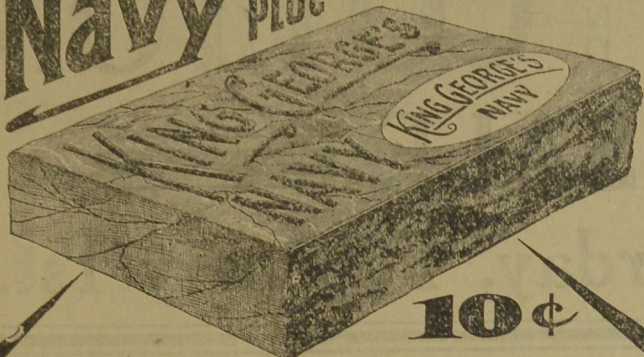

## ROYAL BANK TO BUILD SKY SCRAPER

Toronto is to have a twenty-story skyscraper—Canada's highest—on the northeast corner of King and Yonge streets towering three stories higher than the C.P.R. structure across the corner. It is to be the Royal Bank building, and it will be 250 feet in height.

The skyscraper is to cost \$2,400,000 and building, and to replace the present James building. It will have a frontage of 112 feet on Yonge street and 81 feet on King Street.

Messrs. Ross & Macdonald, architects, of Montreal and Toronto have prepared the plans and the illustration of the building printed above. Work will be commenced within the next two or three months.

The plans provide the following accommodation: On the ground floor at street level, there will be offices for bankers or similar interests. On the next or principal floor the whole area will be leased to the Royal Bank of Canada. The design and plan of the banking chamber provides for the main entrance from King street.

The present plans show an arrangement providing four large offices, giving a total area on each floor of about 9,000 square feet, or a total area on the office floors of 162,000 square feet. On each floor ample lavatory accommodation will be provided, also a capacious vault. Safe-deposit vaults will also be placed in the basement for rental to tenants and others requiring them.

The building will be constructed with skeleton steel frame, terra cotta fire proofing for floors, partitions and furring of exterior walls. The exterior will be faced with Indian limestone, except the base which will be grey granite. All exterior doors and the windows throughout are to be of metal. The finish of floors and walls in the entrance halls and corridors will be of marble. The wood finish throughout will be mahogany, except the floors of offices on floors above the banking premises. The banking chamber will be finished in marble in floors and trim throughout. It is said that the Royal Bank of Canada will build a big banking house on the site of the Mechanics' Institute here next summer.

## IRISH PROTESTANTS ARE STRONG FOR HOME RULE

### Great Meeting Held in London to Protest Against Attempts to Arouse Religious Bitterness--Notable Speeches by Sir A. Conan Doyle and George Bernard Shaw

A remarkable meeting of Irish Protestant Home Rulers, was held in the Memorial Hall, Farringdon street, London, recently, "to protest against the speeches and actions of a section of Ulster Protestants during the last few months, by which religious bitterness has been greatly accentuated in Northeast Ulster."

"We fear that if we remain inactive," the promoters of the meeting added in a circular, "the impression may get abroad that the Orange Lodges, the Unionist Clubs and the Unionist clergy who have been so persistently agitating against Home Rule truly represent the opinion of Irish Protestantism."

It has been decided to appeal to Protestant Irishmen throughout the country to join a movement with this object, and meetings will be held in various towns. The Executive Committee, which includes several Protestant clergymen, express their "strong detestation of the efforts which have been made at Northeast Ulster to drag the cause of religion into political controversy. We have heard with pain the deplorable results which have followed in Belfast where our fellow countrymen have been subjected to cruel persecution and grievous bodily harm." They add that their personal experience proves that there is no shadow of foundation for the charges of intolerance which have been made against "our brothers of the Roman Catholic Church. We are therefore anxious to do all in our power to reassure the members of our faith that self-government is the first and only possible step to secure peace and harmony among Irishmen of all creeds. The empire rests upon Home Rule, and it is because we want to see a united Ireland taking its proper place within the empire that we desire to make the strongest possible protest against those who are seeking to drive a sectarian wedge between Irishmen."

