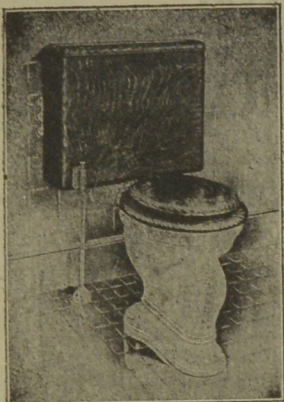

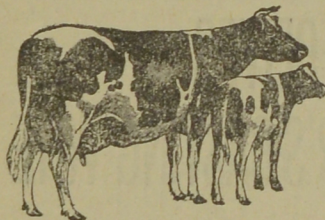

1. Kind and number of goats kept.
2. Usual number for sale each year.
3. Approximately the prices asked.
4. If possible a brief statement regarding expenses found necessary and the returns which may be expected by one engaging in raising this class of stock.

STRAY TOPICS FROM LITTLE OLD NEW YORK

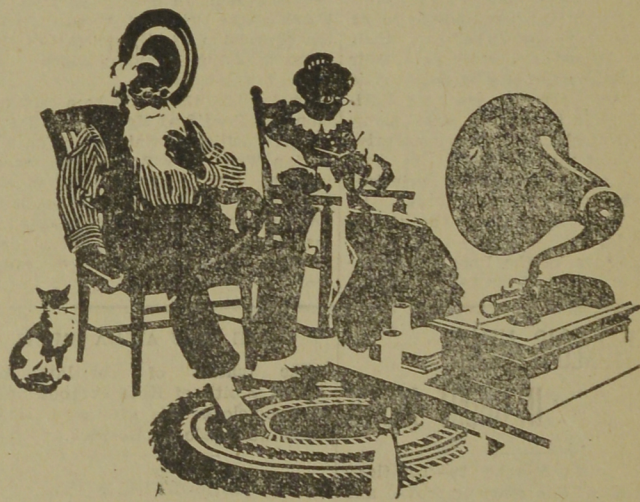
