CITY CONTRACTOR AND HIS WORSHIP HAD DISAGREEMENT

J. M. Chappell Desired Partial Payment on His Curbing Contract Now Under Way—Mayor Would Not Sign Cheque

Financial matters in which contractor J. M. Chappell and the city are concerned caused a ripple of excitement this morning with the contractor and His Worship Mayor Hooper as the centre of disturbance. Mr. Chappell is constructing concrete curbing and catch basins in York street near the C.P.R. station and has the work near completion. Today he was desirous of having a partial payment made by the city in view of the fact that the contract was well advanced. He approached the mayor but was told by him that he could receive no payment as no arrangement had been made to pay on estimate while the contract was under way and that it would be illegal and impossible for the mayor to sign a check under the circumstances. The reply did not have the effect of soothing Mr. Chappell and he grew very angry and informed the Mayor that a payment would have to be made. His remarks grew heated and His Worship in turn became angry and informed the contractor that he very much resented the language used towards himself. At the time of latest report His Worship was firmly maintaining his position in the matter.

Inquiry at City Hall elicited the fact when the regular monthly accounts were passed last week Contractor Chappell was voted the sum of \$318.83 on work then completed. When he took the contract, through misunderstanding or whatever else he made no arrangements for payments before the next meeting of the council and cannot get them.

FINED TWENTY DOLLARS

Bob Ganley appeared before Police Magistrate Ritchie at St. John this morning on the charge of assaulting Umpire Frank McCann in yesterday's ball game between Fredericton and St. John. He was fined twenty dollars, McCann not pressing the charge. The Fredericton manager paid the fine. Imposing sentence the magistrate said he was disposed to be lenient. The umpire and Ganley before court opened had settled their difficulty amicably.

LOCAL GREEK RETURNS FROM BALKAN WAR

Zames Apostolos Arrived Here Yesterday Via New York--In Several Important Battles Against Turks Including Saloniki

Zames Apostolos, who left Fredericton last autumn to join the army in his native land of Greece on the outbreak of war in the Balkans has returned to Fredericton, arriving here yesterday. Apostolos travelled via New York with a large party of Greeks who were returning to the United States and Canada their periods of service in the Greek army having expired. Apostolos is well known here having been associated with George Apostolos in the fruit and confectionery business.

The returned Greek has seen considerable active service in the Balkans. On reaching his native country he was assigned to an infantry corps raised in his district and with it served in Albania and Macedonia. He was present at several important engagements between Turks and

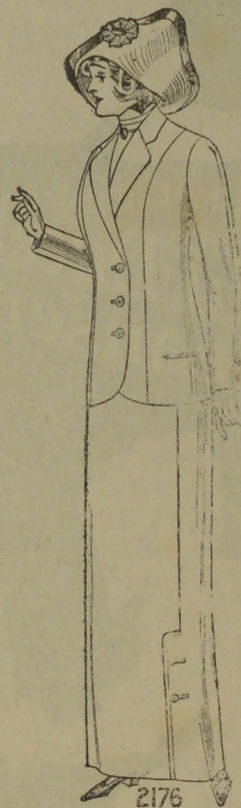

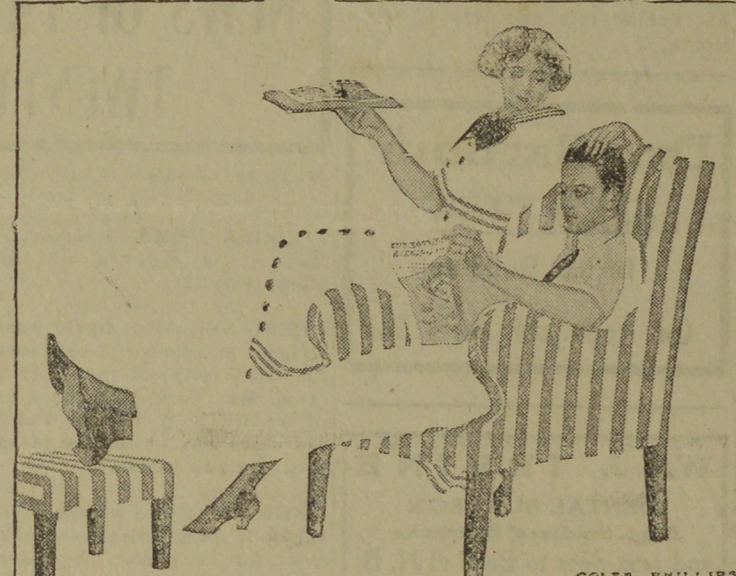
