witness stated that the account at the bank was kept in his own name. Witness only had the right to cheque against that account. Drafts made by witness on Arscott & Co. were placed to his own credit. One and possibly more made by Lavine were placed to credit of witness.

"That will be checked off when the civil suit which has been so much advertised, begins," said the witness. Lavine got money to buy hides in cheques and cash from the witness. There never was a partnership between witness and Lavine. Witness kept a book off a book kept by Lavine. That book did not show the standing between Lavine and himself but contained a statement of the quantity of hides Lavine bought. The account of S. Arscott & Co., witness presumed, were kept in his own name. Accounts were rendered in his name.

Witness never wrote Arscott & Co. that Lavine was behind each month to the extent of \$200. He never tried to sell out his share in the business with Lavine to a man named Rapoport. Witness could not say that the hides were insured in the joint name of McLellan and Lavine. He knew a policy was issued but he did not know in whose name.

Witness—"You're fishing now for your civil suit."

Mr. Guthrie—"I guess that is why you came on the stand today."

Witness—"You go ahead and ask the questions and I'll answer them."

Mr. Guthrie asked if Richard Arscott's statement that if the transaction had started November 28 the amount to the credit of Lavine would have been the difference between \$6,270.75 and \$2,800, was correct.

Witness—"It would have been if Lavine had paid me the money due me on November 28 for Arscott & Co."

Mr. Hughes objected to the above question but the magistrate allowed it, stating that there was much evidence that would be disregarded in deciding whether the case should go up for trial or not.

Mr. Guthrie—"Did Arscott & Co. ever accept the terms offered them by you?"

Mr. Hughes—"Don't answer that."

Magistrate—"I don't see that that has anything to do with the case."

Mr. Guthrie—"That letter was produced in evidence."

Magistrate—"It has nothing to do with the case."

Mr. Guthrie—"I admit that."

Magistrate—"Then it is hardly worth while asking questions about it."

Mr. Guthrie—"Then why was Mr. McLellan put on the stand this time?"

Witness—"To answer the insinuations made against me by you."

Mr. Guthrie—"I thought Lavine was the accused. It appears that Mr. McLellan is here to clear himself. I will not ask any more questions now that I see why he is here."

Adjournment was then made until 2.30 when argument was heard.

impossible to construct a practicable fishway in a dam of the height that this one will be that prevents amounts to but little.

"We that live on the Penobscot river have seen the effect of dams and river obstructions to fishing. Salmon fishing on the Penobscot used to be quite an industry but now the fishermen find that it is hardly worth while to put their nets on their weirs.

"The Bay of Fundy salmon are the finest in the world. They are the last remnants of the Atlantic River salmon with the exception of a few that still come into the Penobscot. On the north shore of New Brunswick the Bay of Chaleur salmon are found and while they are larger fish and as gamey as the Atlantic salmon they are coarser and not nearly so desirable. If the Bay of Fundy fish are prevented from reaching their spawning beds on the Tobique they will go elsewhere and the loss which will result will be large.

While it is difficult to determine the value of the salmon to the St. John valley, I have reached the conclusion that it means at least \$80,000 annually to that section of the fishing industry in the harbor of the St. John is included.

ings, etc., are not to be at a height of less than eight feet from the sidewalk. All these provisions are violated at the present time and it was decided to put all provisions into effect after November 1 next, that date being selected in order to give all an opportunity to make necessary alterations to their premises.

DOG BYLAW.

The bylaw relating to dogs was considered and altered to some extent. The annual tax for a dog was fixed at one dollar and for a bitch at three dollars. Licenses for all dogs and bitches are to be taken out prior to August 1. Neglect to take out license will be followed by an increase of one dollar in the license fee for each month up to October 1. Dogs are not to run on the streets without being under control.

As a matter of fact, the attorney general's department had no official report of the crime when a Star representative called this morning. Later, it was announced from the department that reports from private sources had arrived concerning the crime. The reports were somewhat contradictory in nature, but as a result, members of the provincial police force had been despatched to the scene, and the department expects to receive an official report regarding the crime tomorrow morning.

The spirit of revenge in Turkey will be stronger and deeper than that left in France over the loss of Alsace-Lorraine forty-two years ago.
