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FORWARD FREDERICTON

The members of the Fredericton Board of Trade are to be congratulated upon the great success of their third annual banquet held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall last evening. It was a notable and epoch making event in the history of the city and the committee who had charge of the arrangements have every reason to be proud of the result of their labors.

Those who gathered around the festive board included merchants, manufacturers, bankers, professional men and mechanics and they were there with a common purpose in view—to discuss ways and means for making Fredericton a greater and a grander city. There was a preponderance of young men in the list and it was pleasing to note that all manifested the keenest interest throughout.

The program while necessarily somewhat lengthy had been carefully prepared and was carried out without a hitch. Mr. John T. Jennings the indefatigable president of the Board, who led off in the speech-making, aroused the enthusiasm of the gathering by his splendid optimism. The representatives of the city council who followed him, declared that as civic rulers they were ready to cooperate heartily with the Board of Trade in the booster campaign which had been inaugurated.

Mr. H. P. Timmerman the representative of the C. P. R., who is doing much to promote industrial prosperity in New Brunswick, gave a very practical address which delighted his hearers. The speeches of Chancellor Jones, Mr. J. D. Palmer, J. W. McCready, Judge Wilson, C. Fred Chestnut and Mr. R. W. McLellan were hopeful and optimistic and they had no difficulty in convincing all of their unbounded faith in the future of Fredericton and New Brunswick.

The presence of Mr. J. M. Robinson, the energetic president of the St. John Board of Trade, and Mr. H. V. Chase, who has been engaged by that body to conduct a reorganization campaign, lent additional interest to the proceedings. They brought with them a message of good cheer from the winter port, and assured the Board of St. John's hearty cooperation in the forward movement for New Brunswick. The kindness of these gentlemen in coming to Fredericton at considerable personal inconvenience on purpose to attend the banquet is greatly appreciated by the local Board of Trade.

Last night's banquet was the initial step of an energetic campaign to be carried by the members of the Board of Trade. In this great work the active co-operation of every citizen is urgently needed. As was ably pointed out by the different speakers, the natural advantages of Fredericton are unsurpassed. We have a most beautiful city—a city which is a source of wonder and admiration to all visitors. The railways now in course of construction will add enormously to its advantages as a distributing and industrial centre. We have splendid educational institutions and their door are wide open to rich and poor alike. There is no city or town in the maritime provinces that can hold a candle to Fredericton as a place of residence. While we possess all these advantages we have got to make the fact known to the world. And what is more important we have got to show the outside public that we have an abiding faith in the future of our city. A good start has already been made along this line but it must be followed up by well directed and aggressive team work. It is useless to spend time grumbling over the mistakes of the past; it is the future we must look to. Opportunity is now knocking at our door and it is up to all good citizens to sink any minor differences they may have and work together for the common good. While we have reason to be proud of the men who have gone to other lands and won fame and fortune we have more reason to be proud of the men who

have remained at home, and made good in face of discouragements. Fredericton has a number of this kind and they are taking the laboring oar in the present forward movement and should have the support to which they are entitled. The very best asset any city or town possesses, is its own citizens. The responsibility of making this a bigger and better city rests upon their shoulders. In this great work every man has a duty to perform, and there must be no shirking. Forward, Fredericton should be the watchword of every loyal citizen during the year 1913.

SOMETHING ABOUT HIGH COST OF LIVING

One cannot go among the poor very much without hearing more or less circumstantial stories of how the unscrupulous undertaker fleeces them. In fact, nothing less than ghoulism are some of the stories that are related to show how pressure is brought to bear on distracted people to cause them excessive expense in burying their dead.

A dying husband begged his wife that she give him only a plain funeral. She promised; but when the undertaker came the relatives were present. As soon as she said she wanted only a modest funeral the undertaker sneered: "Is that all you thought of your husband to bury him like that?" She was shamed into spending not only more than she had promised, but more than the insurance he had asked her to save.

"This is the last thing you can do for your wife," one undertaker urged a poor porter, "and you don't want to be haunted by the thought that you were mean." Then the crafty tradesman in death pointed to the children and cruelly wrung the man's heart by adding: "If you don't do the right thing by their mother they will curse you to their dying day." It is hardly necessary to say that this distracted man demonstrated his love for the dead wife and mother by having a funeral which condemned the children to actual hunger and want.

Another undertaker refused to go to Bellevue for the body of a child until the mother gave him a golden crucifix, an heirloom, as security. Such cases could be multiplied if it were of any use. Mr. Barrows remarks that this is not the usual thing. But it is so common among the very poor as to be almost proverbial. That is not to say that all undertakers, or even a majority of them, are rogues. They are precisely like every other body of men—some honest, some unscrupulous, charging "all that the traffic will bear."

Once having been accepted, the vulture undertaker has the family at his mercy. For instance, in one case a chattel mortgage on all the household furniture was demanded. The family refused indignantly. But when they approached a second undertaker they found he would not take the case because the code of ethics forbade him. 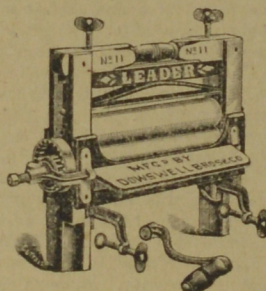

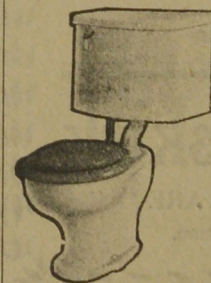
