Charlottetown, P. E. I., April 30—The political waters in the Island Province, from the Tory point of view, are becoming very bitter. The Government Federal members have turned out dismal failures. It is freely admitted that if the situation does not improve none of the present M.P.s. can be standard bearers, and this gentle hint is given to the present members to get ready for retirement. There is considerable speculation as to who will succeed them. Two members of the Legislature, the Mayor and several others are canvassed as probable candidates. One of their prominent campaigners of 1911 is reported already in the field as an independent candidate. The list of seceders from the party is very long, and wise Tories consider independence the safest card to run on.

In the meantime some of the discredited autocrats are looking for cover to escape a political sepulchre. Rumor has it that a new Supreme Court Judge will be appointed as soon as the warring elements decide as to who gets the plum. Covetous eyes are already watching the seat of the Lieutenant Governor, and others are counting the days of aged senators, anxious to don dead men's shoes. Anything to escape the plunge into the chill waters of an ill-tempered electorate.

## DEMOCRATS STAND BY THE TARIFF BILL

Washington, D. C., May 1—All efforts of opposition to disturb the "Market basket" reduction in the Democratic tariff bill failed in the house today despite the fact that Republican orators sounded warnings of ruined industries, enforced idleness and empty cupboards to follow the enactment of the Underwood bill.

Still championing the bill as the greatest ever written for the benefit of the people of the country, the Democrats were deaf to the pleas of the representatives of the beet and sugar states against free sugar in three years, unmoved by the charge that they legislated into the hands of the beet trust by placing duties on live stock, while free listing their products and determined to rush the passage of the bill at the earliest possible moment.

The first break from the solid front of the majority came, however, when Louisiana Democrats led by Representative Broussard, appealed to Republican Leader Mann for a share of time in which to speak against the sugar schedule, and when Representative Kinkead, a new Jersey Democrat, uttered a prediction that the senate would strike out the ways and means committee's ten per cent rates on live stock.

When Representative Sloan of Nebraska introduced an amendment to increase the rate on cattle from 10 to 15 per cent after a 25 per cent amendment by Fordney of Michigan, had been rejected, Mr. Kinkead declared that he believed the ways and means committee had kept the platform pledge to the people when they had reduced live stock rates to 10 per cent., but he felt that the committee should have placed live stock on the free list among the meats.

"I believe and hope," said Mr. Kinkead, "that when it comes back to us from the senate that the duty will be cut off and that every Democrat on this floor will support it."

### SUGAR SCHEDULE UNCHANGED.

This aroused prolonged applause from the Republicans, who earlier were stirred to enthusiastic cheering, when Mr. Broussard declared that sugar rates declared by his party would redound only to the benefit of the sugar trust. The test vote on sugar came on an amendment offered by Minority Leader Mann to strike out the provision placing sugar on the free list in three years. It was lost 88 to 186.

Representative Underwood analysed the sugar rates in the proposed bill, described the Louisiana cane industry as one that could not survive and asserted that the rates in bill would not affect the beet sugar industry.

Atlantic City, N. J., May 2—"The White Slave Traffic" was the chief subject of discussion at the annual convention this afternoon of the New Jersey State Federation of Women's Clubs. Tomorrow morning Prof. Scott Nearing, of the University of Pennsylvania, will address the club women on the subject of "Budgets, Wages and Financing the Family." The convention will close with the election of officers tomorrow afternoon.
