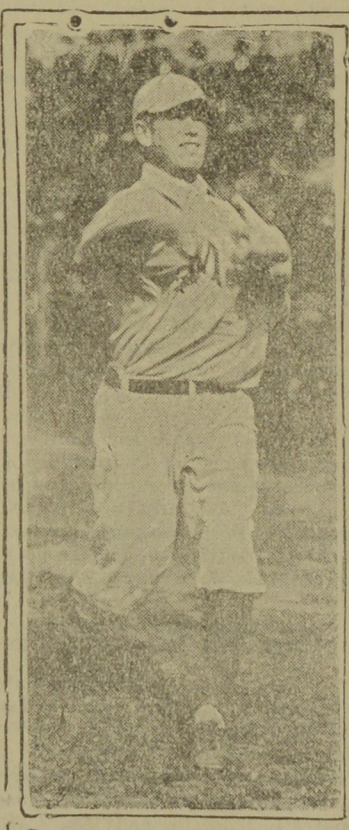

## HAL CHASE MADE HIT AS LEFT-HANDED SECOND-BASEMAN



Wednesday's Boston Globe has the following on Hal Chase:

"For the first time in the three championship games he has played since he became a second baseman, Hal Chase yesterday has a chance to handle a ground-hit ball. Previously he had had two fielding chances, both being on pop flies, one in Washington and one in Boston Monday.

## Fast Six Round Bout at Philadelphia Showed McCarty the Better of the Two—Joe Jeannette Won Preliminary Bout From George Cotton

Carty, claimant of the white heavy-weight boxing championship, was awarded the popular decision by a wide margin at the end of a fast six-round bout with Jim Flynn, of Colorado, at the Olympia Athletic Club here tonight.

McCarty led throughout the fight and frequently compelled his opponent to clinch to avoid his vicious straight left jabs. Although he appeared to be outclassed from the start, Flynn fought gamely throughout the entire six rounds. With both gloves protecting his jaw and his body crouched in such a manner as to prevent McCarty from reaching a vital part, the Pueblo fireman rushed into clinch after clinch and succeeded in landing many blows on the champion at close quarters. McCarty, however, seemed to be in the pink of condition and was not affected by Flynn's short arm hooks. With straight left jabs he pounded away at his opponent's face as the latter rushed into the clinches.

At the end of the first round Flynn's nose was bleeding. In the second his mouth was cut and before the close of the bout one eye was nearly closed.

After shaking hands in the first round both men rushed to a clinch. After they had been separated by the referee, McCarty jolted Flynn with two rights to the jaw while the latter sent three short jabs to McCarty's face.

Blows were exchanged in rapid succession at close quarters until the bell.

The following rounds were a succession of clinches with McCarty using both right and left with effect on Flynn's body while the latter kept rushing in an attempt to land a blow which would end the fight.

The four bouts which preceded the wind-up furnished plenty of excitement to the crowd, which filled the clubhouse. All were closely contested except the first, in which "Young" Al Kaufman, McCarty's sparring partner, knocked out Al Benedict, of New York, with a right swing to the jaw in the second round, and the fourth, in which Joe Jeannette won from George Cotton in the fourth round by a hard right-hand swing to the jaw. The latter was knocked

perform at the second station. No one has, so far as could be learned, ever seen a left-hander at second. Chase is chain lightning in his movements and it certainly will be a novelty to the fans to see him take part in a double-play when he takes a throw from the shortstop or third baseman and acts as the pivot on the play to first, because of the movement he will have to make to get into position for the throw.

The first ground hit that has come to him in a championship game this season was the one hot off Harry Hooper's bat in the first inning yesterday. The ball took a bad bound just as he was about to hook onto it and shot up his arm and over his head.

His next chance of this kind came in the sixth on a sharply hit grounder by Gardner, straight at second base. Chase came over like a shadow nipped the ball on a short bound with his mittet right hand; then, half pivoting to his right, which was the thortest way around, and transferring the ball to his left hand at the same time, he made a quick and an accurate throw to first, getting Gardner by several feet.

Seeing a fielder turn his back to the base and the base-runner, losing sight of both, before making the throw, seemed mighty odd to the spectators, but that was because few, if any, of them ever saw a left-handed second baseman before. Chase, with his remarkable speed, will cover a lot of ground around second base. He proved this yesterday when he went out to center-field and took what ordinarily would have been a cure Texas leaguer.

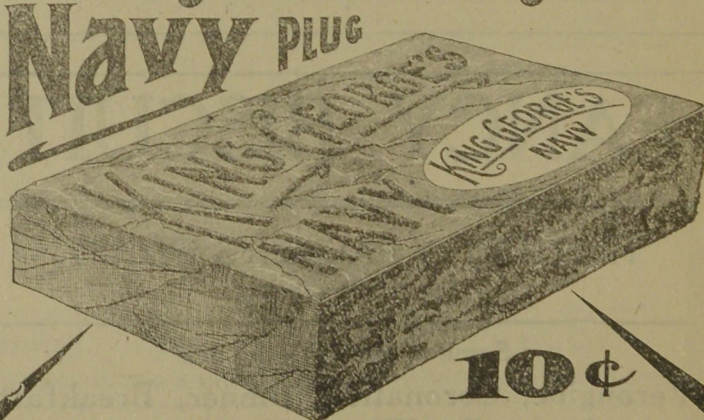
