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### LIBERALISM DEFINED

Montreal's new Liberal paper, The Daily Telegraph and Witness, made its appearance on Saturday. It is published by the Telegraph Publishing Company and is the successor of The Witness, the plant and goodwill of which the company has acquired. The manager is Mr. C. Gordonsmith, a life long Liberal who was for many years a valued member of The Witness staff. He has influential backing and is assured of strong support from English speaking Liberals in all parts of Canada. The initial issue of the paper on Saturday made a decided hit and the presses were kept running over time in order to meet the demands of the public. In the course of a leading editorial, The Telegraph gives an able definition of Liberalism. It says:

"Liberalism means something; and something different. It is never the purpose of Liberalism to obtain office—it is always the purpose of Liberalism to secure power. And power—to Liberalism—means only opportunity to serve the people. But Liberalism—except when it be perverted by the play of those human instincts which are too common to call for criticism by other human beings—will always choose to lay down power, and the emoluments which attach to it, rather than deviate by a hair's breadth from the central and clear-sighted purposes for which it lives. Liberalism is a constant battle fought for a definite end; and the battle must always go on, whether we fight with the prestige of power or against the pressure of an entrenched hostile majority.

"The great names of our past would make too long a roster for any single article to present. But even in our own time, the world rings with the fame of our leaders. We have a Cobden and a Bright who struck the shackles from English trade and industry; we have a Gladstone who stood forth as a mighty tribute to Liberalism and liberty from the day he tore open the grim gates of the fetid prisons of Naples, till—with his dying speech—he faced toward the hoary walls of the House of Lords and rallied with his last trumpet-call the forces of Liberalism to that final assault. We have today in Britain a Liberal Government which—whatever its critics may say of it—has employed its possession of power to enact more real reforms for bettering the condition of life among the people of the United Kingdom than stand to the credit of any other single British ministry.

"Nor has the Canadian Liberalism been behind its associated parties in men of courage and conviction and self-sacrifice. Baldwin and Lafontaine won for us the priceless boon of responsible government. Brown and Dorion and John Sandfield Macdonald proved their devotion to the national ideal by making Confederation possible. Alexander Mackenzie, Edward Blake, Luther Holton, Wilfrid Laurier have carried on the great traditions. Liberalism in Canada has not had the spectacular battles of the Old World to fight. The familiar "dragons" of despotism and social inequality and political servitude have beslimed our soil with but little of their ugly spawn. Still, what Canadian Liberalism has found to do, it has done. It has established political equality in the teeth of the Family Compact—it has secured the democratic system of "rep. by pop."—it has, to be frank, so popularized Liberal principles that both Federal parties are today largely governed by them—theoretically.

"Liberalism has suffered enough from desertion and betrayal. Our appearance in the field is due to such an act of treachery. Let us begin by making bold and plain the basic principles of Liberalism, so that no one may wear our colors with success who does not fight our battles and march toward our goals."

The Herald for years the organ of the English speaking Liberals of Montreal has been sold out to the enemy bag and baggage. It acted the part of the candid friend 'to the Liberals during the progress of the naval debate, and its opinions were

quoted with great glee by the reptile Tory press in the Maritime Provinces. It was all part of a clever little game engineered by the papers new owners with the object of deceiving the public. The Telegraph and Witness is a splendid newspaper and The Mail has pleasure in commending it to the Liberals of this section who may desire to subscribe for a metropolitan journal.

The necessity of providing an increased revenue to carry on the business of the country has compelled the Flemming government to increase the rate of stampage. The rate on spruce is boosted from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per thousand; hardwood from 80 cents to \$1.25; hemlock from 40 to \$1.00 and fir from 80 cents to \$1.20. The new rate is less than that charged by the New Brunswick Railway Company and other owners of private lands and the lumber industry should be able to stand it. Most of our lumber now goes to the United States market and if that country abolishes the duty it will put the industry on a much better footing. The Flemming government by its reckless extravagance has brought the finances of the provinces to such a condition that it either had to increase the stampage or resort to direct taxation. About all that can be said in the government's favor is that it has selected the lesser of the two evils.

Although Hon. H. F. McLeod's newspaper organ announced that he was to be a speaker at the Chatham Orange demonstration on Saturday, he evidently failed to put in an appearance. At least his name was not mentioned in despatches but we are told that the old standbys Mr. A. D. Thomas and Mr. R. W. Gregory enlightened the gathering.

The Provincial Secretary did not travel with the common herd, but undertook to make the trip to Chatham by auto. The Flemming roads, however, proved too rough a proposition for him and a breakdown was the result. The speech he was to have delivered will be placed in cold storage until next year.
