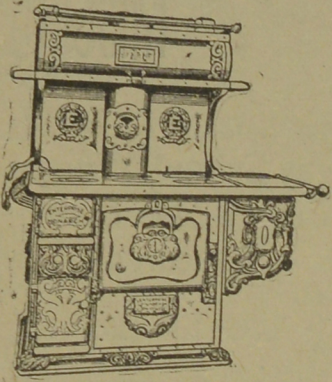

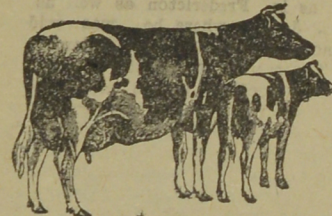

## FORMER FREDERICTONIAN DEAD IN MICHIGAN

Frederick Dunn Was a Gallant Soldier in the Civil War

The News of Pewamo, Mich., contains the following account of the death of Frederick Dunn, a former resident of this city:

"The death of Frederick Dunn, Sr., which occurred Thursday, February 20th, mention of which was made in a brief manner in these columns last week, marks the passing of another of those gallant soldier boys who in 1861 gave their heroic services that the union of the states might be preserved.

The funeral services were held from the late home of the deceased last Saturday afternoon, February 22nd, Rev. F. MacGillivray of the Baptist Church, officiating, under the auspices of the Masonic fraternity, of which Mr. Dunn was a member. The pallbearers from Pewamo Lodge, F. & A. M., were Messrs. D. W. Bissell, Levi Osborn, Fred Myers, George B. Arnold, S. S. Thuma and A. F. Stow. Interment was made in East Plains cemetery.

Frederick Dunn was the second oldest of the family of the late Joshua and Sarah Elizabeth Dunn, and was born at Fredericton, Province of New Brunswick. In about the year 1857 the family moved to Detroit and shortly after that his father engaged in the lumbering business in Gratiot and Isabella Counties, being among the pioneer lumbermen of the state.

The subject of this sketch was a veteran of the civil war, having enlisted at the outbreak of the war in Company K, Berdan's First U. S. Sharpshooters. He saw service under McClellan at the siege of Yorktown, Va., and in the seven days' battle of the Peninsula campaign. He was taken prisoner at the second battle of Manassas by Stuart's Cavalry, afterwards being paroled and sent back to Michigan on detached service. Having recruited his quota of men he was commissioned a second lieutenant in Deland's First Michigan Sharpshooters.

After the war he commenced lumbering with his father and continued in that business until 1877, when he moved his family to the old farm home, one mile north of Pewamo. He lived here until seven years ago, when he moved onto the Madison R. Vance farm, two miles west, where he resided at the time of his death.

In 1867 he was married to Miss Ellen A. Vance, to which union were born three sons and one daughter, who, besides the wife and his younger brother, Morris, are left to mourn his demise.

## GREAT FIRE OF 1850 IS RECALLED

The following account of the great fire which wiped out a large portion of this city in 1850, is taken from The St. John Globe:

"In 1850, Fredericton suffered from an extensive conflagration, somewhat approximating to our calamity of 1877. The paper of November 16 contains a very full description of this fire, a brief abstract of which may be of interest in recalling to memory this calamitous happening in our capital city:

"Destructive Fire—Yesterday, (Nov. 11) about two o'clock, one of the most awful conflagrations which ever visited a small community, broke out in Carleton street, commencing in the rear of the premises formerly occupied by Dr. Emerson, and then in the occupation of Miss McLaughlan and Mr. Hilland, which in an incredibly short space of time communicated with the Methodist Chapel, which, with the building named, was speedily consumed. The most strenuous efforts were made to confine the devouring element to the block in which it originated, but these efforts were without avail. At this juncture a strong wind blew from the northwest, which forced the flames to the opposite side of King street, consuming the new building owned by Mr. Morgan, the house occupied by the Rev. Mr. Temple and from thence back to within one building of the Masonic Hall. The corner house on Carleton street, opposite the Methodist Chapel, was soon after in flames, and Magee's bakery, the Temperance Hall and all the buildings along to Flewelling's corner, were speedily followed on the one side, while the premises occupied by John Reilly, and the building owned by Patrick Kelly, better known as Perk's Tavern, on the other; all the buildings on that block in Carleton street being consumed, with the exception of that known as Anderson's corner. From that time the progress of the flames became irresistible. The military, the firemen and the citizens generally worked as men should work for the preservation of life and property but still the flames rushed on, consuming nearly three entire blocks in the very centre of the city, and were not stayed until they had reached from above Carleton street upwards to St. John street downwards, and from the south side of Queen street to Brunswick street backwards, leaving on St. John street the property belonging to the Bank of British North America and that of E. W. Miller, Esq., on Brunswick street, the property owned by Beverly Robinson, Esq., the residence of the Roman Catholic Bishop, the Roman Catholic church, which was several times on fire, and the residence of Mr. Charles Grigor, on the south side of Queen street, between the points mentioned, there only remained the property of Mr. Grosvenor, Mr. Stewart and the new brick building owned by the heirs of the late Mr. Staples. By this awful calamity upwards of two thousand souls have been driven out of their homes, many of whom do not know at this hour (five o'clock) where to lay their heads. The loss by this calamity it would be in vain now to estimate, but our readers may form some idea of its extent when we mention that this morning we counted one hundred and sixty-five separate tenements totally consumed, without taking into account the out-houses and back stores attached

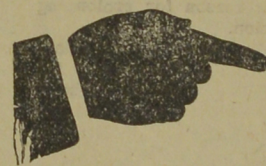
