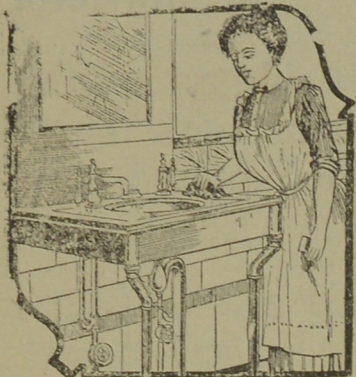

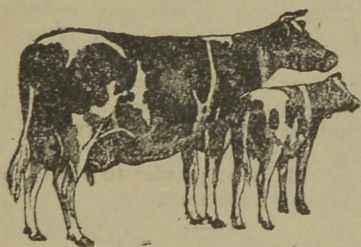

HOT FIGHT IN THE ALBERTA ELECTIONS

The Sifton Government is Being Attacked With Unprecedented Vigor, But is Likely to Win Handsomely—Some of the Factors in the Campaign

Edmonton, Alta., April 12.—The most strenuous campaign which has been fought in Alberta since the organization of the Territory into a Province is nearing a close. In some of the Dominion elections in Alberta has the Liberal party been assailed with such vigor as during the past three weeks. Owing to the tightness of the money market, the railway companies decided early this season not to proceed with any branch lines in the Western Provinces and this has been a severe handicap to Premier Sifton and his followers, as at the last session of the Legislature the necessary aid was given to over 1200 miles of branch lines principally in the new districts, as the railway companies stated with emphasis last winter that they certainly would go ahead and build into districts which had no railways and were being rapidly settled owing to the newcomers understanding that they would be given the advantages of transportation this year.

A CONFUSING ISSUE

Then the Machinery Act passed by the Government last session is being made a confusing issue when discussed before the farmers. Under the old agreement, which the farmers signed and which was printed in the smallest type, and occupied two or three columns of the agreement, the machinery companies had the best of it in every way imaginable. Farmers who failed to read it over and to have the advice of a lawyer as to what it meant, found themselves up against the court every time they fell down in a payment. The Government gave the implement men a year to change the reading in their agreements; this they failed to do, and, without any further parlaying, the Government drew up an Act which made the companies liable for representations made by agents. It also made it more difficult for machine men to seize machinery once it was sold, even if they held against it lien notes. This, it is understood, will be a big relief to the farmers and it will not embarrass them alone farming operations are on, and it was and it will not embarrass them when farming operations are on, as it was the custom of the implement men to seize implements at the very time the farmers most needed them. The implement men stated it was their intention to spend a million dollars if necessary to defeat the Government if the Act went into force, and whether they are spending that amount of money or not, their agents are certainly well provided with funds to prosecute the campaign against the Government.

Premier Sifton has been a very live campaigner. He has toured the southern part of the Province for the past ten days. It is in this district that the government is receiving its greatest opposition. Outside of the Mormon district the Government is not sure of any seats, and Hon. C. R. Mitchell is having a very close run in Medicine Hat. Along the Calgary-Edmonton railway, however, and in the Northern part of the Province, the Government has a big advantage and it will be difficult for the Opposition to get one seat.

The feeling throughout the Province is that the Government will be returned with perhaps a slightly increased majority. The Conservatives will gain seats, but, as the representation was increased by ten seats under the Redistribution Bill, this may not mean that the Government majority will be decreased by more than one or two members.

RUNNING IN TWO RIDINGS

Premier Sifton is running in two seats, Macleod and Vermillion. In Macleod he is running in the constituency represented by the late Hon. Mr. McKenzie, the Provincial Treasurer. In Calgary centre, which is the Conservative stronghold, the Liberal candidate is Rev. Dr. McDougall, the veteran Methodist missionary. In Bassano, just outside the boundary of Calgary, the Liberals has as their candidate George Lane, the millionaire cattleman, and he may capture this Conservative seat. In Cardston, Martin Woolf, the leader of the Mormons, and their wealthiest man, is the Liberal candidate.

