DEDICATED—The new Baptist Church at Marysville will be dedicated on Sunday, the 14th inst.

ON THE ROAD—John H. Tabor, the popular candy man, has sold his business and gone on the road.

APPOINTED—Policeman Paul Phillips has been appointed sergeant of the force in this city, Sergt. VanDine becoming customs officer in place of James H. Carr.

FURTHER POSTPONED—If report is to have credence, the steamer David Weston will resume her trips on the river beginning the 13th. She is just as likely to reach here on Christmas Day as the 13th of August.

ST. DUNSTAN'S CURATE—A successor to the Rev. Father Chastillon in the incumbency of St. Dunstan's Church, this city, has been appointed in the person of Rev. Father Savage. The Rev. Father will be warmly welcomed.

A LAW

Be it enacted by the Board of Health of the City of Fredericton, as follows:—

1. Food products intended for human consumption, and generally or frequently eaten without being cooked, and not enclosed in a natural inedible covering or rind, shall not be exposed for sale within or outside of any shop or other place of merchandise situate in the City of Fredericton, unless adequately protected by a suitable covering from flies and other insects, and from the dirt and dust of the place of exposure or street, whereon such place is situate. This By-Law shall however not apply to such food products exposed for sale in the Phoenix Square Market in the said City of Fredericton, during the hours established by law for the continuance of such market.

2. Dressed or partly dressed meat intended for human consumption, shall not be conveyed for commercial purposes over any street or highway of the City of Fredericton, unless efficiently protected by a suitable covering from insects, dust, and exposure to the weather, and such meat shall not be exposed for sale where it is liable to such contamination or injury, unless so protected. The term "Meat" in this By-Law, shall be held to include Fish and all other food products of animal origin liable to contamination or injury by exposure.

3. This By-Law shall come into force on the first day of August, A. D., 1913.

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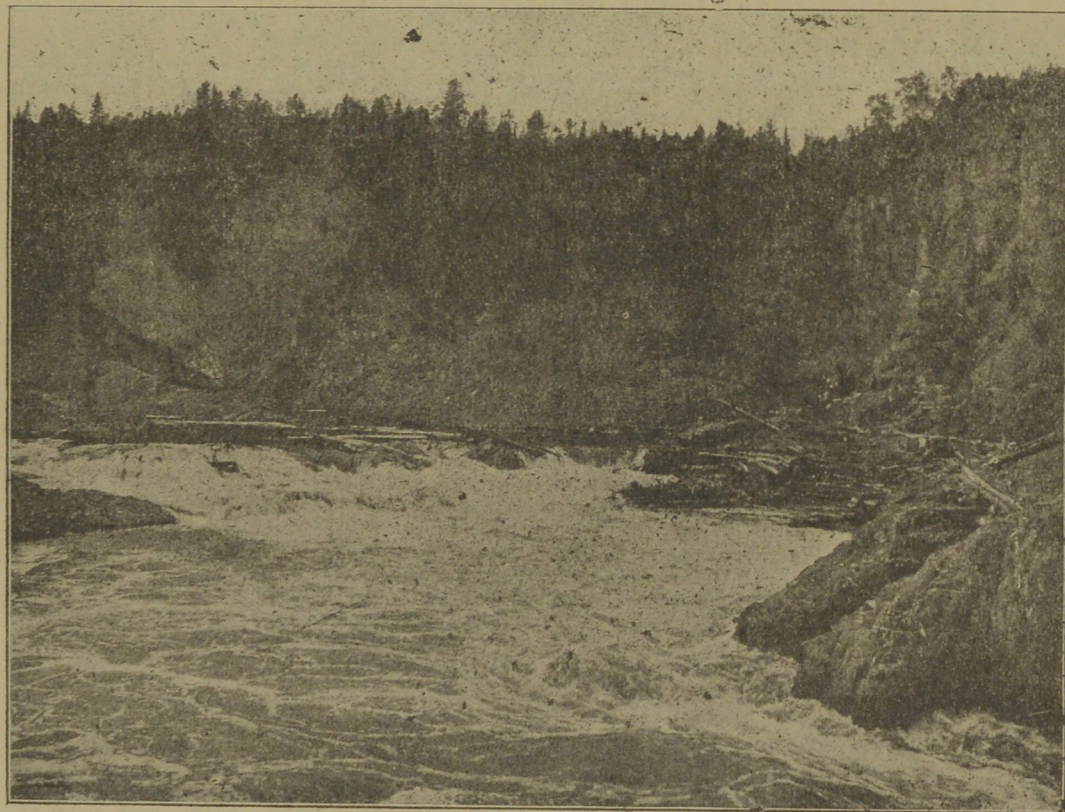
