this year or that other churches make collections.

## TO PRINT ANNUAL REPORT.

The question of publication of the annual report being under consideration, the secretary stated that for the past seven years Mr. Willard Kitchen had assumed all liability in connection with the cost of same. This amounted to over \$100 a year. As Mr. Kitchen is about removing to the west, some members commenced figuring the cost when Mr. Whitehead relieved the situation by authorizing the treasurer to draw on him for all the expense. The thanks of the board were presented to Mr. Whitehead. Dr. Mullin, the matron and the secretary were appointed a committee to prepare the report.

The president made an extended report for the committee respecting some plans for increased accommodation in the hospital. They had made an examination of the premises and as they could not face any large expenditure they thought the only feasible thing that could be done under existing circumstances would be to procure an architect and arrange for the erection of an ell to the lower portion of the premises and this to include an up-to-date operating room Mr. McMurray and Ald. Farrell, the other members of the committee, supported the statement of the president. In answer to a question, Dr. Mullin favored an expression of opinion from the medical staff and agreed to ask the secretary to call a meeting of the staff and report.

A request for leave of absence was read from the matron who purposes taking a two months' trip to Europe. She has great confidence in the ability of the head nurse, Miss Wiggins, to conduct the work of the hospital in her absence.

After an interview with the matron the trustees granted her eight weeks' absence, but would not assume the responsibility of placing the hospital in charge of an undergraduate, although they are aware of Miss Wiggins' excellent qualifications.

The appointment of an acting matron is left with Dr. Mullin, Ald. Clark and Ald. Farrell.

ON THE NASHWAAK

The drive of the Partington Pulp & Paper Company on the Tay was hung up last night just below McNutt's Mills. The drive is not very large and with the rains which may be expected shortly can be brought out safely. The Napudogan and main Nashwaak drives are progressing well. The water is falling fast, however, that condition prevailing in all the streams in the central part of the province.

## BIG FIRE IN MONCTON

Moncton, May 6—About 1:30 this morning fire was discovered in Victoria rink, which was a blaze, and at 2 o'clock was totally destroyed. At a later hour the Baptist Brotherhood hall was on fire as well as the Baptist church and parsonage, while the Knights of Columbus hall, Methodist church and other buildings were threatened.

Cinders carried a long distance and set many roof fires, but these were extinguished by ladder and bucket bridges.

As the Victoria rink has not been occupied for some time the fire must have been of incendiary origin, or possibly set by tramps.

At 2:15 a.m. the Baptist church is a total loss and the Methodist church is on fire. Cinders flying in all directions and incipient fires are on dozens of roofs, but it is hoped to prevent further spread of flames. The loss will exceed \$50,000. The insurance cannot be learned.

The Baptist church, parsonage and Brotherhood hall are totally destroyed, as well as the Victoria rink, on which there is \$1,000 insurance. The Methodist church is badly scorched, the steeple of St. George's church is burned out, and five small buildings near the rink are destroyed. There is \$26,000 insurance on the Baptist church. The Knights of Columbus hall is slightly scorched.

At 3 o'clock the fire was said to be under control.

## THIRTY DAYS IN JAIL.

## TO WITHOLD PAY.

The chairman of the Police Commission has requested that a month's pay due Anthony Chapman as policeman be withheld as he still has uniform and equipment in his possession.

## RISTEEN FACTORY CLOSED.

The strike for shorter hours at the Risteen Woodworking Factory went on today and the factory is closed now. Supt. O'Neill stated to The Mail that the employees had been told this morning that the company would give an answer to their demands at 6 p.m. today. The men did not wait but walked out. "The lid is on now," said Mr. O'Neill to The Mail, "and it's going on tight."

A delegation composed of Mr. A. J. Gregory, K. C., and Mr. Luke Morrison appeared before the City Council in Committee last night on behalf of the Fredericton Gas-light Company and asked that permission be given the Company to erect a crib-wall in the river opposite the Flats and lay a line of six-inch pipe from that to the plant at the corner of University avenue and Shore street. The matter has been referred to the Water Committee but it is doubtful if the city has a right to give permission to erect the crib-wall. The Gas-light Company contemplates altering its plant and installing engines which demand large quantities of water for cooling purposes. Up to 400 gallons per minute will be required and it is not thought the city could supply such a quantity.

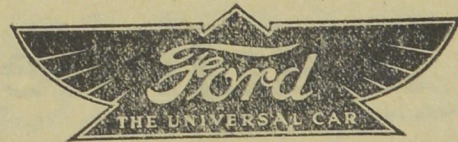
