NORTHUMBERLAND, S. M. P.
ON THE NAVAL QUESTION

(Chatham Gazette)

W. S. Loggie, Northumberland's representative in the House of Commons, returned on Thursday from Ottawa looking very fit after the strenuous action of the past three weeks. Speaking of the naval discussion and the causes of the situation at Ottawa, Mr. Loggie said:

The difference between the two parties is due entirely to the fact that the principles actuating their policies are widely divergent. The Conservatives have adopted the plan of centralization, while the Liberals stand for the principle of co-operation between the colonies and the Mother Country. There was centralization, said Mr. Loggie, before we obtained the great boon of responsible government and practically all our affairs were managed from Downing Street. Our forefathers fought for responsible government and ever since the United Kingdom has given it there has been more loyalty to the Mother Country than at any time before its advent.

Now the Conservative party propose to spend \$35,000,000 in building three capital ships in the Old Country and handing them over to the Admiralty to manage in times of peace and at the expense of the British taxpayer. This proposal means that the people of the British Isles must pay \$2 to every \$1 we pay. That is, that the cost of maintenance would be annually about twice as much as the interest and the sinking fund on the cost of construction. The Conservatives claimed that the last clause in the memorandum from the Admiralty showed that there was an emergency. This however, has been completely exploded and it is not now seriously entertained by Conservatives themselves. The fact remains however, that the foreign powers are increasing their naval strength and it is incumbent upon the British people to keep up the same standard of numerical superiority as before. As a matter of fact they have impressed their "striking force" considerably and according to Mr. Churchill the main drawback is that they have no surplus of men. This fact only goes to show the greater reason that exists for the Canadian navy and the training of men in this country so that they may co-operate with the Royal navy in the event of any real emergency.

Another argument alleged by Conservatives would be the delay in having a Canadian built navy ready for action. Nobody claims, said Mr. Loggie, that we should build the capital ships of the Canadian fleet units in Canada at the present time. The Liberal proposition is to build the two capital ships in England and contemporaneously to enter upon the building of the smaller vessels in Canada. The effect would be that the two ships in England under the Canadian Naval policy would be ready for action in as short a time as could the three capital ships of the Conservative policy. Thus we would be giving to the Mother Country practically the same immediate aid as in the Conservative proposition, and in the meantime we would be building the smaller ships and getting men ready to man the ships as far as possible, so that if the emergency came we would be helping the Mother Country to a far greater extent than contemplated by the government.

The Conservative party makes no provision for the training of men in Canada nor for going on with a navy to co-operate with the old land. Mr. Borden stated on the occasion of the second reading of the bill that he did not believe in five navies, so that it is a fair presumption that he will

Ald. Farrell objected to this proviso being included in the motion, but His Worship declared the entire motion in order.

In amendment to the amendment, Ald. Scott seconded a motion moved that the grant be \$2,000, the same as it was in 1912.

Ald. Mitchell pointed out that the civic grant of \$2,000 to the exhibition was largely for publicity purposes. A grant of \$2,500 in this case would bring the money for advertising up to \$4,500. He appreciated the work the Board of Trade had done but felt that the City Council would be willing to supplement the grant of \$1,000 proposed by Ald. Clark, whenever the necessity arose.

VOTE ON MATTER

The amendment to the amendment was lost on the following vote:—

Yea—Scott, Hoben, Weddall, Osborne.

Nay—Farrell, Rogers, Everett, Boyce, Mitchell, Clark.

The original motion was also lost the vote being as follows:—

Yea—Everett, Farrell, Hoben.

Nay—Clark, Mitchell, Rogers, Boyce, Scott, Weddall, Osborne.

RECONSIDERATION

The matter was then reconsidered, a deadlock having occurred.

Ald. Farrell seconded by Ald. Everett moved that the grant be \$2,250.

In amendment to the amendment Ald. Mitchell moved, seconded by Ald. Rogers that the grant be \$1,500.

In amendment to the amendment Ald. Scott, seconded by Ald. Hoben moved that the grant be \$1,800.

The second amendment was withdrawn and the amendment was defeated on the mayor's casting vote. The aldermen voted as follows:—

Yea—Mitchell, Boyce, Clark, Rogers, Scott.

Nay—Weddall, Farrell, Everett, Hoben, Osborne.

The original motion was carried by the mayor's casting vote, the vote of the aldermen being reversed.

ALD. CLARK'S VIEWS

Ald. Clark, when moving his amendment that the grant be \$1000 with a proviso that that amount be supplemented when necessary made a statement of his views on the question of publicity. He spoke he said with knowledge of the subject being a member of the Council of the Board of Trade. He recognized the publicity campaign as a forward step. A booklet had been issued and inquiries received.

Factories were needed in Fredericton to ensure growth of the city but advertising alone would not bring them. Further inducements should be given. The citizens would have to assist new industries financially. Amherst had obtained her industries in that way. He was quite prepared to sustain his views on the matter.

POPULATION NEEDED

A large quantity of the advertising booklets remained undistributed. He felt that less advertising and more personal work was needed. Someone should be sent to interview owners of prospective industries. Fredericton needed growth in population. Growth in assessment had come already. In fact taxes had increased 58 per cent since 1904.

Continuing Ald. Clark said that the Board of Trade should contribute to the publicity fund. The amount asked for \$2500 was too great to be taken from the Contingencies Fund.

CIVIC FINANCES

Ald. Clark devoted attention to the city's financial position stating that as stewards of the people the aldermen should watch it closely. Statements published in the newspapers had led persons to believe that tax payments during the past year and been enormous. Such had not been the case. To bolster up the accounts for the year a false entry of \$4060.63 as being on hand December 31, had been made in the city accounts. There also was a heavy overdraft.

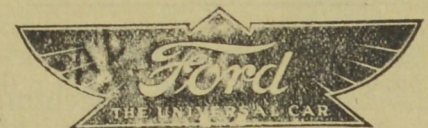
