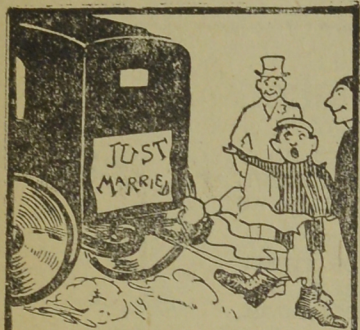

HOT FIGHT IN THE ALBERTA ELECTIONS

(Continued from page two.)

The Liberals are making the most of the speech delivered by R. B. Bennett, M. P., in the House, in which he declared that bonfires blazed in the American settlements in Alberta when news of a defeat of the British army in South Africa was announced. Nearly all these former American citizens have become naturalized Canadians, and deeply resent this statement.

MR. "BONFIRE" BENNETT

Mr. Bennett is campaigning throughout the Southern part of the Province, and wherever he goes he is referred to by the Government speakers as Richard "Bonfire" Bennett. In Rocky Mountain, the centre of a big mining district, the Liberals are supporting Powell, the Labor candidate. Two Socialists are running, one in Lethbridge, and one in Rocky Mountain. An independent candidate is running in Warner, and with the exception of this it is a straight fight between the two parties. Dr. Rutherford the former Premier, is running as an Independent Liberal in Edmonton south and has been endorsed by the Liberal Association on his statement that he only opposed the Liffon Government on the question of the question of the Alberta and Great Waterways Railway.

Hon. C. W. Cross is running in Edson as well as Edmonton. He will have an easy victory in the capital and is devoting much attention to the carrying of Edson. The Canadian Northern and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway are friendly to the Government candidates and, if it were not for the fact that the railways were not doing any construction work this year the opposition to the Government would not amount to very much. The Farmers' Cooperative Elevator scheme which is outlined after one in Saskatchewan, where it has proved a great success, was framed by the Grain Growers Grain Company and the Government for this reason is receiving the support of the grain growers. This enables the farmers to erect elevators by putting up 15 per cent of the cost the Government supplying the rest of the money.

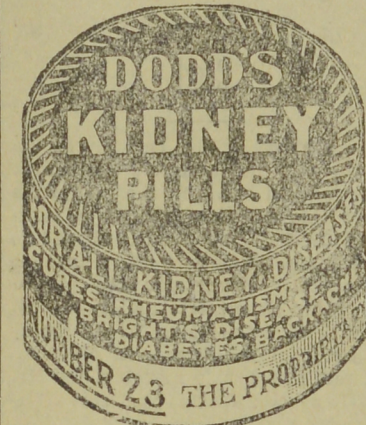

HON. JOSEPH HOWE'S GREAT FIGHT FOR FREE SPEECH

On behalf of my constituents, on my own behalf, and on the behalf of the people of this country, I desire before the vote is taken on this question, to enter my earnest protest. I spoke of my own constituency, but the same is true of the whole province from which I came. I suppose there is no part of Canada where the right of free speech is deemed of greater value than in the Province of Nova Scotia. One of the most interesting and important incidents in the history of that Province is directly connected with this question. I refer to the prosecution of the Hon. Joseph Howe. In those early days back in the thirties, Nova Scotia was governed by what was known at that time as the Family Compact. We had no free government the administration of the Province was in the hands of a ring, something like, I suppose from what I can learn, the Province of Manitoba is today. It could scarcely be called a free country. The ring that governed Nova Scotia at that time and especially the City of Halifax, was corrupt—rotten to the core—but everybody was afraid to attack it.

Joseph Howe was a young journalist writing for a newspaper in Halifax and he ventured to expose these gentlemen in the press. He showed them up in their true light, and his letter created a great sensation in the City of Halifax and throughout the Province of Nova Scotia. The first step that the Jobbing Tory Justice took was to prosecute Howe for criminal libel. Under the law as it stood at that time, there appeared to be no defence for him. He consulted some of the leading lawyers of the province and they assured him that he would certainly be convicted. They refused to take up the case for him and the consequence was that he had to fight his own battle. He borrowed some books from lawyers in the City of Halifax, read up the libel law and appeared in court as his own attorney. He fought the case himself and after a very exciting trial, during which there was delivered one of the best addresses ever made to a jury in that province, Howe was acquitted. He was carried from the Court House on the shoulders of the people and there was great rejoicing throughout the Province and in the City of Halifax. They gathered around his house that night and cheered him, and he made a speech from the steps in which he told the people to go home and keep the peace, and to teach their children the names of the twelve men who

had preserved the right of free speech and the liberty of the press. By that gallant fight for free speech Howe endeared himself to every Nova Scotian. It was the first blow struck in our province for the responsible government which followed and in that struggle he played a prominent part. The names of the twelve jurymen were in time forgotten, but the memory of Joseph Howe himself, Nova Scotia's champion of free speech, is known and cherished in this Province. We are proud that we produced a man of that kind, who is known all through his history in Nova Scotia as the true friend of the people. We were proud of him as a Nova Scotian; but the pride we felt that such a man was produced in our little Province by the sea is tempered to some extent with humility when we realize that our province also produced the author of what will be known in our future history as the gay law—J. H. SINCLAIR, M.P., in the House of Commons.



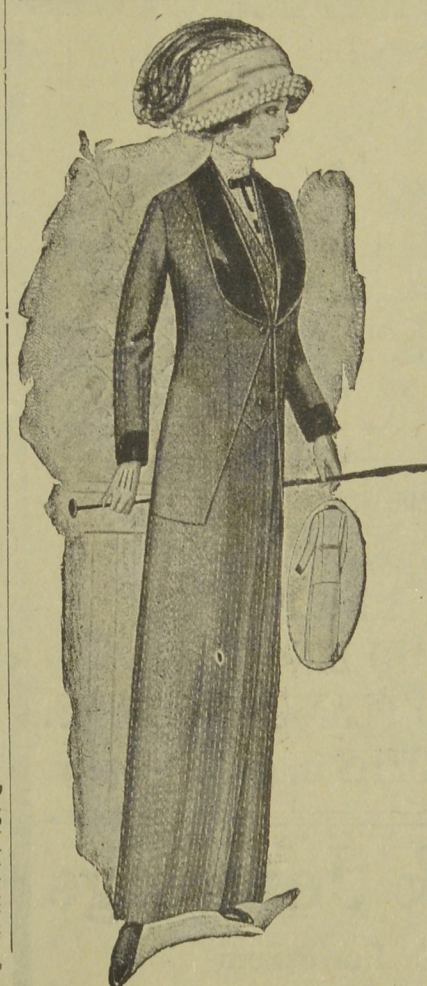
