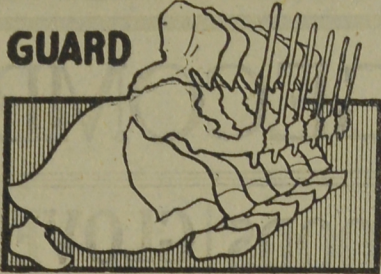

SEEDING IN THE WEST
IS THREE-FOURTHS DONE

Winnipeg, May 3—The Free Press' fortnightly crop report, based on telegraphic reports from 207 points in the three western Provinces, shows that seventy-five per cent. of the seeding is done, 114 points having reported 75 per cent. or more. The acreage in wheat is not increased over 1912, and there may be a slight decrease. This is regarded as a good sign, as farmers are apparently realizing the danger of late seeding and are devoting their attention to land that was prepared last year. Only three points report an actual need of rain. Wet snow has fallen very generally in Southern Alberta, about the only section where additional moisture was needed.

With reference to the seeding on stubble land without reworking, the figures would indicate that from 25 to 30 per cent. of the wheat crop had gone in on land in this condition. Very many points report the ground as too soft for the use of motor tractors.
The reports almost all declare that, while seeding is, on the whole, considerably later than in 1912, the condition of the ground is so good and there have been so few drawbacks that on the whole the seeding is actually as far in advance as it was on the corresponding date of last year, and with abetter general outlook for the season.

FOUR MEN BURNED
TO DEATH IN QUEBEC

Quebec, May 5—Four men lost their lives and two others were probably fatally injured in a fire at Residence No. 46, on the line of the National Transcontinental Railway last night. The victims were three brothers named Lacroix and La Tuque and Tamel, a time-keeper who was visiting the Lacroixs for the night. The names of the two injured men cannot be ascertained, as they are still unconscious and no one in the vicinity knows them.

Residency No. 45 is 230 miles from Quebec, and is occupied by the engineer of the section, while the building in which the men lost their lives was close by. The Lacroix brothers were rodmen and Tamel was a time-keeper from another portion of the line. The coroner of Three Rivers is on the ground waiting until the injured men regain consciousness to ascertain how the fire occurred.

FIVE HUNDRED COCK
FIGHTERS SURPRISED

North Attleboro, May 1—While fully 500 men were enjoying a cocking main near the Norfolk and Bristol County line in Plainville this afternoon in which large stakes were wagered, North Attleboro officers suddenly appeared on the scene and though the spectators bolted in all directions, succeeded in getting the names of several of the alleged principals, the numbers on about 45 automobiles and in capturing 24 live birds and one dead one.

As the party broke up the woods were set afire and the North Attleboro and Plainville fire companies were called out to battle with the blaze. Considerable woodland was burned over.

The raiding party consisted of Henry A. Perry of Mansfield, agent of the S. P. C. A.; Selectman Michael E. Vance, patrolman Jesse B. Stevens, Frank Toner, a moth inspector and special officer, and Supt. William Plattner of the Light Department.

Early this forenoon automobiles began to which through North Attleboro and vanish in the direction of Plainville. Nearly 100 were counted and each contained from four to seven men. Trains from Boston brought more delegations.

Shortly before noon a wagon containing crates arrived near a woody spot where the men were congregating.

About noon officer Jesse B. Stevens received information that a cocking main was to be pulled off. A little later Judge Byram was also apprised of the fact, and the judge notified Agent Perry of the S. P. C. A.

When the officers arrived at the scene Selectman Vance and Officer Toner, went to work securing the numbers from automobiles. Patrolman Stevens went across by another way and before reaching the pit says he was offered money to stay back. He was not to be bought and was soon at the pit.

The officer found several hundred men gathered around a 12-foot pit. As he neared the scene of battle everybody scrambled away, taking the birds from the pit. Officer Stevens fired two shots from his revolver and the other officer hurried to his assistance.

The police seized 24 birds and one dead bird. The birds seized were in crates and belonged to New Bedford Dighton, Fitchburg and Blackstone people, according to the tags.

No arrests were made tonight, but the police say that they will summon a large number of men into court, including many of those who were present and whose names will be learned through automobile numbers.

The officers broke up the main just after four of 10 battles scheduled had been pulled off.

The authorities stated this evening that it will be a few days before the men connected with the main can be summoned into court at Attleboro, owing to the fact that they live in distant places, both in this State and in Rhode Island. The complaints will contain in some cases more than one charge. Besides being present at a cocking main, a number will face charges of setting fire to the woods, of running their automobiles without licenses and of cruelty.

The police have several overcoats belonging to men who left the scene in a hurry.

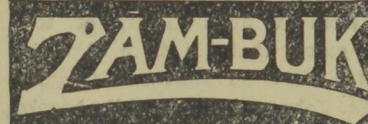

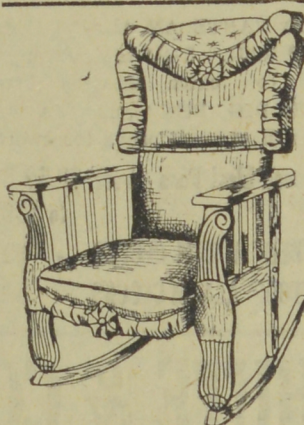
