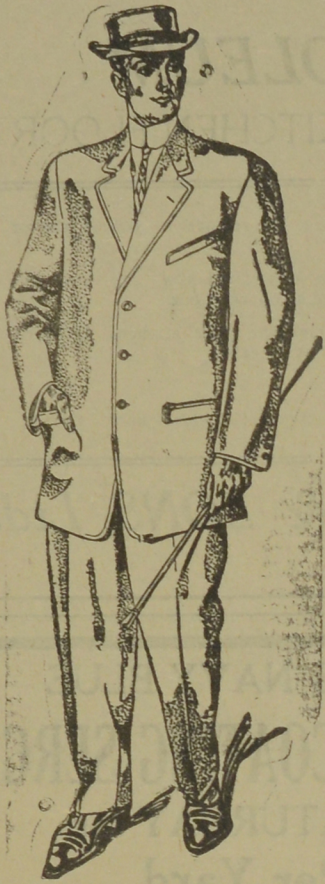

Harold Janvrin the youngster with the Boston Red Sox is being groomed for the utility infield position.

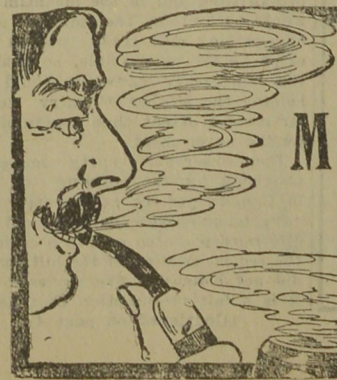

New Brunswick and Maine League Reorganized Yesterday---Mayor W. S. Hooper Re-elected President---Fredericton, St. John, Bangor and Calais-St. Stephen on the Circuit---Next Meeting to be Held April 10---Schedule to be Arranged in the Meantime

It is up to the people of Fredericton to give the baseball club all the support needed in order to get it away to a good start on the season of 1913. The New Brunswick and Maine League was reorganized here yesterday and if things go as expected will be in operation as a member of the National Association with D. classification, about the middle of May. The Fredericton Club will need \$1,500 from the public to get going. Six gentlemen have promised fifty dollars each and money can be obtained from other sources sufficient to make \$500 altogether. It is now up to the baseball loving public to dig down in their jeans after the remaining thousand. The executive of the club are ready to give all the necessary time and attention to the ball-club but absolutely decline to go out and personally solicit subscriptions as they did last year.

The matter of the schedule will be considered at a special meeting to be held April 10 and probably decided upon then. In the meantime a schedule will be prepared for presentation at that meeting. The matter of allotting the available players of the 1912 Woodstock and Houlton Clubs to the four clubs of the present league. These players have been allotted but as the Calais-St. Stephen representative had left for home by the 5.50 train. The lists will not be made public until he has been consulted. The reserve rule which practically existed in the league in 1912 has been retained.

DELEGATES PRESENT

The delegates present were Fredericton, J. J. McCaffrey, J. H. Calder, J. P. Farrell, T. S. Wilkinson, St. John, H. J. Fleming, D. B. Donald, Calais-St. Stephen, George U. Martin, Bangor, Frank J. Leonard holding proxy for Walter F. Mason.

The resignations of Woodstock and Houlton were received and accepted. Franchises were granted to Bangor, Maine, and Calais-St. Stephen, Fredericton and St. John will remain members of the league.

The reports of the president, secretary and treasurer were received.

TO ENTER ORGANIZED BALL

It was decided to make application for admission to the National Association of Professional Baseball

Leagues for protection of the territory included in the leagues circuit. The New Brunswick & Maine League goes into organized baseball as a Class D. organization with a salary limit of \$1,000 per month for players exclusive of the proposition of a playing manager's salary over and above the average salary of the other players of each club.

OFFICERS' ELECTED

Officers were elected as follows:— President—Mayor W. S. Hooper, Fredericton.

Vice-president—M. O. McCormick, St. Stephen.

Secretary-treasurer—D. B. Donald, St. John.

Members of the Executive will be appointed later one by each club with substitute.

The second Monday in November has been set as the day for the annual league meeting.

The constitution was amended to conform with the rules of the National Association.

A bond of \$1000 is put up by each club. Umpires are to be paid \$125 per month and railway expenses on the circuit. The Draper and Maynard ball is to be used by the league.

Several matters will remain in abeyance until the next meeting which is to be held April 10 at a place to be decided later.

"CY" YOUNG HAS A BIRTHDAY

Pasli, O., March 29—"Cy" Young, the veteran baseball pitcher who retired from the Boston Nationals last year with a record for longer service than any other man who ever played in the big league, received messages of congratulation from some of his former team mates today on the occasion of his forty-sixth birthday anniversary. Since his retirement Young has lived in his farm near here. The farm is one of the finest in Ohio and was bought with his earnings as a ball player. Though the old veteran has no apparent intention or desire to resume his career on the diamond he contemplates to take a very keen interest in the game and never fails to read the daily news from the training camps.
