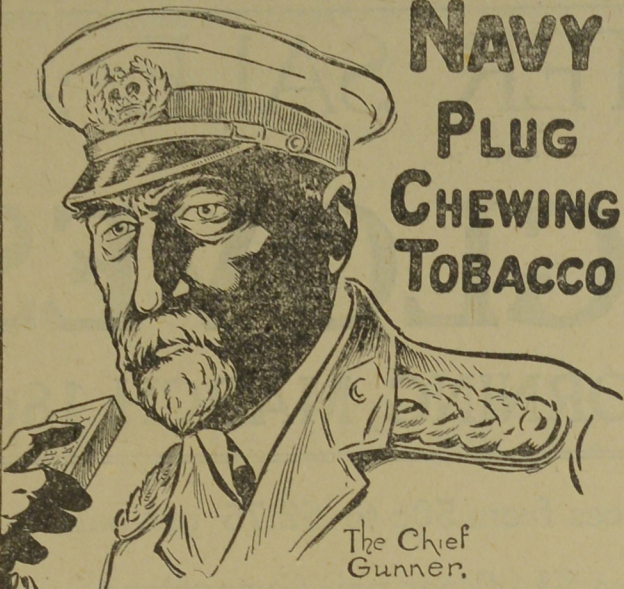

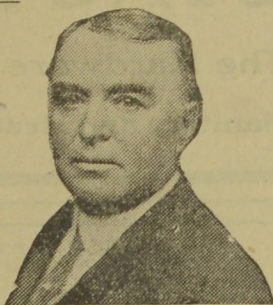

THE SULLIVAN GUN LAW HELPS LAWLESS ELEMENT

Patrolman Kelly of the Fifth Ave. Station, Brooklyn, is in very bad humor at present and ready to explode whenever the word "dummy" is mentioned by anyone within earshot. There is a reason. Just before dawn the other morning Kelly was startled by a cry of "burglars!" coming from a house on Eleventh Street occupied by a dressmaker. The woman had been awakened by some noise and, believing there were burglars in her house, cried for help. Kelly, with the trusty club in his strong hand, made his way into the front room on the lower floor and in the dim light he saw three figures, standing motionless. "Hold up your hands!" commanded Kelly and when the figures still remained motionless, he made a rush for them with his club. "Biff!" "Swat!" "Slam!" his club landed upon the heads of the figures and they collapsed. When the occupant of the house reached the room and lit the gas it was found that Kelly had effectively floored three dressmaker's dummies. There was no burglar in the house and, considering Kelly's mood at that time, it was a fortunate thing for the burglar.

New York's Chinatown one of the most picturesque show places in the Bowery district and the scene of innumerable crimes is to be wiped out of existence by the latest plans for a civic centre. The report of the Courthouse Board just filed, provides for the acquisition of the property extending from City Hall Park to Bayard Street which the city does not already own. This district includes Chinatown. The proposed civic centre will be the largest of its kind in the world, and includes a new Federal Courthouse a new United States general postoffice building a building for the use of the New York State officials in this city, a new state courts building and a broad plaza entrance to Manhattan Bridge.

The police authorities evidently have their own most peculiar way of interpreting the Sunday closing laws. Vaudeville houses are permitted to give performances to which admission is charged, every Sunday night and are never interfered with. The other Sunday the performance of a play called "The Master Mind" was to be given at the Harris Theatre for the benefit of the thousands of actors who were prevented by their professional duties on other evenings to see the play. No admission was charged and every actor who had been invited was entitled to admission free of charge. But the performance was never given, because the police authorities having heard of the proposed performance, threatened to arrest everybody connected with the show should an attempt be made to give the performance.

The Ponce Theatre, in Thirtieth Street east of Broadway just opposite the Maxine Elliott Theatre, was opened Monday night. The new theatre is the smallest among the first class theatres in the city. Its capacity is only 298 persons, about the same as that of the Little Theatre. Its policy will be distinct from that of any other play house in the city in its devotion to one-act plays and short novelties, after the style of the Grand Guignol of Paris.

In the new theatre there is no balcony. In its stead a mezzanine provides a group of loges, from each of which there is an unobstructed view of the stage. The dressing and property rooms usually located above the stage, are in this theatre located above the auditorium. The theatre is owned by a company incorporated by Lee Shubert, William A. Brady and Arch Selwyn.

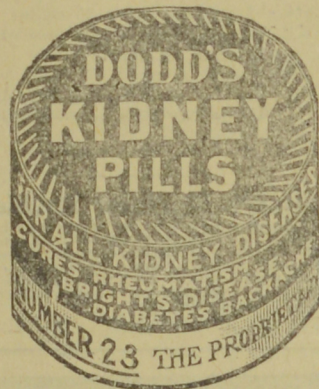
