WESTERN FREIGHT RATES

when wheat in Ontario was selling the west at 50 to 52 cents a bushel this was not wheat of the same grade but taking the same grades there was a difference of from 35 to 45 cents between the price in small town in the west and that in small towns in the east. He thought that the high freight rates had considerable to do with this.

He quoted the price of cement in Ontario, \$1.20 a barrel, as compared with \$1.75 a barrel in Regina, and estimated that \$1.87 of this was due to the higher freight rates.

The question was placed before the railway commission in 1900, he said to alleged discrimination, in local freight rates in the west as compared with local rates in Ontario. The railway commission directed an investigation and the dominion government appointed counsel, the onus of carrying on the case resting with the dominion counsel.

Mr. Martin reviewed the progress of the case since its inception and said that on April 16, 1912, M. K. Cowan called officers of the C. P.R. and C. N. R. as witnesses and was able to establish on their evidence the following facts.

1—That freight rates on the railways west of Lake Superior are from 25 to 175 per cent. higher than in Ontario and Quebec.

2—From the C. P. R. records that the cost of hauling 1,000 tons one mile is less in the west than in Ontario and Quebec.

3—That the cost of maintenance in the prairie province is \$400 less per mile than in the east.

4—That the actual transportation expenses are \$434 less per mile in Saskatchewan and Alberta than on the eastern lines.

5—That it costs \$863 less per mile to operate railways in Alberta and Saskatchewan than in the east.

6—That the density of traffic is 29 per cent. greater in Manitoba and 16 per cent. greater in Alberta and Saskatchewan than in Ontario and Quebec.

The evidence that M. K. Cowan was thus able to introduce resulted, said Mr. Martin, in the railway commissioners ordering the railways to justify their rates.

HON. MR. COCHRANE

Mr. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways, in reply said:

"I suppose the hon. gentleman thought he was going to stop me from drawing the attention of the house to the fact that he sat in this house for three years before this government came into power without bringing this subject before the railway commission. But he cannot get away from that fact. The late chairman of the railway commission, whose death we all deplore and to whom I sent the complaint of the western farmers in January, 1911, replied that he had never had anything of the kind referred to him nor any request made to him to investigate it before. I have his letter on file which I could produce to the house to substantiate that statement."

DR. NEELY.

Dr. Neely, of Humboldt, who followed said that the minister had not explained why the government counsel was not able to go on after a year. He was not surprised, however at the evasion because the opposition had learned what to expect from the government when its acts are criticized. It was a strange thing that the railways which prepare monthly statements could not lay before the board information in regard to the cost of transportation in less time. M. K. Cowan, counsel for the western governments had established the existence of discrimination against the west. The question was one as between western and eastern rates, and he could not see the object of sending experts to the United States to ascertain facts in regard to rates across the border.

HON. MR. OLIVER

No one replied to Dr. Neely and Hon. Frank Oliver took the floor. He said that this was not merely a western matter because what adversely affects the west hurts the whole dominion. In this case the charge is that the transportation interests are taking more than their fair share out of the production and earnings of the people of the west. If this be so the east must suffer in both an industrial and financial sense.

Replying to an interruption by the minister of railways as to whether similar conditions did not exist when the Liberals were in power, Mr. Oliver said that it did not matter at the time what the old government did some three to ten years ago. What the people of Canada are interested in is what the government is doing today.

HON. ROBERT ROGERS

Hon Robert Rogers replied. He said that the opposition had been endeavoring to fasten on to the government a charge of bad faith in regard to this matter. He absolutely denied that there was any bad faith, and challenged the opposition to produce the slightest tittle of evidence to show that there was bad faith in carrying out the inquiry into the freight rates. This was a very wide and very large question, and representative counsel had been selected to represent the government and the people.
