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MR. CROCKET'S PROTEST

Mr. F. B. Carvell, M.P., for Carleton, in a speech in parliament a few days ago, protested against the character of the work being done by the contractors for the St. John Valley Railway. He pointed out that the company which has the contract to build the road is to receive government subsidies and bond guarantees to the amount of \$31,400 per mile, whereas they are constructing a road which he thinks will not cost them more than \$25,000 a mile. Mr. Carvell figures it out that the company will make a clear profit of \$750,000 on the proposition. Mr. Carvell in support of his statement, was able to quote the following letter by Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., to the deputy minister of railways:

Fredericton, N.B., July 11, 1912
A. W. Campbell, C.E., Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals, Ottawa:

Construction is now proceeding on St. John and Quebec Railway location, which has been condemned by dominion inspecting engineer. Think you should intimate to company that location must be approved before construction is proceeded with and that your department will not consider itself bound in reference to subsidy by approval of local government. Understand there is no need of any seven degrees curve between here and St. John, yet company's plans show great number. There is one of them on one of the highest hills on the road within two miles of Fredericton, on which construction is now proceeding.

Mr. Crockett, in entering a protest to the railway department against the degrading of the road, no doubt felt that he was acting in the interests of the people whom he represents in parliament. As he is not a railway man and does not spend much of his time travelling over the right of way it is presumed that he was given a tip by somebody familiar with what was going on. From what Mr. Carvell says it is to be assumed that Mr. Crockett's protest did not bear fruit.

Hon. George E. Foster's efforts to promote closer trade relations between Canada and Australia do not appear to have been any more successful than the efforts he put forth in 1891 to secure reciprocity in natural products between Canada and the United States. He visited Washington in that year as a member of a delegation representing the Government of Canada and submitted an offer of reciprocity which was turned down by James G. Blaine, then Secretary of State. During the Federal campaign of 1911 Mr. Foster travelled about Canada denouncing as disloyal those who favored the very proposal which he himself submitted to the United States government twenty years before. About the best thing the Borden Government can do with Mr. Foster is to send him to the far north with Stefansson. He might be successful in promoting a trade treaty with the blonde Esquimaux. He is too much of an icicle to do business outside of the Arctic circle.

Having failed in his efforts to negotiate a reciprocity treaty with Australia, Hon. George E. Foster, the commercial traveller of the Borden Government is now on his way to China and Japan to see what the prospects are for doing some business. When he sat in the cool shades of opposition Premier Borden expressed the opinion that Canada could get along very well without the Japanese; in fact a telegram to that effect appeared over his signature in a British Columbia paper. Now it seems he is willing to negotiate a trade treaty with them. It would be more in keeping with his professions if he would endeavor to promote closer trade relations with a white man's country, the United States for example.

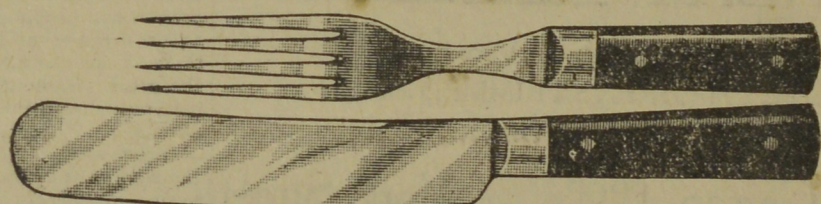

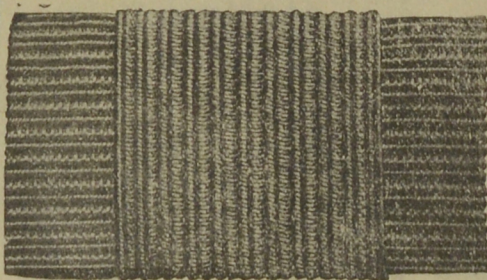
