**MONUMENT UNVEILED**

and laurel, suggesting the new era inaugurated in Cuba through the Spanish war. A low fountain basin extends toward the circle from this side of the monument, approached by three broad steps forming a stylobato.

The corresponding group on the side facing the park is post-bellum in motif—Justice, having intrusted her sword to the Genius of War, receives it again at his hands, while history records its deeds. The inscription over this group reads as follows: "To the freemen who died in the war with Spain that others might be free."

The pylon is crowned by a group representing Columbia triumphant, drawn in a sea car by three plunging horses. This group is in bronze, cast from guns recovered from the sunken Maine, and is heavily gilded. The group is seventeen feet high, making the monument fifty-seven feet in height. All the other sculptures are of Knoxville marble. In panels on the lateral faces of the shaft are inscribed the names of those to whom the monument is dedicated.

At either side of the pylon and separated from it by two park roads are two entrances formed by four garden houses of the type familiar in the great parks abroad. Each pair of houses constitutes a gateway. There is one of those gates on each side of the footpaths and partially connected by a low wall and with seats facing the circle. The pylon itself and the houses and the wall are of Tennessee marble, with a granite base of a similar shade of color.

to issue bonds to erect such a building and it may be done within a comparatively short time. The matter of building a hose-station has a bearing on the question as it has been proposed to combine a central fire-station with a police building but if two separate fire stations are built a separate police building will be necessary.

**NEW TIME-TABLE**

The C.P.R. summer time-table goes into effect on Sunday and trains leaving and arriving at Fredericton after the lay will do on the new schedule. Eastern standard time which is one hour slower than Atlantic standard time which is recognized all over New Brunswick is adopted under the new time-table for convenience in operation. There is little actual change in time however. The early train for St. John will leave ten minutes earlier and the evening train to connect with the west-bound Montreal and Boston trains ten minutes later. The morning train from St. John will arrive ten minutes later and that from the west fifteen minutes later. The late train from Boston will arrive ten minutes later. On the G. B. Branch the morning train will leave half-an-hour later and the night train will arrive five minutes earlier.

**BUSINESS DIFFICULTY.**

Two men employed by Chas. K. Harris & Co., a vaudeville troupe performing at the Arctic Rink, were capiased last night by two men named Fuller and Jamieson, who had joined the show in Nova Scotia. Mr. P. A. Guthrie acted for them and a compromise was effected with the owners of the troupe, who are Charles K. Harris and Edward Angers. This morning the two partners got out capias against Fuller and Jamieson for money said to be owing and overlooked when the settlement was made last night. However, when the authorities looked for the men it was learned they had left the city last night or early this morning.

**THE NEW JUDGESHIP**

Baxter, K.C., M.P.P. will be taken into the provincial government as attorney general. Mr. M. G. Teed, K.C., is also mentioned but the boom for Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., is not observable.

for this measure.

"In no shape or form was this the case," said he. "It was carefully hidden from the electors and no mention of it was made by the leader of the government or the leader of the opposition in their manifestos. It is true that Bourassa, Pelletier, Blondin, Coderre, Sevigny and their friends talked navy in the Province of Quebec, but the verdict of that province was against it."

Senator Cloran declared that if the interests which were seeking to force the bill on the country had only kept in touch with public sentiment they would realize that the measure was an object of derision in Canada, an object of contempt in England, and a laughing stock of the world. It was the result of the Conservative alliance with allies like the senator from Nipissing, the member for Algoma, the Nantels, the Pelletiers and the Blondins.

"We have popes, moderators, clergymen, ministers, priests and bishops praying for peace," declared Senator Cloran, "and politicians urging us to prepare for war. For whom are the politicians talking? For the selfish interests who would exploit the empire and the lives of its citizens for their own monetary advantage. Canada has no more need of a navy than the sun has need of a star to give it light."

But before taking his leave he desired to make a statement regarding his parcels post bill, in view of the enquiries Hon. Mr. Lemieux had made as to whether it was the intention to bring down the measure this session or not. Mr. Pelletier said he was prepared to go ahead with the bill, providing the opposition would assure that it would not be contested. He would not submit it this session if it were likely to precipitate a lengthy controversy.

"We will have to read the bill first," said Hon. Mr. Lemieux.

Earlier in the evening the question of salaries paid rural postmasters was discussed. J. H. Sinclair asked the minister if the salaries of these officials would be increased and urged that such action be taken.

Hon. Mr. Pelletier said that some increases would probably be made in the near future. The department had not as yet decided just what should be done.

**BETTER CONDITIONS FOR LETTER CARRIERS**

Mr. Carrol, of Cape Breton, cited the fact that the federation of letter carriers had petitioned for an eight hour day, pay while off duty through illness, a weekly half-holiday in summer, increased salary and lighter mail consignment to carry. Sometimes, he said they were compelled to carry from 90 to 150 pound. Mr. Pelletier said the petition had been received and the eight hour rule was now in vogue and was being observed except in the instances of late trains. The local postmaster was supposed to regulate the load which a man should take out and the men received sick pay in every case when the department had been informed. His officers, he said had been instructed to report upon the advisability of instituting the summer half holiday.

The commons put through in short order four millions in votes for canal estimates, including an item of \$2,000,000 for the new Welland Canal. On the latter item, Hon. Frank Cochrane said the locks in the new canal would be 800 feet long by 80 feet wide. There would be a depth of 30 feet on the sill at the start, but provision would be made for increasing later the draft to 35 feet if necessary. The estimate cost of the whole work was \$50,000,000 and it was hoped the project would be completed in five years. Contracts would be called for at once for the first section of the work, beginning at the Lake Ontario end.

**PRISONER LIBERATED.**

A prisoner sent to jail yesterday afternoon for drunkenness after a charge of theft against him had been dropped, was liberated last night on the order of the Police Magistrate, a physician stating that the man, whom he examined in jail, was seriously ill.

**U. N. B. SENATE MEETING**

The Senate of the University of New Brunswick is to meet at St. John, Thursday, June 5, to receive the report of Chancellor Jones on an appointment to the chair of English. The special committee on increases in salary for members of the faculty will also report. The committee is composed of Dr. W. C. Crockett, Dr. H. S. Bridges and Hon. W. C. H. Grimmer.

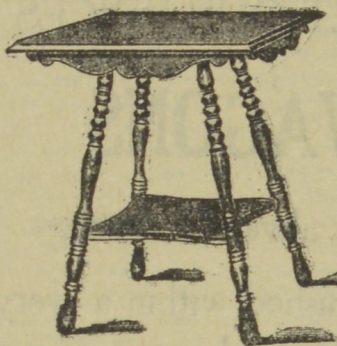

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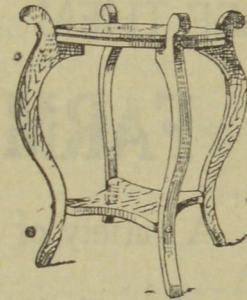