The meeting roused great interest, and it was over-crowded. The speakers included Mr. Bernard Shaw, Mr. Stephen Gwynn, M.P.; Sir A. Conan Doyle, Canon Courtenay Moore, The O'Mahoney and Mrs. Sophie Bryant. The meeting was widely representative of Irish and English opinion. Among those on the platform were Lady Lawrence, Sir John Mackenzie, Sir Thomas Pile, Mrs. Lilley, Captain Donelan, M.P.; Mr. C. Annan Pryce, M.P.; Mr. W. Abraham, M.P.; Mr. S. Young, M.P.; Professor J. H. Langford, the Rev. James Deummond (Oxford), Mr. Jamieson Davies (ex-High Sheriff of Wexford), Major General Sir Alfred Turner, and Mr. W. A. Doran of Ardee. Among those who wrote expressing their sympathy were Lord Dunraven, Mr. T. W. Russell, Lord Glendinning, Professor Sir W. F. Barrett, and the Rev. W. Crawford (ex-President of the Irish Wesleyan Methodist Conference.) A message was read from the Ulster Liberal Association, representing thousands of Ulster Protestants, and expressing full sympathy with the object of the meeting and "its abhorrence of the methods employed by fellow-Unionists and assuring the British electorate that the grant of self-government, so far from endangering Protestantism in Ireland, will further the spread of mutual toleration and trust among all creeds in the country." All the letters from prominent Irish Protestants were emphatic in declaring that Protestants would have nothing to fear under Home Rule and that the attitude of Irish Protestantism has been misrepresented.

Mr. Thomas Lough, M.P., who presided said that the meeting was a protest against dragging religion into political controversy. The Protestants who had lived in those districts where they were in a great minority had had it ground "into them by the stern discipline of necessity that it was possible to live without the sacrifice of any principle in perfect peace when surrounded by neighbors whose ideas of life and faith were quite different from their own. He admired the great and heroic qualities of the Protestants of the north-east counties, but there was this great difficulty between them and the Protestants of the provinces, namely that they were always a majority, and had never learned how to live as part of a minority. They lived as in a fortress, and the Protestants of the South had solved the difficulties by experience. In this great crisis of Irish history Ireland wanted the service of all her sons, and they are making an earnest appeal to all parties to unite with them. In the Imperial interests of Ireland Protestants must rally to

her support. Apart from religion there was scarcely any strife amongst Irishmen. Down at Westminster he had to sit opposite men from Northeast Ulster who were always belittling their own country, which he thought was one of the meanest and most pitiable spectacles in the world. (Cheers.) Dismissing the bill he said that he would have been glad to have seen proportional representation to which they were numerically entitled. Indeed, considering the great services of the Protestants of the provinces in Ireland he thought that they might have been given a little more representation than that to which they were strictly entitled.

### GROUNDLESS APPREHENSION

The Rev. Canon Lilley moved a resolution expressing the opinion that the apprehension of those in Northeast Ulster that they may suffer in consequence of Home Rule are groundless. Canon Lilley expressed pressed the conscientious and reasonable conviction that fears of religious persecution were without foundation. In these days he said open religious persecution were inconceivable in any civilized community. Was it possible that any government, even if it was stupid or criminal enough to wish to do so, could possibly interfere with or hamper in the slightest degree the industrial development of one particular section of population? Indirect forms of persecution were, owing to the conditions of life in the North-east, quite impossible. If persecution came, it must come naked and ashamed, and he refused to discuss a proposal so absurd in itself and so dishonorable to those who might undertake it. "Ulster," he said "is hag-ridden by the prejudices of a bygone time. It still prefers to live among the self-created fears of the times of the wars of persecution."

The O'Mahoney seconded the motion in the absence of Mr. Yeats, who telegraphed from Dublin that he was delayed by a railway accident. The O'Mahoney said that it was not the fault of the Roman Catholics of the north of Ireland that religious bitterness had been stirred up. Mr. Redmond had opened the campaign in a spirit of conciliation to the Protestants, but his offers of co-operation for Ireland's good were met with an outbreak of intolerance by leading Protestants and supported by Sir Edward Carson "and his poor dupes." Could anything be more pitiable, he asked, than to find a Church calling itself the Church of Ireland saying that its aspirations and traditions were wholly different from those of the majority of the people to whom it ministered.

