Construction is now proceeding on St. John and Quebec Railway location, which has been condemned by dominion inspecting engineer. Think you should intimate to company that location must be approved before construction is, proceeded with and that your department will not consider itself bound in reference to subsidy by approval of local government. Understand there is no need of any seven degrees curve between here and St. John, yet company's plans show great number. There is one of them on one of the highest hills on the road within two miles of Frederiction, on which construction is now proceeding. OSWALD S. CROCKET.

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
