MARRIED TODAY

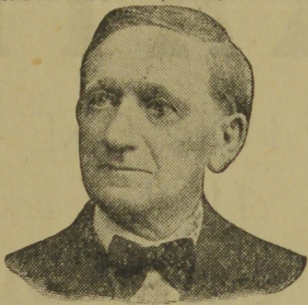

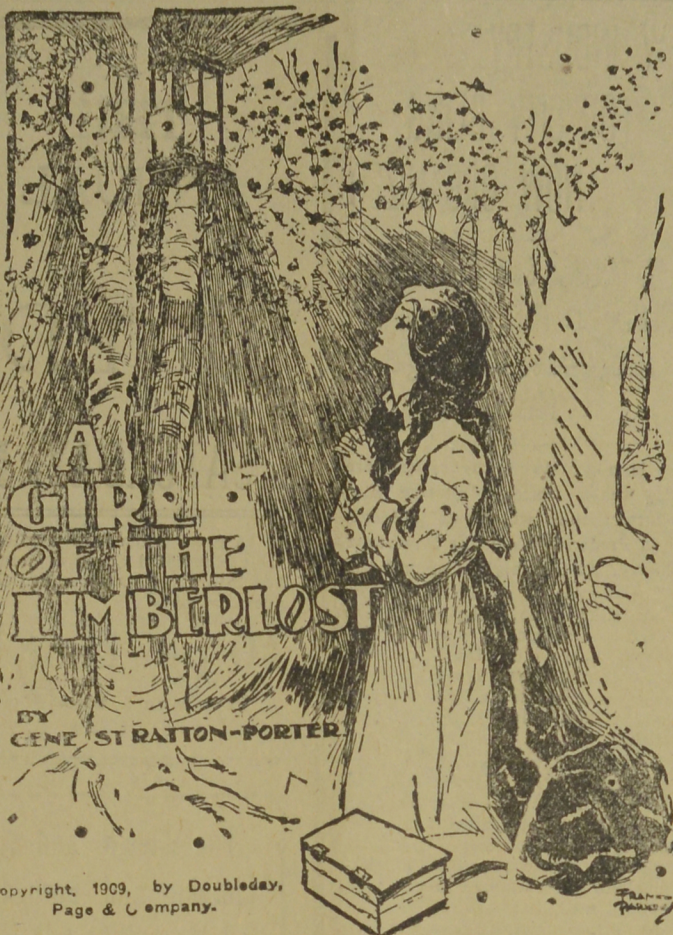

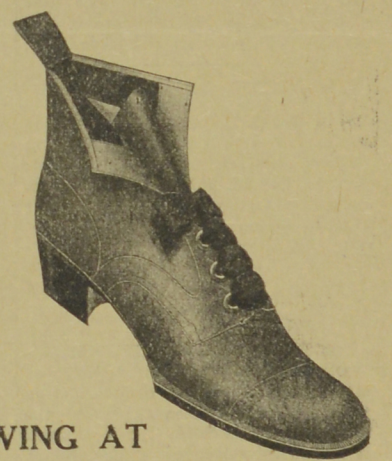

WOMAN DIED OF
NATURAL CAUSES

Montreal, Jan. 28—The Montreal Star publishes the following tonight:

Riviere du Loup, Que., Jan. 28—"Died of tuberculosis caused by excessive use of alcohol," is the conclusion of Drs. Pareau and Pettigrew who attended the woman Desjardins, who died ten days ago, in the Lock Hospital, kept by the Sisters of Providence.

The reputation of the deceased was none to good and stories told about her years ago was unearthed and enlarged to the extent that mention of crime was made.

The local police, who have investigated the cause, do not find the remotest cause for a crime in all the story, and the physicians also state emphatically that death was caused by tuberculosis only, and that no trace of violence were found on the body of the woman, either before or after her death.

The woman was suffering from tuberculosis for a long while and her death was absolutely natural.

Several people are indignant at the circulation of the story of a crime, which seems to have originated in Quebec. It is not true that the attorney general has sent provincial detectives here.