### SIR A. CONAN DOYLE

Sir A. Conan Doyle proposed the next resolution, which said that the restoration of self-government to Ireland will revive the prosperity, promote the unity, and secure the loyalty of Irishmen in Ireland and throughout the world, "results which have attended the granting of self-government in every community of the British Empire." He said, that they had very good reason for the belief that the Roman Catholics of Ireland would give fair play to the Protestants. The Church of Rome had never in Ireland at any time been a persecuting Church. They knew that here were many countries in Europe and solved. In such mixed countries as Bavaria and Saxony, where there was a majority of Catholics, none the less the Protestants and Nonconformists were in no way molested. Why, then, should they adopt different tactics in Ireland, especially as there was in Ireland a minority which was particularly well able to take care of itself? There was something very odious in this stirring up of religious bigotry. The world had got past all that, and it was deplorable to every mind to find that that which should be the most beautiful and sacred thing in the world should be turned into a means of invective and a cause of bad feeling. Old Ireland was always their wished to see would turn its looking back, but the young Ireland they wished to see would turn its back on the darkness and face the

rising sun. He became a Home Ruler because he went through a long stage of evolution, until at length he convinced himself that the Home Rule view had been right from the beginning. He was a Home Ruler because he was an Imperialist. There was a broad and a narrow patriotism, and in this case they went together. A great empire was one which was made up of contented States, and as an Imperialist he desired not only closer union between the islands but throughout the whole English-speaking world. When the Irish race was it carried with it naturally the seeds of discontent, which remained to some extent in our colonies and very deeply in the United States. Surely it was wise statesmanship to try for the sake of the Empire to do away with the evil. The other party had never offered any alternative. Were we to sink back again to the old state of things, of alternate coercion and agitation, 80 members at Westminster who did not sympathise with the Empire and a discontented people across the water? They could not be too patient, generous and long-suffering towards their fellow-countrymen of Ulster. They must hold out the open hand, even if the closed fist was given in return. Time and the natural infiltration of national ideas was working in their favour. A meeting at which so many shades of Irish thought were united in protesting against religious intolerance was promising for the future. Ireland needed moderation. The resolution was carried.

### MR. BERNARD SHAW

Mr. Bernard Shaw moved a resolution expressing the desire to see the end of racial and religious feuds in Ireland, and Irishmen of all creeds and classes working together for the common good. He said his father and mother were Protestants, the intensity of whose faith would have been described in his time by a large number of his fellow-countrymen as "sanguinary Protestantism." He had an Irish Catholic nurse, and she never put him to bed without sprinkling him with holy water.—(Loud laughter.) "Why in the name of common decency do you laugh?" Mr. Shaw asked indignantly. "I cannot imagine anything more touching than this picture of an Irish Catholic woman sprinkling holy water on a little Protestant infant whose parents under-paid her grossly.—(More laughter.) The fact that you think it amusing that a poor Irishwoman is underpaid suggests the reason why Ireland is about a century behind the place in history she ought to occupy. The fact I have told you disposes completely of any validity in the idea that between Irish Catholics and Irish Protestants there could be any deep-seated animosity." He had been a political speaker for the last 30 years, but this was the first time he had made a speech on Home Rule. In his career as a political agitator he had never seen an English audience or constituency which cared a rap about Home Rule.

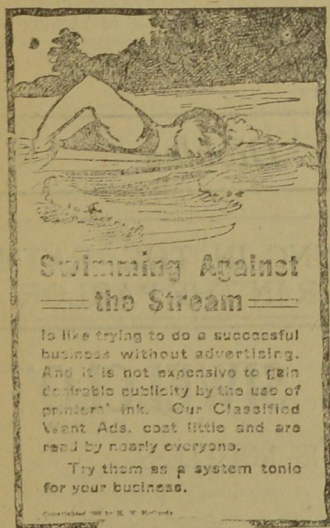

Guy Cropley is working for William Gould who is lumbering at home this winter. Mrs. Guy boards with the family.

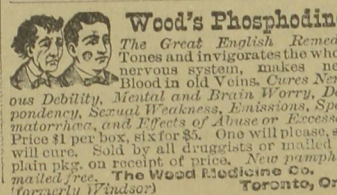
Mr. and Mrs. George Boone made a trip across the Lake to Danforth one day last week.
