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IN P. E. ISLAND

A very stringent amendment to the Prohibition Act was adopted at the last session of the P. E. Island legislature. The lid has been on pretty tight in the Island for several years but travellers who go there say that it is not a difficult matter to get in touch with John Barleycorn providing one knows the ropes. It may not be quite so easy now that the law has been made more stringent.

The amendment adopted at the recent session requires all certificates and prescriptions to be filed with the Provincial Treasurer, it requires the inspector to examine the books of the vendors and druggists as to sales of liquor every three months, conviction of selling liquors through himself or clerk, shall cause him to cease to be a vendor, it prohibits drinking or treating on ferry boats, trains, railway stations, streets, lane public highway, picnic tea party, public social, society gathering, horse race, also the giving of liquor to any infant or minor, without the consent of their parents or guardian. Any person having liquor in or near the grounds where any public gathering is held shall be liable to be arrested and their goods confiscated. Another clause provides that in the case of information being laid, the burden of proof shall rest upon the defendant not on the informant.

A PLAIN SPOKEN ORANGEMAN

There are some Orangemen who do not see eye to eye with those leaders in their order who are trying to help themselves politically by playing upon the prejudice of their brethren.

For example, in The Sentinel of April 10th Mr. James Bryan of Galtingtown, Ontario, writes as follows:

"Editor Sentinel,—Your paper reaches me through a friend and I beg to state that in my opinion it would have a much wider circulation both among members of our order and among Protestants generally if you did not take such a one-sided stand in politics. I do not understand how you can ask members of our order to support the Borden-Rogers-Pelletier-Naotel-Blondin combination. The three latter represent the church party in the Province of Quebec. In my humble opinion our order was duped in the last dominion elections. Many Orangemen in Canada will refuse to support said combination in the next fight.

"So far as Sir Wilfrid Laurier goes I believe he has always tried to be fair to all classes and creeds."

It is hard to imagine what may be the fate of this plain-spoken Orangeman but no doubt many of his brethren in the order think the same as he does, though they do not care to come out so openly.

The Toronto Saturday Night tells us that the rate of taxation in the City of Houston, Tex., has been cut from \$1.70 to \$1.30 by the very simple expedient of taxing land at its full valuation, improvements at part valuation, and letting all personal property go free. The above will, doubtless, be interesting to those who are working for tax reform everywhere. While encouraging the experience of the City of Houston will cause no surprise to clear-headed economists. The day is rapidly approaching when the present method of taxing everything in sight will be obsolete even amongst the most backward communities. Let but a few towns and cities adopt a really sound and logical method of taxation, and the law of the survival of the fittest will quickly depopulate other towns and cities and in this manner compel them to fall into line.

Why are there so many complaints with the postal service? The postmaster of this city should take enough pride in the efficiency of his office to investigate every complaint and find out where the fault lies. There must be great carelessness somewhere to account for so many errors and delays.

During the investigation of graft charges preferred against Sir James Whitney and Provincial Secretary Hanna, by the committee of the Ontario Legislature, counsel for the accused admitted that Hon. Mr. Hanna had received a contribution of \$500 for political purposes from a firm of contractors doing business with the government. The Tory majority on the committee however, refused to allow counsel for the man who preferred the charges to probe the matter any further, and he withdrew from the case. Sir James Whitney in discussing the incident afterwards admitted that his colleague had made a little mistake. He probably meant by this that the contractors should have been compelled to come across with a much larger amount.

It is said that the Local Government is experiencing some difficulty in finding a competent man to take charge of the roads of the province under the act of last session. There are plenty of engineers available, some of whom are applicants for the position, but they fail to measure up to the standard. It is said that if the right man can be found he will be paid a salary of five thousand dollars a year.
