DOUBLE DROWNING ON GREEN RIVER SATURDAY

Charles Cameron of Cross Creek and Albert Abernethy Lost Their Lives on Drive--Came Upset in Whirlpool

A double drowning occurred Saturday on Green River, by which two York County men lost their lives. The victims were Charles Cameron of Cross Creek, formerly of Boiestown and Albert Abernethy of Durham Bridge. The bodies were recovered and are expected to arrive in Fredericton tonight and will be taken to the respective homes of the deceased for interment.

The sad accident occurred on the drive of Randolph & Baker of which Wesley Clowater was boss. The two men according to reports received here took Mr. Clowater across the stream in a canoe and when returning were carried into a whirlpool which upset their craft, threw them into water and drowned them.

Charles Cameron, the elder of the two men was upwards of forty years of age and is survived by a wife and two children. Mrs. Cameron formerly was Miss Gilmour of Cross Creek. He was well known throughout the province. For some years he acted as cook for Henry Braithwaite the well known guide. The news of his sudden death has come as a blow to his many friends.

Albert Abernethy the other victim was but twenty-three years of age and was well known. He was in this city not a great while ago. Mr. and Mrs. Albert Abernethy of Durham Bridge are his parents. Other surviving relatives are one brother Robert of Durham Bridge, who is at the Waverley Hotel today and four sisters. The latter are Mrs. Snider of California, Mrs. Moses Allen of Penniac, Mrs. Roland Estey of Durham Bridge and Miss Dora at home. The young man had many friends in Fredericton who learned of his death with deep regret.