THE BLACK FOX INDUSTRY IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

The fox industry in P. E. Island dates back to the early nineties. The first black foxes to be kept in captivity were found in a den in the woods by a man who was looking for stray cattle. They changed hands two or three times before they finally became settled in permanent quarters. That the man who gave them a permanent home and engaged to look after their welfare, after some years of experimenting, at last accomplished a huge success, is evident from the fact that his ranch and the foxes therein, were recently taken over by a syndicate for over half a million dollars. Shortly after this man engaged in the business of raising foxes, two other men scenting the scheme of raising under their own control the rare and beautiful black fox, also elected to engage in the experiment. As it has lately transpired their success no doubt was beyond their dreams.

Their ranches were built in secluded places, and even their near neighbors knew little of what was going on. Their gains and their losses were alike kept a profound secret. They carried on their business with such secrecy that it has only been within the last seven or eight years that the possibilities of the industry began to leak out. When it first began to be whispered that there were handsome profits in the fox business, providing one could raise the stock, three or four of the more venturesome decided to take the chance. But they found it difficult to procure breeding stock as those who were already established refused to sell any live foxes. However, they managed to procure breeders by going abroad and picking up one here and there from trappers, and taking, when they could get the chance, a pair from the pioneer breeders on shares. Those who were fortunate enough to procure a pair in this way were bound down by an agreement to dispose of no foxes alive, much less divulge any secrets in connection with the business. For that reason the business "hung fire" for a few more years. But like every other money making proposition it eventually became a live subject, and some of the later ones engaged in the business, meeting with success and not being able to keep the secret "let the cat out of the bag" with the result that half the population contracted "fox fever."

Of course the original breeders were shocked at the turn affairs had taken but they gradually got accustomed to it and under pressure of a general demand for live foxes for breeding purposes, grudgingly consented to sell. Ranches began to go up as if by magic throughout Prince County, where as yet the industry was confined. Nineteen hundred and eleven saw the first general demand for foxes for breeding purposes and the first outbreak of "fox fever" which has not reached its climax yet. Last year there were thirty fox companies incorporated on the Island with a capitalization of three million dollars nearly all paid up. There are now about one hundred and fifty ranches with about six thousand shareholders representing a cash value of five million dollars. It is stated that four-fifths of all the foxes in captivity are being reared in P. E. I. and at a meeting of the breeders held Summerside in January an Association was formed having for its object the development, improvement and protection of this valuable industry. The President of the Summerside Board of Trade in an address stated that there was more money local and foreign, invested in the province in 1912 than in the forty years previous. It is safe to say that most of this money was invested in foxes. It was argued at first by those who were suspicious of the business, that the inexperienced ones who were investing their money were foolish and could expect nothing but dead foxes and failure. But it has been proven that common sense is a very good substitute for experience

in such cases, and I have not heard of any failures so far. I might recite just one instance of the success of one of the inexperienced who had pluck and a lot of good sense in the person of Thomas Williams, Mt. Pleasant. In the spring of 1911 he knew practically nothing of the "mysteries" of the fox business. A friend got him interested to the extent of buying four red foxes as an experiment, and not having any trouble with these he was encouraged later on in the season to invest in a pair of the more valuable kind. An increase of six black beauties last spring rewarded his pluck and energy and now he is fairly established with an up-to-date ranch and several pairs of breeders. The men who had predicted blue ruin for those who had invested in foxes in 1911, are now biting their fingers off for not investing themselves, for the money that would have bought a decent interest in a pair of best blacks in 1911, would not buy more than a few hairs in the same pair today. At the present time the demand for foxes for breeding purposes is much greater than the supply. Orders for nearly all the probable increase in foxes in P. E. I. this year are already booked, one company alone having completed the sale of three hundred thousand dollars worth of foxes for September delivery. On account of the wild fur bearers becoming scarcer every year and the demands for fur garments becoming greater, one can readily see that the future of fur farming is assured. America alone needs 25,000,000 dollars worth of fur each year and foreign demand looks to America for as much more. Mink, skunk and raccoon are among the fur bearers that are being successfully reared. A gentleman in Newfoundland is now experimenting with lynx and he says he has faith in them as a ranch animal.
