(Chatham Gazette) W. S. Loggie, Northumperland's representative in the House of Commons, returned on Thursday, from Ottawa looking very fit after the strenuous action of the past three weeks. Speaking of the naval dis-cussion and the causes of the situation at Ottawa, Mr. Loggie said:
